## KHS Students Enjoy Pitching In During First "Community Building Day"

Student efforts highly praised by local residents and organizations

On Friday of Homecoming Week, Kendrick High School Students in Grades 7 through 12 took to the streets, trails, parks and community buildings of Juliaetta and Kendrick to engage in their first Community Building Day. Decked out in their finest Tiger Pride attire, students enthusiastically contributed their energy and hard work toward improving our community.

Homecoming week is always full of spirit-raising activities for local students, in anticipation of the Homecoming Game and Dance. The first Community Building Day gave students an opportunity to spread some of that enthusiasm around, while building a sense of participation and investment in community life.

With guidance, organization and snacks provided by local volunteers, students washed windows, transplanted a large tree, trimmed branches, planted bulbs, raked leaves, swept streets, mopped floors, picked up litter, edged lawns, cleaned up flower beds, and helped local organizations and enterprises with various other maintenance tasks.

Participating students expressed very positive feelings about the experience—many said they loved it, and would eagerly to do it again. Several football players, who were happily washing windows, sweeping leaves and cleaning up wood and debris, commented that they liked giving back to the community that turns out to celebrate them every week.

Local residents were thrilled with the results, and happy to see students actively engaged in such a positive community effort. Lisa Ihms of Kups Koffee House raved, "I love this! I love this day!" Kendrick Juliaetta & 7 Ridges Education Board Member Tawnya Feldman said, "I loved the energy the kids' activity created... I was very proud of our students!" Sharon Harris of the Juliaetta-Kendrick Heritage Foundation said that students "did a marvelous job".

This effort was the fruit of a collaboration between the Kendrick Juliaetta & 7 Ridges Education Foundation and the administrators, staff and students of Kendrick Junior and Senior High School. Special thanks go to KHS staff and members of multiple community organizations who contributed by helping to organize and oversee student activities.

By all accounts, the event was an enormous success, and future Community Building Days will offer more chances for students to contribute their energy and enthusiasm in support of their community.

When Dana Magnuson joined the KJ Arts Committee in Kendrick, he made a personal goal of having the retaining wall behind the swimming pool painted into a mural. Dana and the Kendrick-Juliaetta Arts Committee met that goal October 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Peter and Rolf Goetzinger are brothers who make their living as artists. Their specialty is painting murals for large companies, some inside and some outside, water towers, public art, exhibits and sculpture pieces all across America. Unbelievably, they have some roots in Kendrick, which persuaded them to donate their time and talent for a beautiful wildlife mural at the swimming pool.

The Goetzingers' mother (Ina) and her family were German immigrants sponsored by Cameron Lutheran Church in the early 1950's. Their father (Albert) was also an immigrant from Germany and his family was sponsored by the Trinity Lutheran Church in Lewiston, Idaho. When Albert heard there were German girls living in Kendrick, he decided to come and meet them. He and Ina married and moved to Lewiston where Peter and Rolf were born and raised.

Initially, Rolf was interested in Architecture and Peter was interested in Physics. It wasn't long until both men knew their passion was art and pursued art degrees. Peter and Rolf are the artists behind the murals in Lewiston – the fish mural behind the water canoe exhibit on the bypass and the historical mural in the downtown area.

Rolf was in touch with the JK Arts Committee and drew up the mural example for approval. In between their other contracts, they found time to travel to Kendrick with the promise of a room at Locust Blossom Inn and meals from Archie's Place paid by the Arts Committee.

The new wildlife mural requires no maintenance and its durability is expected to exceed 25 years. -Kathy Jones

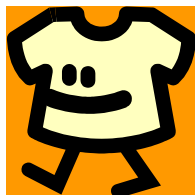

### Kendrick Volleyball Season Comes to a Close

The Kendrick High School volleyball team is quickly wrapping up an incredible season. This year, we put on the first ever Dig Pink match at KHS. The team created shirts with a "Dig for Rhonda" logo, in honor of our own breast cancer survivor, Rhonda Blair. We also celebrated our seniors on senior night: Rebecca Rickert, Jamie Britton, and Kendra Cannon will be greatly missed next year.

