The Education Foundation is taking stock and feeling grateful for the community's support after an exciting year of wonderful developments. Meanwhile, the Directors are also preparing for another school year full of innovative educational opportunities for local students. Everyone in our school district can be a part of it all!

Last year saw the first celebration of this wonderfully successful event, in which local youth donated their time and energy to help complete community projects, from landscaping to building renovation. Charter Donor Campaign

This campaign celebrated the Foundation's first official fundraising year by recognizing the trailblazing spirit of early contributors. Everyone who gave during the period June 2014 to June 2015 was designated as a Charter Donor, and their names will go down in Foundation history. The Directors thank everyone who contributed and participated in the campaign. Students at JES and KHS worked hard to coordinate a district-wide penny drive, which garnered over \$500.00, and enabled every student in the district to qualify as a Charter Donor. This remarkable effort demonstrated the commitment of local youth to the enhancement of their own educational opportunities.

Benscoter Lyle Scholarships

Scholarships for post-secondary education were awarded to 10 members of the KHS Class of 2015, thanks to a generous endowment gift from the Benscoter family. The total amount of this year's awards was \$25,000, and the endowment will ensure that scholarships are available for all future graduating seniors.

Teaching Resources Grants

During the spring semester, grants were awarded for 3 innovative teaching projects proposed by educators at JES and KHS. This program was designed to encourage and reward creative approaches to accomplishing educational objectives. The projects are underway, and will be completed in the fall.

Innovative Student Grant Program

Recipients of 6 Innovative Student Grants submitted reports detailing the results of their activities. This program allows students to design projects addressing areas of special interest creating exciting opportunities for learning.

Reception for Seniors and Families

A special gathering was held to honor graduating seniors, and to give students and their families a chance to meet informally with Foundation Board members and invited guests.

Locust Blossom Festival

The Foundation provided transport for KHS Seniors who created an Education Foundation float for the Locust Blossom Festival, and rode the float in the parade. The Directors hope to sponsor this project as an annual tradition.

Are You Eligible For A Box of Free Food?

There is a new Idaho State food program known as Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) that is for those 60 or older and who meet the income level. This is in addition to the J/K Good Samaritan Foodbank and Mobile Pantry Truck. By signing up for this program it will not affect what you get from the other food programs. The income level for a single person household is a maximum monthly household income of \$1276. For each additional person one would add \$450 to find their income level. For example a two person household would be $\$1276 + \$450 = \$1726$. If you qualify you would receive the free box of food on a monthly basis. Each month the box would contain 4 cans of vegetables, 2 bottles of juice, 2 cans of fruit, 1 large can of meat (beef, beef stew, chili, or chicken or 2 small cans (tuna, salmon), 1 jar of peanut butter or package of dry beans, 2 boxes of cereal, 1-2 packages of rice or pasta, 1 package of cheese, 2 cartons of shelf-stable milk, and every other month 1 package instant dry milk. There is a limited number of boxes available so if you are interested in signing up for the program or have questions please contact Pastor Larry Haylett at 276-4510 as soon as possible.

J/K Good Samaritan Foodbank Receives Donations/Grants

The foodbank has received a number of grants the last couple of months. The Idaho Community Foundation has given a grant for \$1500 and the Latah County Community Foundation gave \$1000 in grant monies. The Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program which is a part of FEMA has given a grant for \$2400.

Along with the grants CHS made a donation of \$2200. The difference between a grant and donation is in how the money can be spent. All grant money has to go to the purchase of food and cannot pay other expenses. Those other expenses are such things as monthly rent, office supplies and in the last three years we have had to buy two freezers because of the growing need to store frozen items. We want to thank each of these organizations for thinking of the J/K Good Samaritan Foodbank and also we want to thank each of you who have given financially and donated food so that we can continue meeting the food needs of the people in our area.

Southwick Community Center

The Southwick Community Center will be hosting their **SECOND ANNUAL BARBEQUE FUNDRAISER** on Saturday, August 22nd from 4pm to 9pm at the Center. We are excited to have the folk-country band "Beargrass" playing music for the evening. Cost for the meal will be \$12 per person, with all the proceeds going to continued improvements to the building. Our 501-C3 non-profit status has provided us with additional fundraising opportunities. With the proceeds from last year's barbeque, as well as a \$500 grant from the Idaho Community Foundation and donations from community members, the entire exterior of the Community Center will have a new paint job in time for the August event. We thank all of our supporters and look forward to seeing you on August 22nd for good food, music and fun!

