While it has served the community well, time has certainly taken its toll on the building. Though it is regularly maintained, the roof has dipped and the northeast wall of the building is bowed. The building is not energy efficient and lacks natural light. The steep ramp in front makes accessing the library difficult for some, and inside space is limited.



An initial town hall meeting was held on March 17<sup>th</sup>. On April 21<sup>st</sup> an Exploratory Committee was formed; Miranda Alexander volunteered to lead this group who will explore site options in May. We have a few ideas regarding the library, but we need your input! We need your ideas, your information, and your expertise on all levels of this project. ## **Rural Cemeteries** *by Kathy Jones*



Memorial Day is approaching and our area cemeteries will be in the best shape of the year thanks to the joint effort of many community members.

The Nez-Tah Cemetery Maintenance District was formed in 1954 and includes five cemeteries: Fix Ridge, American Ridge, Kendrick, Juliaetta and Bethany. The Nez-Tah Board seats representatives from three sub-district boundaries. Currently, Ron Jones is the Board Chairman; Dave Klatt is Secretary/Treasurer, and Justin Cope is the third Chairman. Nez-Tah is responsible for necessary budgeting and levy requests, spending decisions on mowing equipment and purchases, and the hiring and oversight of a contractor to accomplish the mowing and spraying duties.

Mike Teft of Juliaetta and his family have been mowing the cemetery lawns for over 22 years. Mike's children began helping at age 13, and 22 years later, his grandchildren are showing an interest.

When Mike and his son, Matt, began mowing cemetery lawns in 1993, they used an ancient iron horse tractor. The grounds were uneven, sometimes rocky, often with winter mole hills, and more weeds than grass. As the years have passed, and community members are more involved in their neighborhood cemeteries, the grounds have made improvements. Now instead of a time consuming iron horse tractor, Mike and his family use a more modern riding mower to cover approximately 23 acres of cemetery grounds from spring to fall. Mike is also contracted from another district to mow Wild Rose Cemetery.

Mike says he enjoys being outside and talking to people in the rural settings. The only frustration is after Memorial Day when the two-week limit for flowers and decorations pass, and it takes extra work to clean-up the items left behind.

Although Mike is in charge of the mowing, it is up to volunteers to provide trimming or removal, mowing outside the fences, resetting or leveling of headstones and other miscellaneous tasks beyond those provided by the district.

One of those volunteer services is the placement of American Flags at each Veteran gravesite. VFW Post 3913 generously provides the small flags and Frank Dammarell keeps a master list of all Veterans in each cemetery. Each May, Bob Rollins, Bob Heidenreich, and Ron and Kathy Jones make sure each Veteran grave is honored with an American Flag. The daily raising and lowering of a larger flag on its pole in each cemetery is also handled by volunteers.

This year, as you visit our area cemeteries on Memorial Day, please remember the volunteers and maintenance crews that make every effort to honor not only Veterans, but each departed family member.

# Education Foundation Breaks New Ground

## Innovative Student Grant Program

The KJ7 Education Foundation has created a new program that will encourage students to take part in building their own curriculum by proposing study topics that interest them, and applying for mini-grants to fund the projects. The Foundation allocated \$250 to pilot the initiative, and offered grants of \$25, \$50 and \$100 to all K-12 students. The winners were selected by lottery, with 2 grants awarded at each funding level. The winning projects included:

- Nathan Kimberling (Kindergarten): Fun with Electricity
- Caleb Olsen (Kindergarten): Bugs
- Cade Silflow (1<sup>st</sup> Grade): Classroom Aquarium
- Kolt Koepp (1<sup>st</sup> Grade): Base Ten Blocks
- Michael Lovejoy (2<sup>nd</sup> Grade): Investigating What Makes LED Shoes Light Up
- Hunter Taylor and Hanna Shepard (3<sup>rd</sup> Grade): History of the Titanic

A total of 22 applications were received from Elementary School students, totaling \$1,250 in funds requested. The response from students was inspiring, and the Foundation Board hopes to be able to repeat this initiative as funding becomes available.

## Charter Donor Campaign

The Foundation's "Charter Donor" campaign was given a boost both financially and inspirationally when students in grades K-12 made contributions through a penny drive that they held during the month of March. The donations qualified each and every student in the district to be named a Charter Donor of the Kendrick Juliaetta & 7 Ridges Education Foundation.

As a Board member commented, "This means that these students will always be known for helping to establish the Foundation when it was still a new idea. It takes courage to be the first at anything, and that courage should be recognized and remembered! This effort shows that the wonderful young people of KJ7 believe in the Foundation's goals, and want to participate by 'paying it forward' for students who follow in their footsteps."

The Charter Donor Campaign will come to a close on **June 30th, 2015**, and district residents who have not yet donated are encouraged to take this opportunity to become a part of Education Foundation history by adding their names to the growing roster of Charter Donors.

## Scholarships for Graduating Seniors

At the Kendrick High School commencement ceremony in May, the KJ7 Education Foundation will award scholarships to graduating seniors. Thanks to the establishment of an endowed account, all of the seniors who completed an application will receive a scholarship. This program is one of the Foundation's primary initiatives, encouraging students to reach for their dreams by continuing their education to achieve their career goals. The Foundation Board applauds all those who applied for scholarships in the Class of 2015, and wishes them success.

## Grand Opening of Museum

JKHF members realized a hard earned dream come true as the museum opened for visitors on April 25<sup>th</sup>. At the Dedication Service the outstanding work of Chris Kowrach was acknowledged. Her work in preserving the Kendrick Gazettes and other archival items has been vital to the organization. Jan Patterson has been a vital player in the setup of the museum. Loeda Reil and Sharon Harris have spent four years compiling and writing history of the area. Mark Mustoe joined us last year and was a key figure in compiling the Southwick History.



