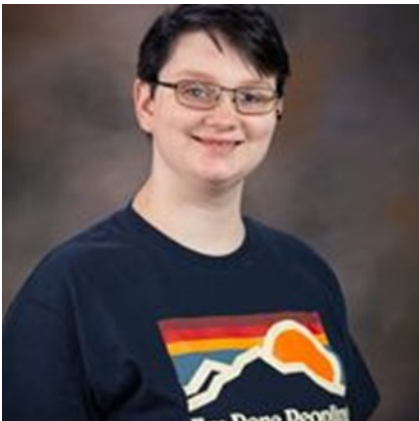

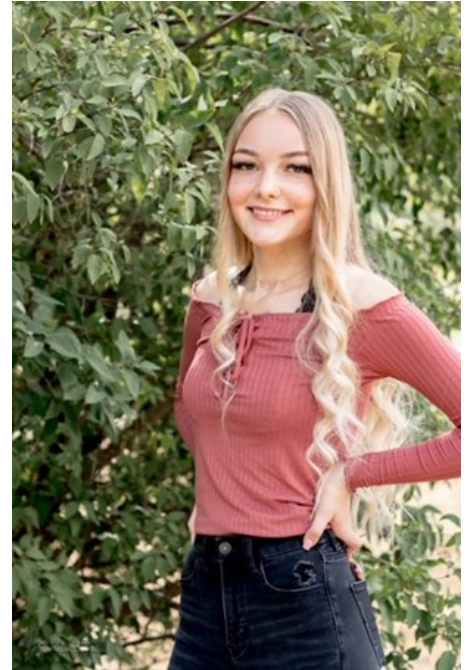
Rylan will attend North Idaho College in Coeur D'Alene where he will pursue a career in auto mechanics.

# Pastors' Corner:

## Disarray or Order

We definitely live in times where things are always changing. One of those areas of change that affect all of us is the basis of our moral values. The values of today are very different than those of our grandparents. Things that are morally accepted today would not even have been considered let alone accepted just a couple generations back. Moral values are what determines what society will or will not accept but what determines those values. If they are always changing does that mean they are changing for the better? If we say yes to that then we have to say our grandparents and everyone else in the past had the wrong values. When comparing those values of a couple generations back to today's it is clear they are very different. How do we determine who has the right values? If we say that current society sets values that determine our action then how do we explain the different values held by individuals within the same society? Who is to say the values of one person is right and the other person's values are wrong? The problem is we have no standard to measure them against. You can take a ruler and measure a board that is 3 inches and if you measure a week later it will still measure 3 inches because we have a standard of measurement. A one foot ruler will always measure 1 foot because a foot is always made up of 12 inches. If somebody tells you a foot is 13 inches and you say no it is 12 inches it is obvious who is right and who is wrong because of the standard we have for measuring. If only we had a standard for values we could then determine what ones were right and what ones were wrong. Could it be we do have a standard but it is just being ignored because we want to set values we are comfortable with? How has that been working lately? What if we used the standard God set hundreds of years ago in the Scriptures?

A summary of His Standard can be summarized in four questions when setting values to determine right and wrong behavior. I Corinthians 6:12a is the basis for question 1 "Everything is permissible for me, but not everything is beneficial." Question 1: Everything is permissible for me." Is it helpful-physically, spiritually, and mentally? The basis for question 2 is I Corinthians 6:12b "Everything is permissible for me but I will not be mastered by anything." Question 2: Does it bring me under its power? The basis for question 3 is I Corinthians 8:13 "If what I eat causes my brother to fall into sin, I will never eat meat again so that I will not cause him to fall." Question 3: Does it hurt others? The basis for the final question is I Corinthians 1-:31 "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God" Question 4: Does it glorify God. Is it time to stop ignoring the value standard God has given?

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## **"Please move over! I'm trying to save a life!"**

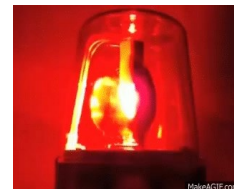

Because our responders are volunteers and do not live on site, they must drive from their homes to the station in a hurry. Often, they put lights in their cars or pickups to indicate an emergency. 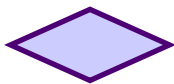
Bingo is on the last Wednesday of the month to celebrate the birthdays. It starts at 10:00 am. All are welcome.

