## Locust Blossom Festival Grand Marshals

Dale and Patti Silflow, the Locust Blossom Parade Grand Marshals representing Kendrick, have been leaders in our community, the farming community and Nez Perce County for years. Both have lived here all their lives.

Dale grew up on a farm in the Leland area that he now farms. In fact he leased 65 acres when he was still in high school to start his farming career. He attended the University of Idaho for 1 1/2 years before the National Guard Unit he joined was activated and he served one year in Vietnam. When he returned, his Dad needed help on the farm so he started farming. He farms with their son, Brian, and they have a commercial size grain, pulse and hay farm along with a herd of cattle.

Patti attended the University of Idaho and obtained a B.S degree in 1973 in Home Economic Education and a minor in science. She taught one year in Kootenai High School in Harrison before returning to Kendrick.

The couple were married in 1974. They have two children and 5 grand-children. They are very active in the Cameron Emanuel Lutheran Church, where Dale sings in the choir and is currently serving as president of the

Church Council.

Dale served 6 years on the Idaho Pea and Lentil Assn, 12 years on the Nez Perce County Soil and Water Conservation Board, 17 years on the County Fair Board, and is currently on the County Animal Damage Control Board. Patti has been a member of the Quilting Group since it started 12 years ago, a member of the Hill and Valley Garden Club for over 40 year and served as treasurer for 20 years, served on the U of I Family and Consumer Science Alumni Board for 8 year including two years as chairman, and is on the Nez Perce County Election Board. Patti has extensive experience with the Kendrick Memorial Pool. She served 7 years as a Life Guard in her youth and was vice-president of the Save Our Pool Committee that raised funds and planned repairs to open the pool seven years ago.

Both were 4-H Club leaders for about 17 years and were nominated as Lewiston Chamber of Commerce Outstanding Farm Citizen award in 2004.

Dale enjoys the challenge of farmer, "you learn something new every day. There some many new tools and technological advances to keep up with. I can't even think of doing anything else, it is so challenging."

The Locust Blossom festival has been part of their lives "forever." Patti works on the Flower Show. Dale has been part of the all night meat cooking, preparation and servicing crew for over 20 year. Their selection as Grand Marshals is sort of a family of honor. His Mom, three aunts and an uncle have recently been Grand Marshals. Patti's Mom and Dad, Bob and Betty Watts, where Grand Marshals years ago and her Dad was one of the organizers of the Lions Club, the first Locust Blossom Festival and the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance group.

In addition to being Grand Marshal, Richard will be joining his Kendrick High School graduating class's 50 year anniversary. Vicki's graduating class will have their 50th year celebration next year. They met when they were in the 5th grades and next year will also be their 50th wedding anniversary.

Both are natives of the Kendrick Juliaetta area. They have lived in Juliaetta for the past 40 years.

Richard went to work for Boeing in the Seattle area after high school graduation. The next year, after Vicki graduated they were married. Within a year Richard was drafted into the Army, serving a year in Vietnam. After leaving the Army Richard attended Spokane Community College for two years and he said "they followed where the air craft repair business took us." He joined Gustin Aviation in Lewiston 40 years ago and since he still enjoys aircraft repair work, he can't think of retiring.

Vicki decided her profession in the 3rd Grade. She spent 33 years in what she calls "the hair business" in Kendrick. She owned and operated VJ's Beauty Bar on Main Street in Kendrick.

Both Richard and Vicki are active in the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community. Richard was a volunteer for the Juliaetta Fire Department for 20 years and for the J-K EMT Ambulance for 13 years. Vicki has been involved in most Juliaetta activities for years and is starting her 3rd four-year term on the City Council. Both area active in the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church. She just completed a term as chairman of the Church Council and is a past president of the regional (Idaho and Eastern Washington) church women's organization.