August 13th - Family Fun Night – Bingo, snacks, and prizes.

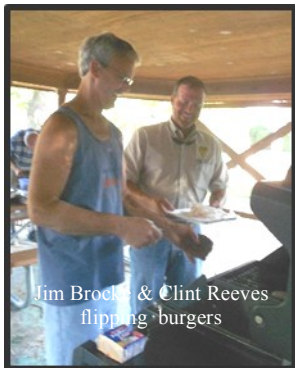
This was a very popular event last year and we plan even bigger prizes this year.

Growing it Local



Cindy Hadley is a gardener extraordinaire. She plants on a grand scale in order to keep well stocked for the local farmer's market in Moscow each week.

People have come to depend on her fresh tasty garden produce and home grown products.

Her farm is on the Juliaetta side of American Ridge and is quite the oasis. Each year she digs in 300-400 tomato plants. She then plants a bucket (with the bottom removed) around each tomato plant and digs it in below the soil surface. She waters in the bucket and it retains the moisture.

Everybody works on the farm, including her Great Pyrenees dog that protect the 100 goats. She milks 15 goats by hand each day and raises the rest for meat markets she has developed. She has also developed wonderful lotions, creams, and heel butter products from the goats.

She has raised baby calves as part of her farming industry for years and they were are all raised on goat's milk. One year, after raising 180 of those baby calves, she decided to just switch to goats.

She has a flock of 200 laying hens that provide organic eggs for both the Food Co-Op at Moscow as well as the Farmer's Market.

Her green thumb gets an early workout as she plants in her large green house early in order to market her tomato and pepper plants. Cindy grows all this food while holding a full-time job as a rural carrier at the Post Office. Cindy's son Zane has been her helper as well as Lonnie Seubert.

Amazing Employees Make Family Food Stores Work

Aaron and Diane Heinen, owners of Phil's Family Foods, say repeatedly how blessed they are to have such amazing employees working at the local grocery stores. They say it is such a luxury to know they can leave at any time and all will be fine at both the Kendrick and Deary Family Food stores. In fact, they have never had to miss any of their kids' ball games thanks to their dedicated staff.

Not that either Aaron or Diane are slackers! Aaron puts in at least 12 hour days serving as the owner / manager of both stores running the day-to-day business and Diane serves as office manager, dealing with most of the paperwork. The nearly 30 people employed at the two stores capably stock, clerk, prepare deli food, cut meat and do whatever it takes to make the stores "home-town friendly." Diane says out-of-towners who stop are often shocked when they are greeted with a "Hi!" when they enter and an offer to help carry their groceries to their car.

The Kendrick store is a bit of an institution in town, having been owned by its namesake, Phil and Donna Heinen, since 1974. Donna says Aaron "grew up" in the store since he was about three when they purchased it. The original building was built in 1904 and in 1994 the Kendrick store got a facelift. The laundromat on one side and old fire station on the other side of the original store expanded it to its present size. The Deary White Pine store was purchased by Aaron and Diane about 5 years ago making them the owners of what they jokingly refer to as their "chain of stores."

Diane says it's challenging to always be looking ahead, trying to make sure they continually are improving service and doing whatever it takes to be better and make the stores more accommodating. With larger stores so close in Moscow and Lewiston, the Heinens bend over backwards to stay competitive. Special orders are available for nearly any product and the home-town feel are just a couple of the ways they provide locals with unique service. They stress that the community support they receive is truly appreciated at both locations. Outside support is huge, also. Many campers stop for supplies on their way through both towns, and some make it an "event" to stop for ice cream year after year. Canadian shoppers are amazed that such small communities have a store of this caliber.

The best part of owning a small town grocery store? Being a true part of each community they serve and knowing they are the central heart of both Kendrick and Deary. Aaron and Diane are proud to be able to provide what they have to these small communities. And again they reiterate that it is employees like Hazel Jones who has been with the store for 30+ years, Debbie Miller who has been with them "many, many years," Pat Holt who worked with Phil and Donna from the very beginning, Selina Silflow, Darlene Heath and all the other employees who really make things work. City of Kendrick

Chickens The City of Kendrick is now allowing the raising and keeping of chickens (up to 6) in the city limits. A permit (\$25 fee) is required before you build a coop or get the chickens. Contact City Hall if you would like information on what the restrictions are.