Off the court, the Tigers won an online contest with Molten company. As a prize, we received a total of 13 new Molten volleyballs and a feature in their advertising campaign. Check out Molten on facebook and look for the Tigers in their ads!

The Lady Tigers' regular season ended with a 10-2 record. Our only losses were to Logos, and those games were 5-set, hard-fought battles. As this newsletter heads to press, we are preparing for district tournaments, which will take place this weekend. The Tigers are hoping to make it to the state playoffs, but even if that doesn't happen, these girls have had an amazing season and should be very proud.

Down in the valley, things in Kendrick seem to be flowing smoothly so far this school year. As the Kendrick Tigers continue to be successful in academics, sports, music and extracurricular activities, they have many goals that they hope to accomplish this year.

Academically, Kendrick students are doing very well. The school is offering multiple classes that give opportunities to both learn and to have fun. For example, there is an environmental science class in which students are able to learn about sustainable living environments for fish and marine organisms. There are two dual credit English classes directed by Mrs. Ingalls (English 101 and 175), and a joint dual credit calculus class in which the Kendrick students cooperate with students from Genesee, Potlatch and Troy. Personally, my favorite class is the publishing and production class that the high school English teacher and Business teacher are combining to teach. In this class, we learn about the *Journalism Code of Ethics*, how to write a feature story, and the aspects of an article. Kendrick is also offering multiple IDLA courses for students that have scheduling conflicts or desire to become educated about subjects that the school does not offer.

When it comes to sports, the Tigers are looking solid for the fall season in both football and volleyball. In football, the boys are undefeated in the White Pine League. As for volleyball, the team ended 10-2 in league, losing only to the Logos Knights of Moscow.

The Business teacher, Mr. LeBlanc, is also the BPA (Business Professionals of America) advisor. Last year, more than two-thirds of everyone in BPA qualified for state in their events; and Kadence Lanier, Layne Harris, and Alec Henson were the three students that qualified for the national competition in Indianapolis, Indiana. This year, BPA hosted the 4<sup>th</sup> annual 3-on-3 Volleyball Tournament. .

Mrs. Ingalls is also the coordinator of the recently developed art club, where students are working on sustaining art in the school and community.

In Kendrick, the students continue to aim high, have good sportsmanship, and develop useful skills that will aid them in the future.

## Superintendent's Report

Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick Junior/Senior High School improve the quality of life in Juliaetta and Kendrick by educating and preparing our children for the challenges they will face in the future. We do this by designing lessons that target creative thinking and imagination. Our teachers follow a process:

In planning their lessons, they first identify the standards, content, topics, subtopics, concepts, and skills that will be the focus of the lesson.

They note the essential question in the unit and select the type of assessment they will use to gauge mastery.

They use creative questions to spark student inquiry. Students then generate their own questions using verbs that are posted around the classroom.

Our teachers serve as a resource in responding to the questions their students pose.

Through the course of their questioning, students learn to think creatively.

And at just the right moment our teachers move into the formal set-up of their lessons using their students' imaginations and original thinking in a collaborative learning process.

The goal of these lessons is for students to use their imagination combined with facts to compare and contrast the causes and effects they see in their daily lives.

An example will illustrate how this works. Imagine you, as the reader of this article, are a time traveler about to travel to Idaho in August 1805. You decide to visit the same area where you live now. What would you see? Use your imagination to describe it. Craft a letter to take with you as your journey. Describe what you know about this region a little more than 200 years ago. Make sure to write this letter in a way that makes the people living in Idaho in 1805 believe you are from a future time.

The Lewis and Clark expedition passed through this part of Idaho during August 1805. So, there is a rich historical literature to explore in nurturing this imaginative exercise. Exploring the past, looking for patterns, and developing critical thinking along the way, will help our children prepare for the challenges they will very likely face as they look to their own futures. It is an exciting time to be an educator and be a part of helping our children prepare.