Vicki is very community oriented. She grew up in the Norwegian community near the Bethany Lutheran Church. Her father and uncle farmed the Halseth family farm, a pioneer farm of Big Bear Ridge. She said, "I really like living in the Juliaetta-Kendrick community. The people really care about having the schools, business and individuals succeed. In fact, when I have had any problem, they really help me"

The couple have two married sons, and two grandchildren, which they enjoy visiting. They enjoy camping, motor biking and ATV riding, especially in the McCormick Ridge area.

Both have attended most of the Locust Blossom Festivals, in fact in recent years, Richard has been at the head of the parade as part of the VFW Color Guard.

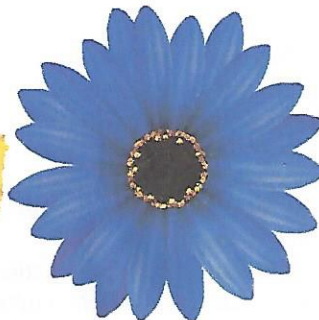

## Hill & Valley Garden Club Flower Show!

Many visitors from the surrounding areas look forward to the annual flower show sponsored by Hill & Valley Garden Club during the Locust Blossom Festival. Everyone is invited to enter the exhibit. There are two categories: Artistic Design and Horticulture.

To enter the Design category you need not have grown your plant material or flowers. The rules call for no artificial flowers, foliage, fruit or vegetables; and no flags or religious icons. Designs are limited to 20 inches in width and depth. Accessories are permitted. To maintain the attractiveness of the show, wilted material may be replaced from an exhibit following judging.

### This year's categories for Artistry in Bloom are:

#### *"Splashes of Spring"*

a traditional arrangement.  
Eligible for Tricolor Award.

#### *"Pretty in Pink"*

Choice of plant material.  
Eligible for Designers Choice Award

#### *"Paradise in Greens"*

using all green plant material.

#### *"Dried & True"*

using all dry plant material.  
Eligible for Award of Distinction

#### *"La Petit Artistry"*

small design not to exceed 8 inches

in height, width and depth, using fresh or dried plant material.

Eligible for Petite Award.

#### *"Fairy Gardens"*

Any size not to exceed 24"

Award of Design Excellence may be awarded to the overall top design; and one Best of Show may be awarded.

We encourage youth to enter in any or all divisions!

Horticultural exhibits must be entered in a clear glass container. A guide will be posted on the front window of the Grange for full instructions. Within this category, you must have grown what you exhibit. Youth are encouraged to enter fairy gardens, bucket gardens, house plants, anything!

At our March meeting, Maria Garvey, a Master Gardener, gave an excellent presentation on bee preservation.

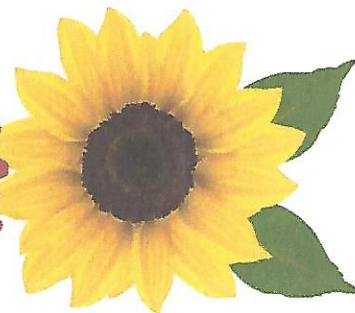
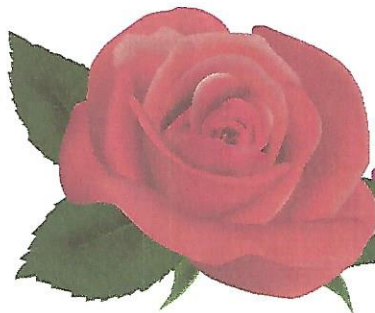
## Hill & Valley Garden Club: Youth Gardening Grants

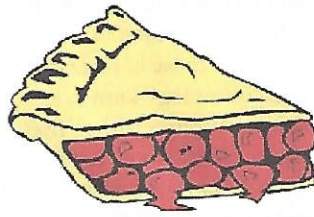

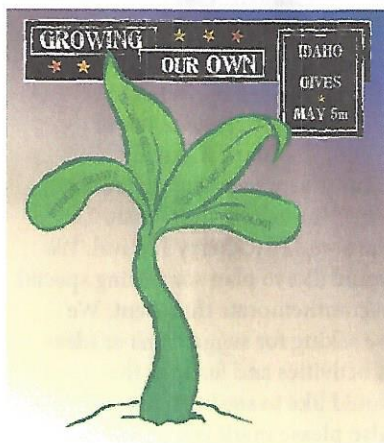

## Juliaetta Elementary School Principal's Report

annual supplemental levy.