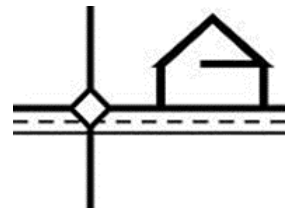
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## Southwick Community Center

## A Letter from the South Latah Highway District

Dear Patrons,  
According to Title 22 Chapter 24 of the Idaho Code, highway districts have a responsibility to control noxious weeds along the roads. In addition, we use chemicals to control vegetation, in the right-of-way, that cause maintenance issues or road hazards. If you plan to request South Latah Highway District NOT to spray any vegetation on your property in the right-of-way, it will be YOUR responsibility to control the weeds and maintain the grassy vegetation. It is important that you mark each end of your property with clearly visible, easy to read signs that state "No Spray". The person spraying the weeds has no way of knowing the property is not to be sprayed unless it is clearly marked.

Plans are in the works to beautify Kendrick Main Street with large flower pots. The Garden Club is purchasing flowers and using donated pots to add some color to the sidewalks in town. The Garden Club’s support for youth gardening is ongoing, as the club sponsored an Elementary School Garden Shower in March. Club members donated items for use in the school’s outdoor garden center including trowels, rakes, a leaf blower and other needed supplies. The students also are planning on planting a maple tree (donated by HGVC) on the school grounds for Arbor Day. Garden on, kids!

Kendrick High School seniors looking to study agriculture or horticulture may apply for a \$500 scholarship from the HVGC this year. It’s a simple application and forms are available from the school counselors. Deadline is April 30, 2021.

In a cooperative effort by the Garden Club, City of Kendrick and High School Vo Ag class, soon Kendrick will have new welcome signs on both ends of town. The Garden Club is financing the project and drafted sketches of possible signs. The city council selected one and it is now being finalized by a student at the High School. Students will use their plasma cutter to cut the large metal signs, and finally the signs will be powder coated and ready to hang. Watch for them sometime in May or early June!

Hoping that this year might bring us a safe way to participate in Locust Blossom, members are tentatively planning on sponsoring an informal flower show on Saturday, May 29. There will be no judging nor awards, just beautiful flower arrangements and interesting horticulture exhibits for public viewing. ## Golden Eagle

The golden eagle (*Aquila chrysaetos*) is one of the best-known birds of prey in the Northern Hemisphere. It is the most widely distributed species of eagle. Like all eagles, it belongs to the family Accipitridae. These birds are dark brown, with lighter golden-brown plumage on their napes. Immature eagles of this species typically have white on the tail and often have white markings on the wings. Golden eagles use their agility and speed combined with powerful feet and massive, sharp talons to snatch up a variety of prey, mainly hares, rabbits, and marmots and other ground squirrels.[3] Golden eagles maintain home ranges or territories that may be as large as 200 km<sup>2</sup> (77 sq mi). They build large nests in cliffs and other high places to which they may return for several breeding years. Most breeding activities take place in the spring; they are monogamous and may remain together for several years or possibly for life. Females lay up to four eggs, and then incubate them for six weeks. Typically, one or two young survive to fledge in about three months. These juvenile golden eagles usually attain full independence in the fall, after which they wander widely until establishing a territory for themselves in four to five years.

Once widespread across the Holarctic, it has disappeared from many areas which are now more heavily populated by humans. Despite being extirpated from or uncommon in some of its former range, the species is still widespread, being present in sizeable stretches of Eurasia, North America, and parts of North Africa. It is the largest and least populous of the five species of true accipitrid to occur as a breeding species in both the Palearctic and the Nearctic.[4]

For centuries, this species has been one of the most highly regarded birds used in falconry. Due to its hunting prowess, the golden eagle is regarded with great mystic reverence in some ancient, tribal cultures.



It is one of the most extensively studied species of raptor in the world in some parts of its range, such as the Western United States and the Western Palearctic.