## Principal's Report

The 6th grade students have had the opportunity to attend two Performing Arts presentations with other area schools this past month. Both of the performances were part of Festival Dance sponsored by the University of Idaho Youthreach Program. The first of the performances, called "A Moving Sound," was held at the University of Idaho Auditorium in the Administration Building. This presentation involved Taiwanese music performed by a five member instrumental band which travels around the world. The second performance was held at the Moscow High School Auditorium and was called "Excursions in Dance." This performance included eight professional dancers in the Repertory Dance Team (RDT) from Salt Lake City, Utah. Both performances broadened the students' knowledge of Fine and Performing Arts and gave them an opportunity to experience something culturally enriching, yet different from something they may normally attend. We live practically in the backyard of two great universities of higher learning, and it behooves us to enrich the educational experiences of our children as opportunities present themselves.

We have an outstanding PTO, and are so grateful for their generous gifts of volunteer time, effort, and financial resource. Whenever we have a need, we think PTO, and they always come through for us. Our PTO sponsors our special activity days: December 19<sup>th</sup> and June 3<sup>rd</sup>; and PTO pays the bills for our children to participate in the Missoula Children's Theatre, etc. These programs play an important role in meeting one of the six basic needs every child has at school: **the need for fun and enjoyment**. The other five needs are: Valued Purpose; Love and Belonging; Safety; Success; and Freedom and Independence. All of our teachers at JES were recently trained in the six needs. We are sincerely grateful for all our parents, teachers and community members who generously support our wonderful schools.

## Meet Jim Your Neighbor



Jim Lohman was born on the Potlatch Ridge family farm August 17, 1937. He went to grade school at Southwick School and graduated from KHS.

The Army drafted Jim when he was 18 years old. After basic training and medical training, Jim was transferred to Germany where he was assigned to the 139<sup>th</sup> Evacuation Hospital as an Army medic.

After two years in the Army, Jim got his discharge orders and was transported to New York harbor by ship. While on the ocean, they ran into a typhoon and were rerouted about Cape Horn. This caused them to be at sea three days longer than usual, and then blanket fog forced the ship to remain at sea for another two days. "We finally headed to land and the most inspiring sight I ever saw was the Statue of Liberty. We all saluted as our ship went by and I had goose bumps everywhere," said Jim.

Once in New York, Jim and some buddies went to an upscale restaurant where staff recognized their army uniform and provided a free meal. He was served a platter of rattlesnake. "It really does taste like chicken," Jim smiles.

Jim joined the Army Reserves with the Idaho National Guard in Orofino, Idaho with cousins, Fritz and Ronnie. In 1961, his unit was activated to Fort Lewis during the Berlin Crisis. He was promoted to Staff Sergeant and sent to Non-Commissioned Officer Training. "Those 8 weeks were an intense spit and shine experience. I slept with one eye open and one eye closed because we were often awakened for a five mile run at 2 AM or night compass training with grids and maps. I still use that army compass."

After Jim's final discharge, he worked for the Nez Perce County Road Department and retired from there in 1996 after 30 years of employment.

Community service is important to Jim. He has been a KHS Booster member for many years, current Board member and Meals on Wheels driver for the Kendrick Senior Citizen Center, member of the Lions Club, Lewiston American Legion member, past JK Ambulance driver, supporter of JK Newsletter and enthusiast of all Community events.

Jim was recently honored by several 4-H and FFA students for his many years of monetary donations towards fair animals. These youth expressed their thanks with a gift certificate at Kups Koffee House where he has his first coffee each morning. Jim invited these same youth back to the coffee shop during Homecoming week for a beverage of their choice- paid with his gift certificate!

## Juliaetta-Kendrick Heritage Foundation

It is all about the gift of history and memories! The massive restoration project on the Fraternal Temple building is a gift to the present and next generations. Kelly Emo, a Deary brick mason and contractor has continued this past month what he began last year. Power washing the building removed 100 years of accumulated dirt and moss. It was like removing the wrapping on a present not knowing what one will find! Additional damage and deterioration were exposed. Happily, this year’s work completed 75% of the critical repairs needed on the walls and the roof. 114 exterior cream-colored bricks were added to the building in places where bricks were missing. This brick is hard to find. We are in need of double that amount of brick for next year. Of course community funding for this project to continue in 2015 would be deeply appreciated. Kelly also improved the roof’s drainage system extending the life of the roof to 30 years. The roof top chimneystacks will receive attention in 2015.



