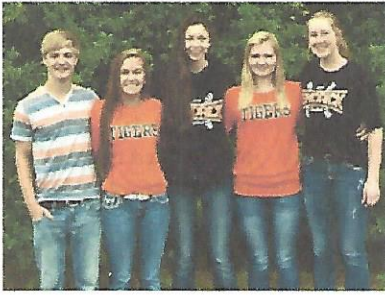

Kendrick Business Professionals Attend State Leadership Conference in Boise

As spring approaches, members of the Kendrick Business Professionals of America (BPA) chapter prepare for the National Leadership Conference in Boston, Massachusetts. At the State Leadership Conference in Boise, Idaho, chapter members attended their events at Boise State University either presenting speeches in front of judges or taking written tests. The eleven state qualifiers also went to dinner at Barbacoa and Dave & Busters, along with shopping at the Boise Towne Square Mall and attending the annual BPA dance. "It was super fun, we got to meet a lot of new people. I keep in touch with people I met my freshman year," senior Kadence Lanier claims referring to the State Conference.

As for qualifying for nationals, seniors Layne Harris, Samantha Schroeder, Holli Heinen, and Kadence Lanier qualified as ambassador torch award winners. Torch Awards is a program in which you collect points for completing certain activities in different categories. Torch Award Categories include Leadership, Service, Cooperation, Knowledge, Patriotism, and lastly, Love, Hope, Faith. By completing the requirements of each category, members of BPA are able to qualify for advancement to the state and national level. The Torch Awards Program helps frame and guide a BPA member's leadership and service to their chapter and community. The seniors participated in a number

of community activities; serving at the annual Pat Rush Benefit, helping clean the Kendrick Grange Hall, taking part in "going green" activities, etc. And these aren't just projects that you can complete in a few months - these seniors have been working to achieve this internship since their freshman year. "It's really cool that it's finally happening, since we've been working towards it for four years."

As for qualifying in their actual event, junior Harley Cope was the only one from the Kendrick chapter that was recognized. Cope placed second in her event, "Economic Research Individual," at the state level which qualified her for the National Leadership Conference in Boston. "This is my second year doing this event, so I knew that only the top two [competitors] qualified for nationals. I placed sixth last year, so I worked really hard on my presentation because I really wanted to make it to Boston," Cope commented. In said event, you are given a specific topic to research and write a paper on. The paper is pre-submitted, and when at the regional, state, or national competition you give a speech to a panel of judges showing your research and outlining your paper. "It was a lot more fun this year, too, because of the topic. Last year I had to write about the National School Lunch Program, but I wasn't really into that. This year our topic was social security, and that was really fun to research and form an opinion on. Plus I love politics, so it was super cool to be able to incorporate politicians' plans into my paper."

While on the east coast, the students will participate in cultural and educational activities, such as visiting the Museum of Natural History, the Museum of Fine Arts, the Boston Common, the Paul Revere House, the Boston Public Library, Legal Seafood, and Fenway Park. These are just a few of the many attractions that the chapter members will visit. Senior Samantha Schroeder says, "It's really exciting because growing up in our area, we

don't normally get to experience these cultural things. Plus Boston is on the other side of the country, so there's a lot of traveling and that's another thing not a lot of kids around here experience."

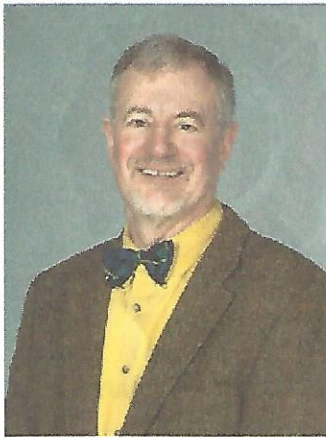
The club was pleased to accept new members this month including Fritz Fliger, Bill Warren, Gary & Marilyn Fix, and Amy Harris.

We have been training during the fall & winter on fire behavior, pump operations and doing maintenance on our equipment. In the coming two months we will be doing extrication training and rope rescue along with wildland classes. The reason we do wildland classes is to be able to protect our impact areas around the town and help ensure our firefighters safety. Rope rescue training and extrication will aid us in helping the Ambulance with motor vehicle accident calls. Anyone interested in volunteering to help out is welcome to come by on the first and third Wednesday in Kendrick at the Fire Hall and the 2nd and 4th Wednesday in Juliaetta. 2nd Wednesday at the Fire Hall in Juliaetta and the 4th Wednesday at the First Bank of Pizza to receive any of this valuable training consider joining and helping out.

Open burning ends on May 10th and the closed fire season continues through October 20th

In Kendrick we follow the Department of Lands and their rules. There is no open burning in Kendrick during the dates of May 10th and October 20th. In Juliaetta you may request a burn permit from the city hall and one may be issued if conditions allow it.

Visitors were presented with copies of the "fresh-off-the-press" museum guide that was prepared for the

New items at the museum include a mail sorting table and items donated from Red Cross Pharmacy. We now have tee shirts and butcher aprons for sale with a historical picture depicting the early kitchen of Mary Ameliing Deobald on American Ridge.

Work continues on various projects including new electrical service, stairwell renovation, and the continuous updating of exhibits.

Pharmacy Remodel Started

Kendrick has been very blessed to have a pharmacy which has served this area's patrons for over a century. Longtime owner, Dave Clayton, operated the pharmacy with his wife Barbra for 37 years. Later his son, Doug took over and operated the pharmacy until his untimely death in 2014. To have a family business operating within the same family for nearly 60 years is quite a record for a small town.

