Dinner tickets are \$30 per person and can be purchased at Archie's, Latah Credit Union, or the Kendrick Liquor Store.



The Cost of Printing Your Free Newsletter

\$7270 is what it could have cost in 2017 for the paper and ink for the “What’s Happening” newsletter.

We do everything possible to keep the cost down but it still adds up. One of the ways we try to keep the cost down is by using the 5% reward program through Staples. With that program we saved \$1024.

We compare the price of cartridges with other places and take advantage of Staples 10% price match guarantee. These are two things we do but you can also help us keep our cost down. Each empty cartridge you give us saves us \$2 when making a purchase. That may not seem like much but with all the cartridges we received last year it totaled \$594. With applying these savings we were able to bring the \$7270 down to \$5652, a saving of \$1618. We appreciate your help in keeping our cost down in the past but for the last few months we have only received a handful of cartridges. Please do not think those one or two cartridges don’t make a difference, for those one or two last year were a part of that \$594 savings. -Larry Haylett



Marek Ranch Receives Century Farm Award

On June 9, 2018, the Marek's held their annual Marek Hootenanny at their home. In conjunction with ICARE the local cancer fundraiser, the Marek's were awarded the Century Ranch award from the Idaho Historical Society. The purpose of a Century Farm award is to honor families who have lived on their ranch/farm for 100 years. We are happy to announce that with the silent auctions and quilt raffle nearly \$1400 was raised to help local cancer patients. The local band, Last Ride, provided the musical entertainment. They have volunteered their talents, for the last three years to this event.

Unlike most recipients, the Mareks were awarded the plaque and sign for a ranch, not a farm. Also unusual, according to Mr. Bennett, the inheritance came through the female lineage, not the males of the family. He told us as far as he can recall ours was the first out of some 400 awards in Idaho where this is true. Less than one half dozen century awards have been given in Clearwater County to date.

In 1888 George and Laura Marlatt Crabb homesteaded on what is now known as Teakean Butte. Laura was a school teacher. They raised three daughters: Altha, Daisy, and Viah. Altha and Viah were school teachers in many of the local rural schools. Laura Stage Adamson, Daisy's daughter, was also a longtime school teacher first in this region and later in the Kooskia schools. All three are listed in the book School Bells and Ink Wells. Following in their footsteps, I also have a B. S. in Elementary Education from LCSC.

My father, Charles R. (Bud) Adamson operated the ranch from the late 1950's until his death. Tom and I assisted with the livestock including raising horses, cattle, and mules from 1972-2014. The ranch is now leased to Dale Wolff for pasture ground and Ben Hasenhoerl for the farm ground. Teakean Bute is the main site of many repeater stations for cell phones, and internet as is Bonneville Power, etc. What started out as a "rock pile that wouldn't support a goat" is now considered a national security site.

Daisy Stage purchased land that joined the original homestead. Bud and Laura Adamson also purchased additional acreage. Laura inherited property from her mother Daisy and her Aunt Viah. Gayle inherited Altha Rathbone's share of the homestead. After Bud and Laura passed away, the Marek's inherited all of the properties.

Some people have asked why not sons in this mix? Altha and Charley Rathbone had a son Early but he made railroad his career, and he and his family did not reside at the ranch. Viah Dancy Dodge had a son Lloyd Dancy, but Air Force was his career, and he and his family did not live at the ranch either. Laura had a brother Ralph Stage, but he was killed in a logging accident at age 29. He and Torah had a son Frank, but he had no children and is deceased. There are no family members named Stage in this area to carry on that part of the family name. Laura had two daughters, Sandi and myself but Sandi did not stay in this area, except hit and miss for most of her life, and now lives in Montana. Tom and I have two sons, Jake and Benn and their families. Both live in the Southwick area. We have five biological grandchildren and three step-grandchildren.

Pastor's Corner

In the book of Mark, Chapter 9, we read about a man who brings his son to Jesus for healing. He had initially taken him to the Disciples for healing but they couldn't heal the son. So now he stands before Jesus with his son seeking healing in order to make the son whole again.

The first thing that occurs is for Jesus to lament to them, "O Faithless generation, how long shall I be with you?"(v19) This could easily apply to our current generation, "O faithless generation". It doesn't take much looking around to see how lost this generation is from God.

But, then Jesus has compassion for the father and the son, "Bring him to me."(v.19) Jesus sees the pain the son is in as well as the pain it is causing the father. Jesus then asks questions of the father concerning the condition and length of illness the boy has suffered.

