Deb Weyen Klatt was born in the little house next to the Kendrick Park which is where women went to have children with a mid-wife present, who at that time worked for Dr. Christiansen in the early 1950's. Deb was the youngest of three children, all girls, who in the absence of brothers learned to work the manual jobs on the farm helping their parents. Now she is married to David Klatt and they have made their home on Main Street in Kendrick since 1982.

She has worked for Dr. Sowle for some 40 years. Longevity in the practice is a real tribute to the relationship Dr. Sowle has with his team of professionals. Having put all those years in, Deb has watched 2 and 3 generations receive quality dental care in the Kendrick area, not having to travel to Moscow or Lewiston. The patients are like old friends and she calls them by first name. Deb expressed what a joy it is to see them and watch them grow up. This is what she likes most about her chosen career. She knows how to make someone feel warm, comforted, and important.

When asked what changes she has seen over the years living and working in this community she indicated it is the opportunity to shop locally. Kendrick is still blessed to have businesses on Main Street, but Juli-
aetta has changed significantly. It used to be more difficult to travel between the community and Moscow or Lewiston so the communities were more vibrant. Now, with it not being so difficult to travel, she encourages the community to try to support the businesses in the local community and keep them viable.

On February 6th, third grade students from JES visited Dworshak National Fish Hatchery and Dworshak Dam Visitors Center located near Orofino, Idaho. During our hatchery tour, we learned about Salmon and Steelhead populations that begin at the hatchery, journey to the ocean, and make their way back to start the cycle with a new generation. The US Corps of Engineers built the hatchery near the same time as the dam, in the late 60's to early 70's, to make up for loss of habitat created by the reservoir. Students watched as biologists' air spawned female fish eggs into buckets, which would be later fertilized and stored in trays in the nursery. Steelhead are raised in raceways at the hatchery for approximately a year, while Salmon stay for a year and a half. Near the beginning of March, the class will get hands on experience with raising steelhead as we participate in the "Steelhead in the Classroom" program through Idaho Fish and Game Department. The class will care for live steelhead eggs until mid-May when they will be released into the Clearwater River. At Dworshak Dam Visitors Center, we learned about its history and how it operates to create electricity. Flooding in the town of Orofino was the main purpose of the dam's construction. It took about 7 years to build and is the third highest dam in the western hemisphere at 717 feet high and over 3,000 feet across. Three very large turbine generators located inside the dam generate electricity. Students study the properties of water and life structures in third grade. This field trip helps students understand how organizations work together to help nature. We hope to inspire a life-long love and possibly a career in helping the environment!

The season of Lent is upon us. The congregation's observance includes a series of mid-week worship services on Wednesday evenings at 7 PM. The services include meditations centered around the theme of grace. Services will be held on March 7, 14, and 21. Sunday, March 25th, Palm Sunday, will be marked with a special worship service at 10 AM, featuring a procession of palms and a reading of a portion of the story of Jesus' Passion from the Gospel of Mark.

In connection with the Lenten season, the members of the congregation are collecting items for personal care kits. These kits include basic things such as a bath towel, soap, comb, toothbrush and nail clippers. These kits will be distributed across the globe through the Lutheran World Relief network.

In addition to the Palm Sunday service mentioned above, Holy Week celebrations also include Maundy Thursday (3/29) and Good Friday (3/30) services. Both services will begin at 7 PM. Easter Sunday will be celebrated with an early morning worship time of 7:30 AM with a special breakfast to follow. There will be a short program for the children that morning as well.

Planning is underway to honor the KHS graduating class of 2018. A date has not yet been set. Preparations have also begun for this summer's Vacation Bible School. VBS will likely be sometime in June. More information on both events will be forthcoming.

The congregation also participated in the annual Souper Bowl of Caring last month on the day of the Super Bowl. This year's recipient of the monies raised was our local community food bank.

Keeping Up With Knowledge?

Has man finally come to the point he has grown beyond his knowledge and wisdom? Has our knowledge outgrown our wisdom? Go back a couple generations and it was easy to define death. When a person's heart stopped beating that person was pronounced dead. Today it is not uncommon to have the heart stop beating and be brought back from the "brink of death". What was one time a simple thing to determine is now more complicated. Death is not the only thing that challenges us today when we try to define something. Only a few years ago a family was made up of a husband, wife and often children. Today family is a very different picture. We're no longer sure what a marriage is, thus it becomes hard to define family. Some today define marriage, as does Scripture, being made up of a man and woman while today the world is changing that definition. Adding to the confusion is that we are not even sure anymore when a man is a man and a woman is a woman. What was once the simple things of life or death have become very complex. We have greater knowledge than ever, but do we have the wisdom to handle that knowledge. We know so much and have accomplished so much but those things that were so easily defined just a few years ago escape us today. Knowledge is the gathering of facts, truths or principles and wisdom knows what to do with the knowledge we gather. Today's conflict is that we no longer know what truth is nor do we have everlasting principles. Past generations lived with one truth based on certain principles, but another generation comes along and says that is no longer true or that principle no longer applies. Because it all keeps changing we lack the wisdom to know what to do with the "new truth" or principle. In short we have so much "new truth" we no longer have the wisdom to discern "truth".