Our parents and community members consistently step-up whenever we need you. We truly love the communities we serve, and feel so honored to have the trust you place in us to teach your children.

We have adopted a new curriculum at JES for the 2016-2017 School Year After months of research and comparing curriculum materials from a variety of publishers, the teachers and principal at Juliaetta Elementary School came to a consensus decision to recommend adopting the Houghton-Mifflin-Harcourt Journeys Common Core Language Arts Curriculum (K-6, 2017 edition) to our School Board Trustees. The Board approved the purchase and the new curriculum will be implemented this fall.

HMH Journeys Common Core Language Arts is fully aligned with the Idaho common core state standards and will provide our teachers with the leading-edge, instructional tools they need to help them meet all of our learning performance goals for many years to come. Our old language arts curriculum materials were adopted about ten years ago. Not only are they outdated, they are also falling apart. Ladies and gentlemen... Hold on to your hats and fasten your safety belts! At the start of the next school year, we will pass into a whole new era of exciting instruction and learning achievement at Juliaetta Elementary School!

### Third Grade Fish Hatchery Field Trip

On Tuesday, April 12th Mrs. Cannon and her 3rd grade students toured Dworshak Dam and Dworshak National Fish Hatchery in Orofino where they participated in an open house event. This included some hands on experience for the students spawning steelhead salmon and observing how the hatchery works to increase the number of fish returning to our local rivers and streams.

With your support, we are able to continue providing the excellent academic and extra-curricular programs for which Kendrick Jt. School District is known.

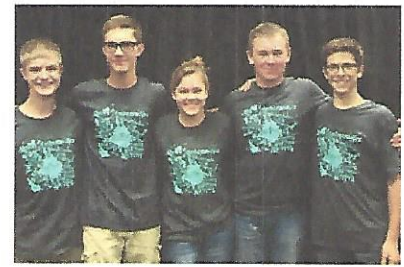
### Great News!! Kendrick Jt. School District has just been awarded a second five-year 21st Century Grant.

This grant will provide federal funds for our before-school and after-school programs for the children who attend Juliaetta Elementary School starting this summer, running through the next school year, and the four years beyond. The grant provides enough financial support to guarantee free services for all the families who choose to participate. Our special appreciation goes to School Board Trustee Shelby Silflow, Kindergarten Teacher Angie Tweit, First Grade Teacher Amy Morgan, and Special Education Instructional Aide Connie Hedler for dividing up the work of researching and writing the 21st Century grant application and bringing these federal dollars back to our school district. We remember from our prior experience with this grant that there is a great need in our communities for these before- and after- school programs for our children. We are very excited to be able to provide these services again. We will be sending out additional information about these programs very soon.

**SPRING TESTING:** Our 3rd grade through 12th grade students have begun taking the Idaho Standards Achievement Test (ISAT). These grade level tests have been developed

by the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium, a bipartisan, state-led group which has developed assessments aligned to the Common Core State Standards in English language arts and math. The consortium's executive director, Joe Wilhoft, wrote an article for the Thomas B. Fordham Institute entitled, "Smarter Balanced Assessments: A big moment for our schools." In the article, he summarizes the history of these tests.

- The SBAC is more than just a once-a-year test, it is a system with three components: Digital Library, Interim Assessments, and Summative Assessments.
- The Digital Library consists of professional development materials to improve the quality of information collected through daily classroom activities aligned to the Common Core standards.
- The Smarter Balanced Digital Library provides Idaho educators with professional development materials and instructional resources aligned to the Common Core State Standards and the Smarter Balanced assessment system.
- These computer-based tests help Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick Junior/Senior High School evaluate how well our students perform by enabling us to compare how we do with students from other schools across the nation.
- The ISAT empowers families by providing them with a clear indication of how well their children are progressing toward mastering the academic knowledge and skills necessary for college and career readiness.