Then Jesus speaks the key words in the whole story, "If you can believe, all things are possible to him who believes." (V23) Jesus can and will work miracles for anyone who chooses to believe in Him and will come to him with their broken pieces. It's like putting together a puzzle. I have a daughter who, when she was younger, loved to put puzzles together. As it became too complicated she would break or cut off the little nubs to make the piece fit. The problem with that was although the piece would then fit, the puzzle didn't look like it was intended to look. We tend to cut off pieces and make notches in our lives in an effort to make the pieces go together. The pieces may fit at the time but the ending result is far from what God intended for our lives. In this story the father cries out to Jesus, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief." (V24) He knows Who can put his son back together and make his life whole again. This also would bring wholeness to the entire family as broken lives effect our loved ones, friends and family.

Ultimately Jesus heals the son and he is made whole again. The Disciples didn't lack the power to heal the son, the father lacked faith in Jesus. That's where many of us fall short. Jesus can put any person's life back together. There's nothing he can't forgive and no one so broken they can't be healed. Jesus can take all our broken pieces and make something beautiful out of our lives. He knows how the puzzle pieces go together. He doesn't cut corners. He can make us whole again. We just need to have faith and ask. Jesus wants only the very best for us and for us to refuse that best we are only hurting ourselves and those who love us. It only takes a prayer, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief."

News from the City of Juliaetta

Rural Recycling Program Changes

The City of Juliaetta has recently received this notice from Latah Sanitation. They have not provided a definite date when these changes will be implemented.

The Chinese Government imposed new regulations and is no longer accepting co-mingled recyclables. This has made an enormous impact on the cost to process these recyclables. Therefore changes need to be made to the rural recycling boxes for efficiencies and to avoid the increased fees.

Plastics and glass will no longer be accepted in the boxes. You are encouraged to recycle these items at Moscow Recycling Center.

There will be a box that accepts aluminum and tin cans, mixed in one compartment. The other compartment will only accept mixed waste paper and no cardboard. All cardboard is to be recycled in its own box, clearly marked and not in the mixed paper slot. All material to be recycled must be removed from plastic bags and not tied together. For your information, new signs will be placed on the boxes to reflect the changes. Instructions must be followed to avoid the recycling material being landfilled because of contamination, which will increase cost.

Recently the recycling boxes have been contaminated with unacceptable items. If this continues the boxes may be locked up inside the bulky waste site and only available on the scheduled Saturdays in our community.

Fall Clean-Up

October is clean-up month at the bulky waste site. On October 6 & 20 the site will also accept household trash and plastic items. Please remember electronic and hazardous waste is never accepted at the bulky waste site.

Upcoming Office Closures

City Hall will be closed Monday, September 3, for Labor Day and Monday, October 8, to observe Columbus Day. We will also close Wednesday, September 12, while we attend a conference.

City Council Meetings

Upcoming City Council meetings will be held on Tuesday, September 11 and Tuesday, October 9. Agendas are posted in the window at City Hall one week before each meeting, as well as at cityofjuliaetta.com. The public is always welcome to attend these monthly meetings. Remember, if you have an issue you would like to have added to the agenda, you must contact City Hall at least 48 hours in advance.

Life Skills Classes

January 16th> Cooking 2. We'll continue from the first class and revisit some of what we learned in the first class in case you didn't attend that class. In this class we'll be actually cooking. We'll answer questions about baking.

February 20> Household Budgeting. Making a budget that's within your means. Determining wants from needs. Check writing and keeping a check book.

March 20th> Budgeting 2. Counting change, job seeking, either for a new job or stepping up from an old one. How to interview, questions to ask. How to present yourself for an interview.

April 17th> Sewing 2. Following easy instructions. Perhaps making a quilt block, following a pattern, Taking in a garment or shortening a skirt. Jazzing up a sweatshirt for your kids.

We hope you will come learn with us, ask questions and learn something new. These are times for the whole family to come, so feel free to bring your kids or teens as there is something for everyone. Perry Shove

JK Ambulance team member Perry Shove has service in his blood. Both of his parents served on JK Ambulance in the 80's and 90's, and Perry has been serving our community since 2003 as a member of JK Ambulance. He is currently the President of the board.

In 2003, Perry heard that the ambulance was low on members, and following in the footsteps of his parents, he volunteered to be a driver. But it didn't take long for the team to convince Perry that he could do more. He took a first responder class and became an EMT in 2010. He followed that with an advanced EMT and finally, in 2012, he became a paramedic. Becoming a paramedic was difficult, with required hours of patient contact, time in the ER, and more. He jokes that it took "\$10,000 and 2 years of my life" to become a paramedic. But that work has paid off. Along with volunteering for the KJ ambulance, Perry works for Moscow PACT (Palouse Area Care and Transport) EMS. His volunteer adventure as a driver 15 years ago has turned into a career.

