Please plan to come and visit with your neighbors and celebrate the volunteers and the community we live in.

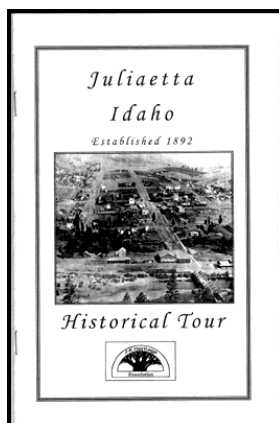

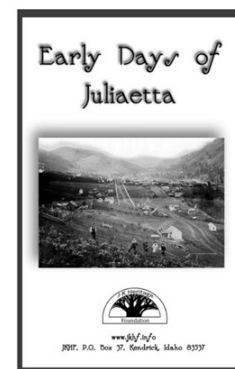

## We Need Your Help

Maybe a better title would be **we need your empty cartridges.** That need is greater than ever before. Because of the success of the newsletter we have had



to make major changes concerning its printing. The newsletter has grown in size and instead of a quarterly newsletter it is now every two months. We started with two printers but as things grew we had to increase it up to seven basic printers. Even with seven printers we were putting a real strain on them and they were dying after just a few printings. We looked into taking the newsletter to a print shop but it was going to cost \$1400 per printing. The next option was to buy better printers that could handle the heavy load. We now have two printers that can do the newsletter in a day where our seven printers took over three days. The cartridges in the old printers were much smaller than the ones for our new printers. Each of the seven printers would take two to three new cartridges of each color every printing. Now new cartridges in the current printers will last the whole print job. These cartridges last three times as long but the cost of ink overall remains the same for they cost three times as much. All this means we only have 3-5 empty cartridges after a printing, where before we would have around 30 cartridges. In the past with the empty cartridges we produced and with the donated ones we would have enough cartridges to recycle and get a minimum of \$70 and sometimes as high as \$120 per month. With the drop in what we produce, we have at the same time seen a drastic drop in donated cartridges and this past month we received only \$10 for recycled cartridges. Even the donation of one or two cartridges by just a few people begins to add up. We are grateful for what you have recycled in the past and ask that you remember to turn your empty cartridges in at the library or at either post office.

## **Kendrick Juliaetta & 7 Ridges Education Foundation Launches Teaching Grant Program**

## **Kendrick High School News**

As Winter Break approaches, the students of Kendrick High School continue to advance in both academics and athletics. But the focus isn't only on grades and sports; the high school is also holding a food drive to help give back to the community.

Grades 7-12 are competing to donate the most food, and the winning class will get a pizza party. The school's goal is to get two thousand pounds in two weeks, and all the food will be donated to a local food bank. Students have brought in top ramen, canned food, small bags of chips, bags of rice, and toiletry items.

As for sports, the Tigers ended their fall season successfully. The football team played in the state tournament, losing to the Council Lumberjacks and placing fifth.

The volleyball team however, didn't return to the state tournament but still placed third in districts. Entering the tournament 10-2 in league, the Tigers lost first to the Logos Knights, and then to the Deary Mustangs which put them out of the double-elimination tournament.

As for boys' and girls' basketball, both teams hope to make it to state this year. In the previous season, the boys placed third losing only to the Salmon River Savages. The girls however, placed seventh losing their final game to their rivals, the Nez Perce Indians.

As far as this season goes, the teams are working hard to reach their goals. Both are young teams, but seem to be growing up fast.

Another activity that seems to take the students' interest is the Knowledge Bowl program. Overseen by science teacher Eric McDowell, students compete in group head-to-head contests answering general knowledge and trivia questions.

There was previously a period where students were unable to participate in Knowledge Bowl, but Mr. McDowell graciously stepped forward, giving students the opportunity to once again compete with teams from other schools.

Kendrick students continue to give back to the community, compete with good sportsmanship, and strive to do their best.

## Juliaetta Elementary School

After a long and frustrating homework session with his second grade son one day last school year, Jeff Severt, of Cary, N.C., dashed off a letter to his son's teacher. He wrote, "I have a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering. Even I cannot explain the common-core mathematics approach, nor get the answer correct." A word problem about a fictional student named Jack had put Mr. Severt over the edge. It asked students to look at Jack's "notes," including a number line with arcs indicating he'd skip-counted backward, and figure out where he went wrong in calculating 427 minus 316. "Write a letter to Jack telling him what he did right and what he should do to fix his mistake," the problem said.

Mr. Severt's wife snapped a picture of the "common core" math problem and the note to her son's teacher, and put them on Facebook. The post went viral. Reactions to the problem ranged from angry comments to strong defenses of the teacher and the task. Many people sympathized with Mr. Severt's frustration that the problem made a simple subtraction task into a complicated, multistep production.

The response from the lead writers of the common standards for math was perhaps the most interesting: The problem wasn't part of the common core, said mathematicians William G. McCallum and Jason Zimba. It was simply the product of a badly written curriculum.

The episode serves to illustrate the complex challenges and competing demands that teachers face as they work toward implementing the new math standards. The common standards for math differ from the previous Idaho state standards in significant ways. They are fewer in number, connect more broadly across grade levels, and emphasize conceptual understanding along with the procedural skills that Idaho teachers have traditionally taught.

Mr. Severt, of Facebook renown, eventually replied to the barrage of comments on his son's math problem. He explained that his son, who has autism spectrum disorder, "knew the math answer immediately in his head. But this problem required a narrative answer utilizing a number line. While he knew the math, he balked at the writing assignment – his greatest anxiety."

Indeed, the new math landscape at Juliaetta Elementary School is marked by harder questions and some difficult learning shifts. The common-core aligned tests, scheduled to debut this spring have certainly heightened our anticipation. Those tests are expected to be more difficult than the previous state tests. We learned a lot from taking the pilot test last year, and we are preparing our students to do well when they take the SBAC Test again this spring.

## School District #283

Happy New Year! At the beginning of 2015, we begin planning for our supplemental levy which goes before the voters on March 10<sup>th</sup>. The designation "supplemental" is deceiving. Supplemental implies the school district receives adequate funding from the state for educational programs and operations, and that the local community provides enhancing, additional programs and supplies to accelerate the program and benefit the children. Such is not the case. The state provides only two-thirds of our core funding with the expectation that the local communities of Juliaetta and Kendrick cover the remaining one-third. Our local levy should be called a maintenance and operations levy – because that's what it is. Our children need the local levy to pay for their teachers' salaries and to keep the schools operating. When we come to you with a local levy request, we are not asking for anything supplemental. The entire levy goes to core funding every year.

This is the fourth time I have served as a superintendent. Judging from my life experience and comparing what we have educationally in Kendrick and Juliaetta to the other places where I have been, please know that our district ranks well with the districts in Washington, Oregon, Utah, and California where I have worked. Our wonderful teachers are highly professional and love our children. Our secretaries are dedicated and highly qualified. Our instructional aides are committed and care deeply about the success of our children. Our bus drivers have perfect safety records. Our food preparers, custodians, and maintenance workers bring dedication and devotion to their jobs. We have great students, and every one of them deserves the best our communities can provide for them. Please continue to support us and pass our annual levy requests.

With regard to the levy on March 10, 2015, please keep these dates in mind: January 21, 2015 – The school board will set the levy amount for SY 2015-2016; February 4, 2015 – Community Forum at Kendrick High School to answer questions about how levy funds will be spent; March 4, 2015 Community Forum at Juliaetta Elementary School to answer questions about school programs and how the district is funded. We depend upon your support.