## LCYAC Youth Ambassadors

The LCYAC Youth Ambassadors representing the KJ7 area (Layne Harris, Emily Groseclose, Logan Blair, Cade Warner and Frank Newman) have completed the first phase in their effort to support the development of a volunteer network for the KJ7 area. They met with community leaders to discuss a plan for connecting youth with volunteer opportunities sponsored by local organizations, and identified an existing website that could provide a suitable interface.

The Ambassadors have now entered the second phase of their development effort, by generating a calendar of volunteer opportunities that commonly arise in our community. There are 3 additional steps that they plan to complete before the end of the school year:

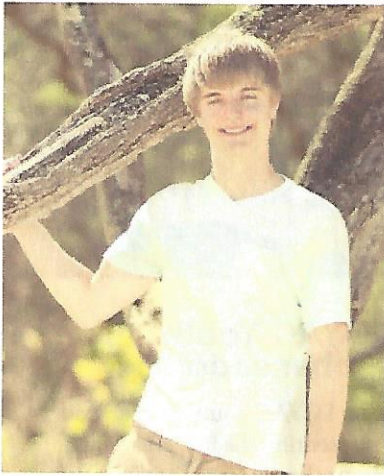
Create an informational video for community members and organization leaders explaining how groups can advertise volunteer opportunities or post them to the web-based forum, and how volunteers can find activities that interest them.

Train their peers at KHS about using the volunteer network; encourage them to volunteer; and gather their insights about volunteering.

Create a mentoring opportunity at the elementary school during the 1st or 2nd week of May, to provide a "giving back" opportunity for students in Grades K-6.

## **An Interview with Layne Harris, Youth Ambassador**

**CN: How many years have you been on the Latah County Youth Advocacy Council?**

Layne: I have participated in the Latah County Youth Advocacy Council for 3 years. I had originally anticipated 4 years, but it was shortened because of my early graduation.

**CN: What is the purpose of the council?**

Layne: The council serves as a foundation for youth all around the county to better themselves with the knowledge or experience of being (and becoming) drug free. We do this by offering educational programs in the schools, such as the one we recently completed in the elementary school where we took the second half of the day to individually educate the classes (3rd -6th grade) about the importance of abstaining from drugs and tobacco, as well as alcohol. We also use our presence to offer events (such as our talent show, ice skating, and movie nights) that serve as drug free alternatives to other social events that may not be as safe.

**CN: Why would you encourage other youth to participate?**

Layne: I believe that this program is one of the most effective in our region; the information and experience we provide is paramount to the truthfully limited guidance we (as students) receive in our health classes. By participating, you not only better yourself, you also better your school and community.

**CN: What has been the best part of your experience?**

Layne: The people. I have met so many kind and enthusiastic people through this organization, and I meet more and more every day. You are able to see exactly who the leaders in each of the communities are, because you surround yourself with them every day. All of this would be impossible without the guidance and effort that Erin McCall, Polly Taylor-Dennler, and Debi Dockins have put forth to make this organization possible.

**CN: What has been the most difficult part of your experience?**

Layne: The only thing that I would consider remotely difficult is the amount of time required for all of the projects and programs. It can get a bit stressful at times, but there are always people to help you through whatever problems you may encounter.

**CN: Do you see this making a difference in the lives of KHS students?**

Layne: Absolutely! It's very interesting to be able to witness the change from both perspectives, as a student, and as a mentor. I can go from educating my school, to being a part of the population and witnessing the effect of the information. All around, it is a very rewarding experience.

In the City of Kendrick Ordinance 707 in Section 11: Animal Waste: it states: The owner or keeper of any animal shall immediately remove any solid excreta deposited by any animal which he or she owns or keeps on public walks and streets, in any park or other recreation area, or on private property. Failure to remove such waste shall constitute a nuisance and the owner or keeper of such animal who knowingly fails to remove such waste shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. Also remember, dogs in the city limits are to be licensed.
