“Tiger of Distinction” Program Welcomes Second Honoree

The KJ7 Education Foundation’s Tiger of Distinction program is in its second year of honoring Kendrick High School graduates who have excelled in their chosen career or life path. The honoree for 2018 was James Peavey, and his presentation at KHS conveyed a message about the importance of fundamental education, and of giving back to society. Jim shared stories from his personal experience, commenting that the 5 years he spent attending school at KHS were among the best. He said that a KHS typing class created a special opportunity for him when he entered the U.S. Naval Service, because he had a skill that no one else in his squadron had. This afforded him an opportunity for job advancement, and the choice of training for his desired career as an air traffic controller.



It is interesting to note that this same theme arose during Kenneth Heimgartner’s Tiger of Distinction presentation last year, when he emphasized that studying at a small school doesn’t limit students’ chances for success. He said it is really a matter of taking full advantage of the learning opportunities offered, which can impact your life in unexpected ways, and expand your future choices for career or life development. The more training and knowledge you have, the more control you gain over the path your life will take.

Jim also shared thoughts about his respect and admiration for those who have served in the armed forces, and described how he and his wife started the Honor Flight program for the Puget Sound area—an organization with the mission “to transport Western Washington war veterans to Washington D.C., to visit and reflect at memorials dedicated to honor their service and sacrifices.” He showed a wonderful video about the first honor flight his organization sponsored, reminding students that freedom isn’t free, but comes at a high cost—and for some, the ultimate. He said that while he is giving to the veterans through this program, he is also getting something so special out of the experience, so it is a win-win situation. After meeting with the students at KHS, Jim provided a presentation at the Senior Meal Site. Here is a link to the video he shared:

The Hill and Valley Garden Club presented a Flower Power Program at Juliaetta Community Library in conjunction with the Summer Reading Event in June.



The Garden Club thinks sunflowers are amazing, and has sort of adopted them as a theme. We even purchased bulk seeds and packaged them for inclusion in the KJ7 Get Acquainted

Bags. Therefore it seemed only natural to focus on these big summer beauties when planning a program for the Summer Reading series.

The gardening program focused on sunflowers large and small, and we had planted seeds for both dwarf and giant varieties ahead of time, so attendees were able to go home with one of each. Other activities included drawing sunflowers on postcards to take home, and hopefully give or mail to someone. Participants also had a chance to draw and cut out sunflower forms that were then combined in a collage of flowers to be attached to a pole on the corner of Main and 2nd Streets, at the level of 30 feet and 1 inch... which matches the world's record for the largest sunflower! Another activity was creating seed balls or seed bombs that included sunflowers seeds, to be taken home and planted with a toss. The Hillbilly Bar & Grill 707 East Main Street Kendrick, Idaho

In 2009 James Souders bought the Antelope Inn, renaming it the *Hillbilly Bar & Grill*. He did remodeling to the building, refinishing the floors, moving walls and a new bar was installed.

Some interesting history regarding the business that has occupied the building. According to Dana Magnuson, his father Robert Magnuson bought the bar, which was then called the Kendrick Club in the late 1940's. He renamed it the Antelope Inn, bringing with him from Southern Idaho 2 mounted Antelope heads, a Buck and Doe that he had shot. He put them on the wall and the Antelope Inn began. A saying that has long been associated with the bar “Antelope Inn and Stagger Out”. While Robert owned it, legalized gambling was in Idaho and slot machines were installed. This was a big part of the business. It was only a few years and gambling was outlawed in Idaho

The hours for the Hillbilly Bar & Grill are 11:00 A.M.-2:00 A.M. 365 days of the year. Beer and Food is available. Karaoke is every other week-end. Come in for a beer, have something to eat, sing a song or two and enjoy the company.

Film Crew

A film company out of London, England was in town the first week of June shooting footage for a documentary of the Shackelford murders that took place nineteen years ago on May 29, 1999. Dale Shackelford murdered Donna Fontaine and her companion Fred Palahniuk fifteen miles from Kendrick on Cedar Ridge and then burned their bodies in a house fire to cover the evidence.


Shackelford was a master manipulator and dragged many innocent people into his evil web of deception. While they were filming in Kendrick, they used the Museum to interview and shoot scenes with the reporter that followed the case.

It was Idaho’s most lengthy and most expensive trial in history. Shackelford initially was given the death sentence. He has since filed appeals. In a decision by the Idaho Supreme Court on June 1, 2010, the death sentence was overturned. All of the other charges stood including first-degree murder convictions with various fixed sentences for one count of first-degree arson, preparing false evidence, first-degree conspiracy to commit murder and first-degree conspiracy to commit arson. The program will air on the Discovery Channel sometime in the future. Sharon Harris


and help you care for the ones you care about.

Public Nuisances

Juliaetta City Council would like everyone to do his or her part to help keep our City a nice place to live. An ordinance exists that outlines the requirements of residents and property owners. Do not allow trash, junk, or waste to accumulate, either on public or private property. Do not allow anything to accumulate that could constitute a fire danger. This also includes keeping yards, shrubbery, and trees maintained. Unmaintained weeds and grass are considered public nuisances. Grass must be kept at a height of six inches or less on the whole property. Storage of non-operable vehicles, boats, campers and trailers, equipment, machinery, and parts is unlawful unless enclosed in a building or within sight-obscuring fence which is to be kept in good condition. Please help keep Juliaetta beautiful!