JK Ambulance members are all volunteers, but they take their work seriously. Perry says his favorite part of working on the ambulance crew is the camaraderie of the group. "You get to know people in stressful situations," Perry says. And that stress creates strong bonds among the ambulance crew. "We're tight." Perry says. "It's tough to do CPR on someone you know," and working on the ambulance in a small town means that you will probably be working on someone you know—maybe your neighbor, your friend, or even a relative. Sometimes the closeness of the group is intimidating for newcomers, but JK ambulance is always looking for volunteers to help serve our community. "Experience is the bond," Perry says, so getting new people out on calls helps to bring them into the fold. Perry encourages people to get involved. "Don't give up" he says, if you want to become a part of the team.

Perry's wealth of experience means he has lots of interesting stories to tell, so the next time you see him around town, ask him about his life as a paramedic. It is clear that he loves being a part of the team that is so very important to the KJ community.



Billy Candler

Billy Candler may be the youngest member of the ambulance crew, but what he lacks in experience he more than makes up for in enthusiasm. His positive attitude and willingness to help others is inspiring.

Billy started working on the ambulance in January of 2018, but worked for the fire department for two years before that. He enjoyed his work with the fire department, but he realized that he wanted to be more involved. As a driver, he was only able to complete minimal tasks at the scenes, so he decided to continue his training. He obtained his CPR, AED, and first aid certifications, and even went on for further training in ladders/ventilation, hazmat, and short-handed fire tactics.

A 2017 graduate of Kendrick High School, Billy is quite busy when he isn't out on calls. He is a student at LCSC pursuing a business management degree with a marketing emphasis. He also works full time with his dad at AllWeather Wood selling lumber. He enjoys spending time with his family, and he plans to get a place of his own in the Kendrick/Juliaetta area so that he can continue to work on the ambulance crew and serve his community.

In 2015, Billy's cousin and best friend, Marine CPL Joshua Barron, was killed in an osprey crash. Billy was humbled by the way citizens of Kendrick and Juliaetta rallied around his family, and he sees his service on the ambulance as a way to give back to the community. He says his favorite part of the job is seeing people "back home, healthy and happy."

Billy loves being part of the ambulance team. The crew has made him feel comfortable from the moment he walked into his first meeting. He calls the crew his family, and he appreciates the way they work hard but also have fun. The training is hard work, he says, but he recommends that anyone interested in working on the ambulance crew come to a meeting because the "effort pays off in the end." Individuals must be 16 years old to sign up for the fire department and 18 to work on the ambulance.

look as if they were constructed to match cartoons.

Their ragged crests, distinctive markings, out-of-proportion big heads and heavy bills are unlike any birds other than kingfishers. Both sexes have slate gray heads and backs, white collars and bellies and gray chest bands. The female has a chestnut band below the gray one. Adults are roughly robin-sized with a length of 11 to 13.8" and a wingspan of 18.9 to 22.8".

Kingfishers are found across our continent but are not evenly dispersed. There are fewer found in the central states, but during migration (from Alaska and across Canada to Central America), they may overfly any part of the country. In areas with year-around open water, kingfishers may not migrate at all. You may see a kingfisher in our area any month of the year.

They are extremely specific in territorial needs: clear water with nearby high perches and earth or sandy banks for nesting tunnels. A typical territory is just over half a mile of stream which is vigorously defended against other kingfishers.

The presence of nesting sites is critical to this habitat. Man's propensity for rearranging the landscape has allowed the kingfisher population to expand by providing gravel pits and road cuts suitable for tunnel digging. The nest is positioned from 1 to 8 feet from the entrance of an upward-sloping tunnel. A single clutch of eggs is produced each year.

Young kingfishers have unusually acidic stomachs. The dinners provided by the parents are completely digested, including fish scales, bones and arthropod shells. This chemistry changes by the time the young leave the nest. Adult birds regurgitate pellets of indigestible stomach contents. These accumulate under favorite perches and have been studied to determine diet. Food is primarily fish and other aquatic creatures, occasional quail chicks, and even berries. The fish are caught during dives launched from the aforementioned perches and brought back to be eaten.

The belted kingfisher's call is a loud, non-musical rattle given in flight. You may hear the bird before you see it. It is worth taking time to find the source of the racket for a little nature study, as this bird's appearance and behavior are as interesting as they are unique.
