Clearwater Gardens, locally owned and operated by Don and Delta Heath-Simpson, have received permission to sell produce at the parking lot located between the baseball fields and the Juliaetta

Fire Department headquarters off highway 3 this summer. Mid-July is the tentative start date for sales, depending on produce availability. The produce season usually goes through the end of October. All produce is grown at 23414 Penny Lane, Juliaetta. The days and hours of operation are tentatively planned to be Thursdays and Fridays from 2:30 – 5:30 pm. Signs will be posted on the highway on the days when produce is offered for sale. If you are interested in eating healthy, locally grown fruits and vegetables, please stop by to see our selection. All produce is chemical-free and freshly harvested. We have been growing and selling our produce for many, many years. This will just be a new location for easier access for our customers.

## Rec District Encourages Applications

The JK Recreation District Committee is a group of elected individuals who oversee funding of community recreation projects. Committee members include Aaron Heinen, Lisa Wolf, and Jill Groseclose. Chantel Hannan is the clerk. It is the committee's job to accept and review requests for grants. Individuals and organizations may submit grant applications to help fund projects that benefit the Juliaetta/Kendrick area recreation. Some projects previously funded include a fountain for the Juliaetta park, renovations to the Kendrick Grange and the Juliaetta Community center, and heritage signs for both towns. The committee dedicates a large portion of our funding to maintenance of the Kendrick Pool and the walking trail that runs from Kendrick to Juliaetta. The committee often funds project requests from the library and other community organizations.

The last year of COVID has greatly decreased the number of requests submitted to the committee, and we would like to remind and encourage community members to submit grant proposals for projects. The form is available from any committee member and proposals may be submitted to J-K Recreation District, P.O. Box 105, Kendrick, ID 83537 or via email to chantelh@tds.net. The committee meets to review proposals four times a year: August, November, February, and May.

The committee welcomes comments and feedback. If you are interested in discussing a project or finding out more, don't hesitate to contact one of the committee members for more information.

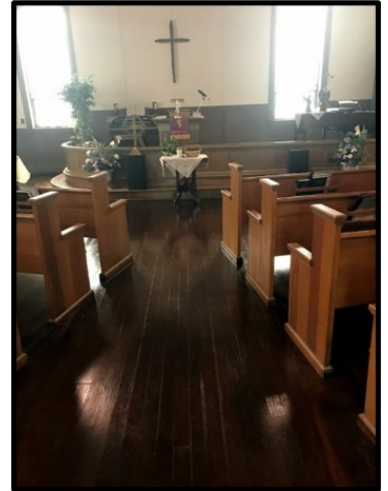


## Floors at Leland Church

## 21st Century Community Learning Center at JES

Juliaetta Elementary School was once again awarded the Nina M. Lowey 21st Century Community Learning Center grant from the State Department of Education. This grant is a five year grant and provides funding for programs such as before and after school programming, summer program, KJ7 Preschool, and extended day Kindergarten to allow for a full day program. This is the third time JES has received this particular grant and we have a history of running high quality 21st CCLC programs since 2010.

This year's summer program is scheduled for August 2nd-13th, Monday-Friday, 8am-noon. We offer enrichment activities, hands-on learning, small lunch, and more to prepare students for the adjustment of heading back to school. Our theme for this year's summer program is Unleash the Wild, focusing on different animals around the globe! For our older students, they will focus on coding using KANO Computers! This is open for students entering grades K-6.

## Gritman, Moscow Fire Join Yellow Dot Emergency Care Program

The simple act of knowing a patient's basic medical information can make all the difference for first responders called to provide life-saving care in an emergency. [Gritman Medical Center](#) and the [Moscow Volunteer Fire Department](#) have joined a new initiative to further ensure those first minutes count.

The [Idaho Yellow Dot Program](#), funded through the [Idaho Time Sensitive Emergency System](#) of the Department of Health and Welfare, encourages motorists to share life-saving medical information on a form in their glove compartment. A small yellow decal placed on the car's rear window cues paramedics to look for the form.

"If something happens and you're having a medical emergency, this gives permission to whoever comes upon you to go into your glove box and get help," [Gritman Emergency Department](#) Director Nicole Wheaton said.

Wheaton plays a leadership role in the state's administration of the program, serving as Region 2 Chair of the Idaho Time Sensitive Emergency Council. The council is providing kits free to Idahoans so emergency medical providers like Wheaton can continue providing exceptional care regardless of whether a patient is able to answer questions.

Gritman is working with the Moscow Volunteer Fire Department to spread the word about the new program.

"It is helpful to responders if there is an emergency," Moscow Volunteer Fire Department Division Chief Debby Carscallen said. "If they can't speak for themselves, we have more information."

In addition to personal information like first and last name, the form asks for: 1) A current photo, 2) Medical conditions and/or recent surgeries, 3) Names of medications, 4) Allergies, 5) Physician and pharmacy information, 6) Emergency contact information.

Yellow Dot kits can be requested by sending an email to [YellowDot@dhw.idaho.gov](mailto:YellowDot@dhw.idaho.gov) with the requestor's full name, mailing address and number of kits needed. A limited number of kits are also available at either Gritman Medical Center information desk or Moscow Volunteer Fire Department Stations No. 1 and No. 3.

## JES Receives New Learning Tools

The JES library received a fully stocked observation beehive in early March thanks to funds from the Nez Perce Education Foundation secured by the KHS science teacher Mr. McDowell. Librarian Connie Hedler has spent considerable time reading up on bee keeping for students as well as redecorating the library in this theme. The JES observation beehive is part of the same grant that provided the two 3D printers given to JES last year, also provided by the Nez Perce Tribe.