Where do we find wisdom to handle these complex issues facing us today? That question was answered thousands of years ago by Scripture, "If any of you lacks wisdom he should ask God." When we find that wisdom we find truth that leads to unchanging principles that makes life, not easy, but simpler.

KENDRICK JT. SCHOOL DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Once again, it is time to support our annual levy, and to renew the facilities levy for another five years. On March 13, 2018, please go to your local polling station and cast your vote in support of our children's education. The supplemental levy provides about one-third of our core funding. The facilities levy, which is not new and not increasing, provides additional funds to maintain our facilities. Without these resources, we would need to cut programs, staff, and defer critical maintenance projects.

This is our levy renewal message:



- The Idaho State Legislature does not fully fund our district's basic educational programs
- The requested amount for the next two years is \$100,000 less – A SIGNIFICANT REDUCTION
- We continue to need the supplemental levy to help pay for about a third of our core funding
- The levy will not add any additional or unnecessary programs or materials
- We are asking our electorate to help us maintain the quality programs & staff we have in place
- An investment in our children's quality education is an investment in a better future
- Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick Junior/Senior High are among the best schools in Idaho

Rural schools throughout Idaho maintain their educational programs and facilities by passing local levies. Here in Juliaetta and Kendrick, we address our program and facility needs annually by asking you to support the local levies. Our constituents have supported us because we are very careful with these resources and use them to the best advantage. For example, during the past five years, we have systematically installed split-duct heating and cooling systems at Kendrick Jr./Sr. High School (KHS) and Juliaetta Elementary School. With Avista grant support, we have installed solar panels at KHS. These changes are dramatically more efficient than oil-burning-furnaces, and we have significantly reduced our heating costs year-after-year.

At Kendrick Jr./Sr. High School we have replaced interior classroom doors and door handles for safety and replaced classroom windows in three classrooms. We have seal-coated the parking lots at both schools preserving them for future use, and replaced antiquated kitchen lighting with LED lighting. We have maintained the roofs at both schools by applying WDG Silicone materials, installed a vacuum system and added a greenhouse at our agriculture-science building. Our facilities are more than 50 years old, but you wouldn't know that when you walk through and inspect them, because we maintain them so well. *We remodel and upgrade instead of replace. We have also adopted a new language arts curriculum at Juliaetta Elementary School, which does a better job engaging our students in their learning. As a result, we serve our students well and manage within the resources provided.*

Our mission is *"preparing today's children for the challenges of tomorrow."* Simply put, we are preparing our children for the rigors of the digital age in a global economy. A quality education levels the playing field for the children we serve. I am proud of the well-rounded, education our highly qualified staff provides for all of our children. Every employee knows the important nature of our mission and is dedicated to serving our students. Our staff does a wonderful job and deserves your support.

Our School Board has done a great job this year by reducing the supplemental levy amount from \$860,000 to \$810,000. The Board has decided to keep the amount level for two years. We want you to know that the levy is crucial to maintaining the quality of our educational programs. Education is not funded adequately in Idaho. So, the local supplemental levy provides essential resources needed to keep our schools operating properly. Please protect our children's future and help Kendrick Joint School District #283 accomplish its mission. Please join with us and vote to support our children on **March 13th**.

Parking Laws

Idaho State parking laws state that no person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection, within 30 feet upon the approach to any stop sign or yield sign, and within 15 feet of a hydrant. Please obey these parking laws, especially when along Main Street, where parking close to an intersection makes it difficult to see when turning onto the highway.




Lions Announce Locust Blossom Theme



FOOD BANK

The Good Samaritan Food Bank began in 1985 at the Methodist Church in Kendrick, ID. having clothes and food to give to people in need. Kendrick's Primeland and Palouse Cares of Moscow give monetary gifts, University of Idaho donated surplus food thru Palouse Cares. Winco Foods donates day old bread and Phil's Family Food donates vegetables. The community has been a big supporter of the Food Bank