The Grand Room museum is making huge strides thanks to Chris Kowrach. Kendrick and Juliaetta early 1900’s items are cleaned, cataloged, and tagged with informative tidbits of facts. The displays create a stroll down memory lane centered on Recreation



in the 1900’s, Home Items, RR items, Communication throughout the 1900’s, Early 1900’s Tool of a Trade, Early Logging, and Early Tools for the Farm & Ranch. A Research Center and Photo Gallery also share the space.

Jamie Britton , a Kendrick High School senior has selected the Fraternal Temple building and JKHF as a community service senior project. Upon completing her volleyball commitments, she too will be leaving her energetic and creative mark in the building’s improvements and offerings.

I would like to remind the citizens of Kendrick that your opinion matters. If you wish to bring up an issue or speak with me regarding any issue please contact the Kendrick City Hall and our City Clerk will take your name and a phone number and I will contact you as soon as I am able to. I ask this as I want to ensure that I am able to set aside enough time to be able to communicate effectively with the citizens as I do work out of town. Every citizen should be able to exercise their right to communicate with their elected officials and I welcome you to do so. The Kendrick City Council works for you, represents you, and as Mayor I have an open door policy to each and every citizen.

Have you noticed the mural has been completed at the Kendrick War Memorial Pool? It looks fantastic! Please take a moment to thank the K-J Arts Committee members for bring this great addition to the community. Thank you!

A project that the City is working on is to secure funding in order to purchase speed display signs for the highway through the City. I have received numerous complaints regarding the speed of vehicles through our community and rest assured we have taken steps to address this. I have communicated our needs to the Idaho State Police as well as the Latah County Sheriff's Department. I have applied for a grant and am awaiting a response and we are researching other grant opportunities to secure funds to purchase two speed display signs to be installed within the community. We are also seeking donations in order to support this project. Contact City Hall if you are interested in making a donation. I have personally watched traffic through town on many different occasions and have noted that there is an issue. Speed display signs work to calm the traffic and have had very good results in the communities that use them.

Another concern within the community has been law enforcement. Please be sure to call the Latah County Sheriff Department when you observe suspicious activity or something that requires law enforcement attention.

### City of Kendrick (cont'd)

#### Access Idaho (Credit Card Payments for Utility Bills)

The City of Kendrick is in the process of setting up an account with Access Idaho. This will allow utility payments to be made by credit card. The customer will be charged for all of the fees which are 3% of the utility bill PLUS a \$1.00 per transaction fee. An example would be on a \$110 utility bill, the customer would pay \$3.30 for the 3% fee and \$1.00 transaction fee so the total bill would be \$114.30. The City will not make any money on the credit card payments. All fees go directly to Access Idaho. We hope to have this set up in November or December. The City will mail out a letter to all utility customers when the program is up and running.

### News from the City of Juliaetta

City Council The date of November's City Council meeting has been changed from Tuesday, November 11 to Tuesday, November 18, because of the Veteran's Day holiday. There will be no meeting held in December.

Abandoned Vehicles There are numerous unlicensed vehicles around town that are parked in the city right of way. These vehicles must either be licensed or moved. If they are not, they will be tagged by the Latah County Sheriff's office and towed at owner's expense.

#### Recycle Bins

The recycle bins at the bulky waste site have been getting a lot of use, which is a good thing for both our residents and our community. However, more and more trash is being mixed in with the recyclables, resulting in too many man hours being spent sorting the trash from the recyclables. If this contamination doesn't stop, it will result in the recycle bins being removed due to excess cost.