The sixth grade class has been busy learning all about 3D printing. Mr. McDowell came to Juliaetta Elementary School in January and explained the basics of a 3D printer and how to create and print a project. JES purchased the needed materials (like filament, spatulas, and snippers) and the students have really enjoyed the creative process. Orion Stewart and Eian Schwecke learned how to load the filament; they, along with Jessica Bateman have learned how to troubleshoot problems. Mr. McDowell explained that mistakes are an important part of the learning process. This has been a wonderful enriching experience for the whole class.

In April, Suzanne Brammer wrote a grant proposal for a Drone Designer + Coding with Drones project through the Idaho STEM Action Center which would fund 30 drones for grades 4-8. On May 3, Suzanne was notified that the grant for \$4000 had been awarded to JES and the Kendrick School District. Mrs. Brammer and Mrs. Nelson will attend a training July 12-14 where they will receive and learn about the drones and how to implement the twelve - one hour lessons.

Pastors: Perceived vs Reality

Every now and then I get the comment from people, "You aren't what I expected of a pastor." And for me that's usually a compliment. 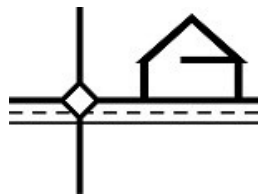

The museum will be open on the day of the Car Show in Kendrick, July 17<sup>th</sup>. Through the summer, we are open by appointment. Just give a member a call.

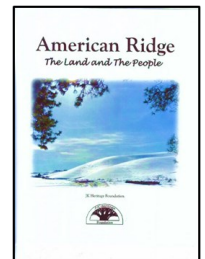

## Steller's Jay

This is the crested jay of the mountainous west. They are commonly found in evergreen forests, but easier to see when they visit campgrounds and back yards. Omnivorous appetites pull them to feeders, picnic areas, and garbage. Unattended popcorn or sandwiches can be stolen from unwary campers.

Jays are opportunists and thieves. When not pilfering from people, they will eat insects, seeds, berries, nuts, small animals, eggs, and nestlings. All jays have excellent spatial memories and can cache items such as nuts, acorns and aforementioned sandwich chunks. These may be buried or wedged in the bark of a tree and the birds will find the caches later. These Jays are not above raiding the caches of other birds.

The Steller's Jay has a black crest and back above a brilliant blue 12" body. The crest has vertical streaks in front: white streaks on birds near the coast; blue streaks on inland birds.

Except when nesting, Steller's Jays are generally found in flocks. One interesting behavior: the birds will often fly across a clearing one at a time, in single file, giving their low "shook-shook" calls as they swoop up to perch in a tall pine.

Nests are generally high in evergreen trees, on horizontal branches against the trunk. The nest is a bulky cup of leaves, sticks, and moss, glued together with mud. Of the 10 North American jays, only blue jays and Steller's Jays use mud for nest building. Steller's Jays produce a single brood of 2 to 6 young. When nesting, the birds may be quiet unless disturbed. Otherwise, they are just plain noisy. They give loud harsh calls and have an amazing repertoire of sounds. They can imitate birds, squirrels, cats, dogs, chickens, and some mechanical objects.

Of all bird species, the Steller's Jay boasts the most frequently misspelled name. While it is indeed a noteworthy (stellar!) specimen, the bird is named for George Steller, a naturalist who first described the bird in 1788 when he saw it on an Alaskan island. Mr. Steller also first described the Steller's sea lion and Steller's Sea-Eagle.

## Donation Drive

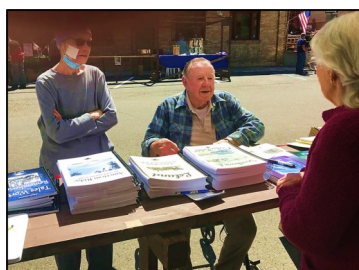

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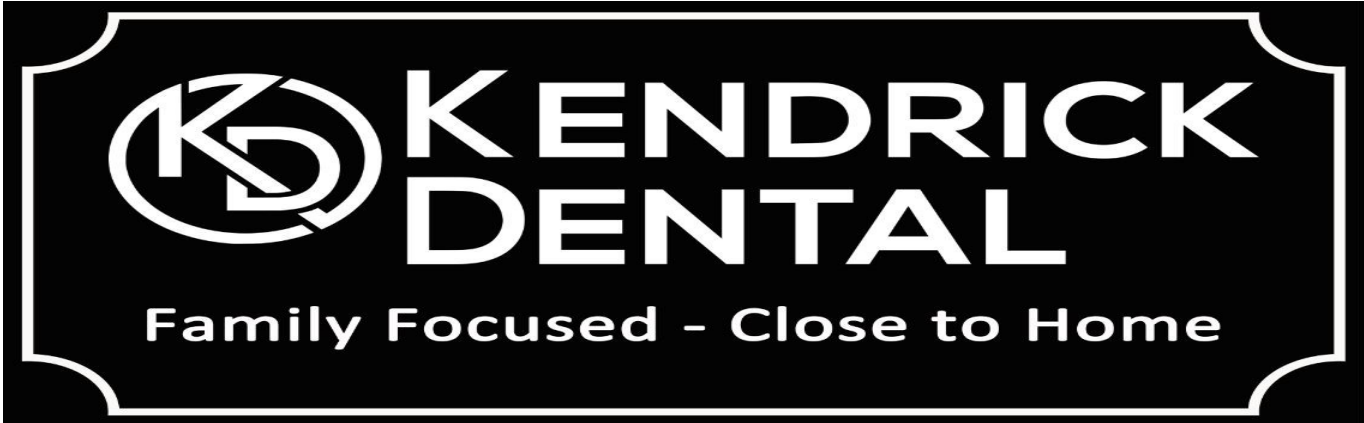
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