The short dedication ceremony upstairs was conducted by JKHF President, Sharon Harris and consisted of two musical numbers played by Sharon on the "Thomas" Pump Organ, and Lois (Thomas) Iller on the flute. Lois' husband Bob wrote and recited a blessing for the museum.

The entry room into the museum is dedicated to the Illers, who have been very generous in providing financial support and artifacts for the museum. The work area room is dedicated to the memory of Arlene Watts Wallace. Her family has been extremely generous in donating artifacts.

During the upstairs dedication, we also had the recent video histories of Kendrick and Juliaetta showing downstairs by Marsha Schoeffler. Refreshments were available on the ground floor.

The museum will be open two Saturdays a month on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm. 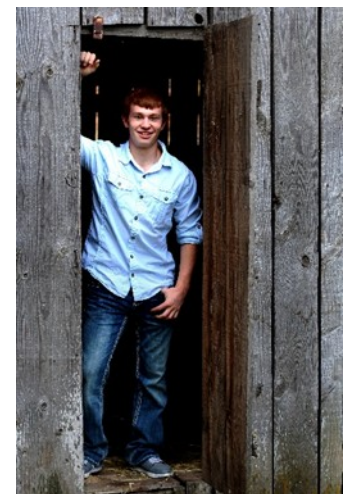

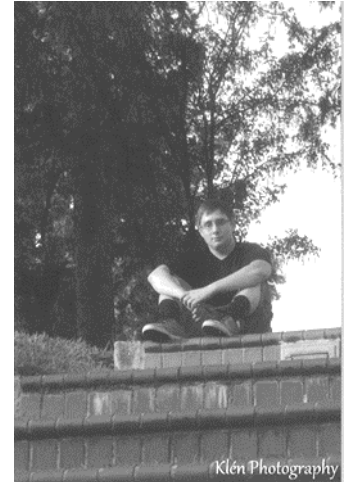

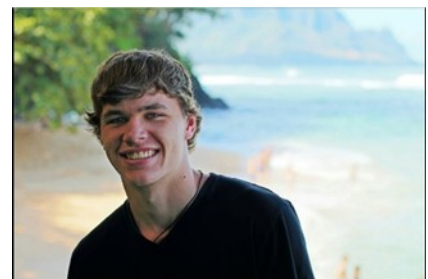

### Thoughts of Spring, Thoughts of God

I love watching the changes as winter yields to spring. In Isaiah 40:21-22 says, "Do you not know? Do you not hear? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth? The next verses apply that truth to rulers and princes – "scarcely are they planted, scarcely sown, scarcely has their stem taken root in the earth, when he blows on them, and they wither..." God rules in the affairs of men, and it is He to whom we must give an account of our time on this earth.

When we look at the stars in the sky, even they come under God's constant control. "Lift up your eyes on high and see: who created these? He who brings out their host by number, calling them all by name, by the greatness of his might, and because he is strong in power not one is missing" (v. 26).

That brings us to the great question, "why do you say...my way is hidden from the Lord?" (v. 27). "Have you not known? Have you not heard? God orchestrates the changes of the seasons, the changes of life, and the challenges we face. He is the one we can count on in every season.

Verse 31 encourages us, "but they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint." Wait for the Lord – that means to seek Him, follow His instructions, and to trust His leading. Seasons may come and go, but God remains the same.

After May 1<sup>st</sup>, open burning within city limits will be allowed by permit only. Permits may be obtained at City Hall at least 24 hours prior to burning, subject to approval by Fire Chief Mike McGee. There is no charge for open burn permits. Those wishing to burn in an enclosed fire pit or burn barrel do not need a permit. As always, open burning is never allowed while an air quality advisory is issued. These advisories are posted at City Hall and on the Juliaetta facebook page whenever possible.

### Dogs On the Loose

Residents allowing their dogs to roam away from their homes is always a problem in Juliaetta. City Ordinance 2005-01 prohibits any person from allowing their dog or dogs to run loose. Anyone failing to comply may be fined up to \$300.00. Keep your dogs fenced or tied in your yard.

### City Council

Upcoming City Council meetings will take place on Tuesday, May 12<sup>th</sup> and Tuesday, June 9<sup>th</sup>, both at 7:00 pm. Agendas are posted in the window at City Hall one week before each meeting. The public is always welcome to attend these monthly meetings.

## South Latah Highway District

According to Title 22, Chapter 24 of the Idaho Code, highway districts have a responsibility to control noxious weeds along the roads. In addition we use chemicals to control vegetation in the right-of-way that cause maintenance issues or road hazards. If you plan to request that we not spray in the future, it will be your responsibility to control the weeds and maintain the grassy vegetation. It is important that you mark each end of your property with clearly visible, easy to read signs that state, "NO SPRAY." The person spraying the weeds has no way of knowing the property is not to be sprayed unless it is clearly marked.

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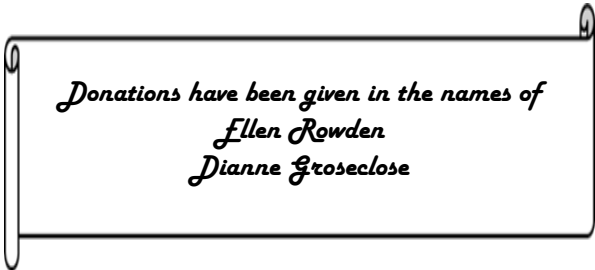