The following are items that are accepted in our recycle bin. They must be free of food and other contaminants, rinsed, and lids removed:

PAPER: (Loose in container) Mixed paper, magazines & catalogs, newspaper (including glossy ads), telephone books, junk mail (envelopes with plastic windows are accepted), cardboard, dry food boxes (such as cereal, remove waxed liner), paper bags, gift wrap. CARDBOARD ONLY may also be deposited in the cardboard bin. Please flatten boxes first.

METALS: Aluminum cans, soda cans, tin cans.

PLASTICS: (Larger than 6 oz., no lids) Jugs (such as milk, detergent, and fabric softener), jars (such as peanut butter containers), bottles (such as water, soda, shampoo), dairy tubs (such as butter, cottage cheese, etc.)

GLASS: Bottles and jars only.

If you don't see an item listed here, it is NOT ACCEPTED in the recycling box. Also, dumping unwanted or recyclable items outside the bins is NEVER allowed, even if the bins are full. Please follow these guidelines to assure the recycle bins remain in our community!

## Education Foundation Marks 1<sup>st</sup> Year with Hope and Enthusiasm

October brings the first anniversary of the KJ&7R Education Foundation's official launch, and the Board of Directors has been receiving inquiries from community members... "How is the Foundation coming along?" The answer is, "Great!"—we're thrilled to have this new resource in our district, and we're so excited about the opportunities it offers.

**Community:** In June we mailed an informational packet to 1100 households in the community, including an Introduction to Foundation and a FAQ (Frequently Asked Questions).

**Alumni:** We are preparing to send a similar mailing to district alumni.

### Group Presentation

We are creating a presentation to offer in a workshop setting for community members, or for local groups upon request.

### Promotion in Local Media

We have published articles about the Foundation in the Lewiston Tribune, the Latah Eagle, and this newsletter, and we will follow up with additional publications.

### Community Outreach

We are seeking feedback from the community regarding the effectiveness of our informational campaign, and attitudes toward youth involvement in local activities.

**Vendor and Corporate Donors:** We will begin actively seeking substantial donations from companies within the local area and beyond.

**Teaching Resources Grants:** We will initiate a program to provide funds for supplemental activities in the classroom and beyond.

## The Castle Museum



Justin Cope has a vision and a dream. To continually renovate and display items of historical value in Juliaetta's Castle Museum.

The Castle was originally built in 1905 by Abram Adams who came to Juliaetta from Wisconsin when he was 61 years old. After he passed away, his children inherited the building but it sat empty for many years. The bushes and blackberries grew through the windows and the overgrowth of foliage almost hid the building from view.

The Castle came up for sale and Donna and Onal Cope wanted to purchase the building and present it to the community as a museum. They, along with Chuck and Phyllis Nobel went into partnership in 1970 and purchased this massive stone structure. Because they were great collectors of antiques, the museum began to take shape.

In 2004, grandsons Justin and Micah Cope purchased the Castle Museum. From the antique kitchen, to the original furniture in the parlor, to the old Juliaetta post office boxes on the second floor, plus the other nine rooms in this beautiful building, each item is of historical interest. Justin has arranged every room in a beautiful style of years gone by and renovates one room at a time, using materials and colors as close to the original as possible.

Justin said two of the many unusual museum items are the Chinese wooden mining shoes from Pierce, Idaho and some Native American artifacts including arrowheads found in Juliaetta. Also in the museum are antique furniture, clothing from decades ago, glassware, books, small farm tools, and many other relics.

This museum is the best kept secret of Idaho. Justin gives tours by appointment and donations are accepted but there is no admission charge. Justin has given tours for people in the neighboring communities, but also visitors from Germany, New Zealand and England. Elementary students have toured the museum and every spring high school students use the beautiful landscape as a backdrop for pictures on prom night.

The Castle Museum is so much more than can be written in this short article. It is a beautiful testimony of a passionate caretaker who is making sure the past is not forgotten. To make an appointment for a tour of the museum on 1<sup>st</sup> street in Juliaetta, call Justin at 208-276-7174.

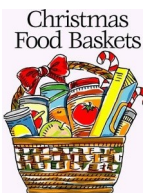
## Turkeys and More Turkeys