Burn Permits

Burn permits are now required for burning within city limits. A permit can be obtained at City Hall and will be reviewed by Juliaetta Volunteer Fire Department Chief Mike McGee. Burning is allowed in backyard fire pits unless there is a burn ban in effect, but must be kept to a small campfire size only.



Meet the dynamic duo. They are part of the Millennial generation. But one can forget any negative connotations that might be associated with this generation when it comes to these two women. Their smiles say it all.

Amber Witt and **Amy Cothren** are two amazing women who care deeply about their community. They don't feel they are owed anything like many of that generation. Both women are friendly, courteous, respectful, energetic and good for the educational community of Kendrick-Juliaetta. They are both very family centered and appear to love being involved, so when asked to be a part of the team including Tawnya Feldman that worked on the Idaho Gives Campaign as part of the KJ7 Education Foundation Board, they both gave a resounding "YES!!" The team raised \$5000.00 to use toward Discovery grants for the children of the education community, to work on various projects from Kindergartners through High School student involvement. The Foundation had 55 donors, not including the Match Club, that supported the Foundation as a non-Profit during the Idaho Gives Campaign. The state of Idaho only provides part of the funding to support education so there is a definite need to raise additional monies through this type of support. Hence, the KJ7 Education Foundation was instituted.

Discovery Grants allow individual children to find a topic of interest, present their idea and request funding, research the topic, develop the idea and then share it. One first grader developed a new breed of horses. In the second grade they observed the passion the students demonstrate to learn a subject of interest, self-development and confidence they gain, and lots of cooperative learning. They found the students love to share their projects and do so with much enthusiasm.

Amy sees herself as bringing a fresh perspective to the group and the need to utilize social media more. There are alumni from Kendrick all over, that truly care what the children of Kendrick-Juliaetta are learning and want to stay informed. Social media is the best way to reach many of them. Amy wants to see an increase in the use of social media. She sees a collaborative goal to work with not only school staff, but the community at large and the students. Amy wants people to realize the work of the Foundation is so much more than just scholarships.

Amber wanted to be involved because of the good things she saw them doing as an organization. She likes that the scholarships are for everyone regardless of academic level, GPA doesn't matter. She likes that these grants challenge the children to explore. She likes that younger women are being asked to participate in the Foundation and able to really connect in a positive way with the children. She too sees social media playing more of a role in the work that the Foundation does. Amber wants to continue to increase benefits for all the children.

Both Amy and Amber see themselves as laying the foundation for when their own children begin school. Opportunities are available and only limited by your imagination.

Amy Cothren moved to this area before starting school from Riverside, California. Her parents both had fulltime careers yet found the time to open the flower shop in Kendrick. Dave Gobbi came for a career with the Lewiston Police Department. Janice worked as a bookkeeper and did tax work. They followed Janice's parents who had moved to the Orofino area. The family saw possible a better way of life within this more rural community. Amy has one brother and is the older of the two. In 2011, she married Brad Cothren who grew up in Deary and later had two children, Gracie (4) and Olivia (2) Amy went to elementary school in Juliaetta and graduated from Kendrick High School. From there, she went on to Lewis Clark State College and majored in Business Administration with a minor in Marketing. She and Brad found themselves in Salem, Oregon for awhile as Amy tried out Salem Community College to work on an associate degree in Wine Marketing. She worked in the wine tasting room at a vineyard in the Salem area but she and Brad decided this wasn't a good fit. Last Rocket Launch

It started during the space race between the US and Russia. In 1973 NASA even sent an educator to the school who brought a space suit for students to try on. Over time the rockets have gotten more advanced.

Everything about the rocket is customized to the students taste, including size, shape and color. Each student also gets a choice between having a parachute, streamer or a glide in landing.

California Quail

There are several varieties of quail in North America, but our local birds are California Quail. These endearing chubby birds can be heard calling “chi-CA-go” to one another, long before you see them. Some bird species leave the calling to the males. Quail pairs call back and forth,



male to female, in a tightly coordinated pattern. Males are rich gray and brown, with blue-gray breasts and black faces outlined with bold white stripes. Females are a plainer brown and lack the facial markings. Both sexes have a pattern of white, creamy, and chestnut scales on the belly and a distinctive “comma” plume on the heads. The male’s plume is bigger and showier than that

of the female. All plumes are 6 feathers that appear as one unit. Young birds look like females but have a shorter topknot.

Quail spend most of the year in groups called coveys, which can number from a dozen birds to 75 or more. Much of their time is spent on the ground, and they can run amazingly fast on those short little legs, rarely taking to the air except when threatened. Often they post a sentry – usually an adult male – who keeps watch as the others feed. The birds are omnivorous, eating seeds, caterpillars, beetles, mites, millipedes, and snails. Diet is typically 70 percent vegetarian. Much of their food is obtained by scratching the ground amid leaf litter and other plant material. They prefer to be close to safety, usually brushy areas. If you have spent much time picking blackberries, you’ve undoubtedly heard their clucking “conversations” as they feed in the security of the thorny thickets.

With the onset of the mating season, coveys break into smaller family groups. A nest is usually a grass-lined shallow depression hidden in tall grasses and located near safety retreats of trees or rocks. The female lays 12 to 16 eggs. A nest may hold up to 28 eggs, as other “moms” often add eggs to an existing nest. Incubation is from 22 – 23 days, and the young can run following parents and peck at the ground immediately after hatching. Several males and females often stay in a family group over the summer, combining chicks of all ages, possibly from 2 successive broods. There is an old saying that *it takes a village to raise a child*. Quail adults join forces to raise the young in the family group, acting out the adage.