In the summer of 2015, Gritman became aware of the possibility that the town might lose its pharmacy and stepped up to prevent that from happening. Gritman cares about the Kendrick community and is committed to providing access to health care services (pharmacy services are a vital part of healthcare)

Gritman has purchased the building and is currently remodeling

it. They will then lease the space to Idaho State University, who will own and operate the pharmacy out of that location. The pharmaceutical needs of the community will be served through Bengal Pharmacy using tele-pharmacy and a licensed technician. A pharmacist would be able to oversee the entire pharmacy, interact with patients, and distribute medications via video conferencing and other technological services. This program has seen success in two other communities in Idaho:

Challis and Arco. This is a "win-win" situation for Kendrick. We get to retain the beautiful, historic building on our Main Street as well as have the convenience of being able to fill prescriptions locally.

Gritman will keep a limited supply of antibiotics and medications for illness available at the Clinic.

While this arrangement may present a temporary inconvenience for customers during the remodel, Gritman's long range goal is to serve the patrons of this area conveniently and economically.

THE PASTOR'S CORNER

"...When it is evening you say, 'It will be fair weather, for the sky is red'; and in the morning, 'It will be foul weather today, for the sky is red and threatening.' Hypocrites! You know how to discern the face of the sky, but you cannot discern the signs of the times."

- Matthew 16:1-3

In Christ's day there was no means of forecasting the weather further than just a day or so. We now have the ability to monitor weather worldwide and read patterns and study all the factors that produce the weather. Some do a rather commendable job predicting weather even months in advance. Mankind has devoted much research and study and effort to acquire this ability, and much money has gone into such study and research. We are so eager to be able to make plans in advance by seeking to know what sort of weather is coming. Oh, yes, we are sometimes fooled and we know that this science is not 100% reliable, but close enough to make it possible to at least make plans.

Jesus made a very important and valid point. That point is much more valid and appropriate today in the light of such advances in weather forecasting. Scientists seem much more intent on learning how to make these forecasts than we Christians do to discern "the signs of the times". Our carefulness is lacking at a time when it is far more crucial to see these things than it has ever been, and especially more crucial than it is to know the weather on any given day. With events of the world bringing about the apparent fulfillment of prophecy, how much more vital is it for us to be able

to understand what these "signs" are foretelling? Believing that the antichrist and false prophet are likely on the doorstep and about ready to step into their prophetic role leading to the final moments before the end of this age, where are those who will make that supreme effort and personal sacrifice to obtain the understanding of these "signs of the times"? There seems to be a major disconnect with the only source of that ability and those who would propose to forecast it. As in the days of Jesus, their ability to recognize the signs that would identify Christ was sadly lacking because of their failure to walk according to the truth. So, likewise, we have brilliant scholars today who think research and study will bring them the answers they seek, but fail to recognize that this truth is only obtained by revelation from the Spirit of God. They have slipped far from being able to obtain such revelation. This is only obtainable on your knees and in your heart as you seek earnestly to walk in obedience to the Word and the Spirit. We should put as much effort into discerning the signs of the times as scientists of the world do to forecast the weather, don't you think?

Starlings Return



This time of year and interesting phenomenon occurs. Starlings return to start their new families. The beautiful male will arrive first and chose the nest. He then sets to work carrying twigs, tufts, feathers, leaves (you name it, if it is soft they will use it.) Soon he sings and attracts the female. She will complete the nest, often throwing out materials or completely remodeling what he started.

This bird is a member of the mina family and is known for its ability to mimic other bird sounds and human words. They are a very sociable bird, even to the point that the male may have more than one female companion.

Starlings travel in huge flocks and "murmurate" when the flock is threatened. They whirl and dive, making exquisite patterns in the sky. The enemy becomes confused and cannot find its prey. It is exciting to witness a murmuration which usually involves hundreds of birds.

While nesting, the female and male are both responsible for feeding the hatchlings. It takes 21 days until the new bird leaves the nest. Sometimes they raise two families in one season.

While many consider them a pest, they do their amount of good with ridding the area of insects and grub worms.

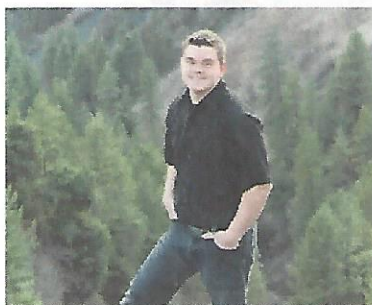

I will be attending the University of Montana in the fall. I would like to major in Elementary Education and Special Education. My career goal is to become an elementary school teacher.



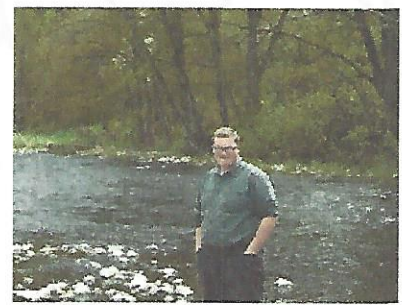
Jarred Kasper

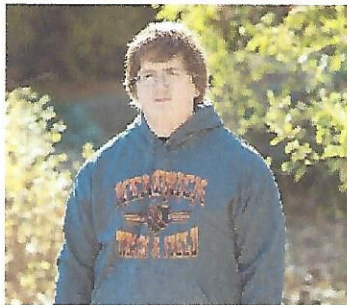
Timothy Scheline