Bicycles on Sidewalks in Kendrick The City of Kendrick has received several complaints about bicyclists on the sidewalks in Kendrick, not being respectful of pedestrians. Please show courtesy and yield right-of-way to pedestrians when riding a bike or skateboard on the sidewalks in Kendrick. Idaho Code Title 49, Chapter 7 states: 49-721. Bicycles on sidewalks. (1) A person operating a bicycle upon and along a sidewalk, or across a highway upon and along a crosswalk, shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian, and shall give an audible signal before overtaking and passing a pedestrian or another bicyclist.

Motor Vehicles on the Trail

We would like to remind residents that no motor vehicles of any kind are allowed to drive on the trail, except for those in use by City personnel.

Surplus Items The Juliaetta City Council will be accepting sealed bids on several items declared surplus property. A 1995 GMC 2500 Club Coupe pickup, 46 Wide-Lite auto-transformer ballasts and lamps, a 1970s John Deere 272 grooming mower, and a 1970s Wallace Terran dual 150 pound scale are all for sale. Sealed bids will be accepted until noon on July 14, 2015 and will be opened at the City Council meeting that night. For more information or to inspect the items, contact City Hall at 276-7791.

Recycle Bins There is still a problem with some people contaminating the recycle bins with unrecyclable items. This trash must be manually sorted from the recyclables, resulting in higher costs to the City, which may then be passed on to residents. The following items are recyclable in our bins: paper, magazines, cardboard (please flatten!), newspaper, aluminum cans, glass bottles and jars, and #1 or #2 plastics. Unsure if something may be recyclable? Acceptable items are listed on the bins. Electronics, Styrofoam, tissue paper and plastic sheeting are among the items that are NOT accepted. Construction debris must be taken to the bulky waste site on the first or third Saturday of each month, and household trash must be disposed of in your roll cart. Dumping at the recycle bin site is littering, and offenders may be fined.

City Council Upcoming City Council meetings will take place on Tuesday, July 14th and Tuesday, August 11th, both at 7:00 pm. The Council meeting on August 11th will take place immediately following the Public Hearing for the FY 2016 Budget. Agendas are posted in the window at City Hall one week before each meeting. The public is always welcome to attend these monthly meetings and public hearings.

Superintendent's Report

Thoughtful, content-based discussions have always been a classroom ideal. With an added push from the Common Core State Standards, our Kendrick School District teachers are magnifying their efforts to plan for purposeful talk in their classrooms.

At some point in your education...

You have probably experienced a classroom discussion that was awkward. Most students in grades K-12 are not ready naturally to hold a content-based discussion that doesn't fizzle without the support of a teacher providing some discussion scaffolds. Knowing how to hold a thriving content-based conversation takes quite a bit of social maturity and practice. Most students need to be guided through the process.

Using language is how we think; it's our operating system, according to Doug Fisher and Nancy Frey in their book, *Content Area Conversations: How to Plan Discussion-Based Lessons for Diverse Language Learners* (ASCD, 2008). Because talk represents thinking, classrooms should be filled with discussions. Yet, frequently talk is limited and used merely to check comprehension rather than to develop effective student expression. It's not enough for students to hear academic speech from their teacher, according to Fisher and Frey, they must use academic discourse with their peers if they are to acquire the ability to discuss topics themselves. As Kendrick High School and Juliaetta Elementary teachers provide time and structures for purposeful classroom discussions, our students create personal ownership of the words and ideas they use with each other.

CORE GUIDANCE

The six Common Core Anchor Standards for Speaking and Listening provide a blueprint for the system we are building. I will limit this discussion to the first standard (SL.1) to illustrate how the standard changes from level to level. Its goal is to guide students to "prepare for and participate effectively in a range of conversations and collaborations with diverse partners, building on others' ideas and expressing their own thoughts clearly and persuasively."

In the early grades, this standard focuses more on the interpersonal skills students need to have in a discussion. Such as, taking turns, listening to others, and sticking to the topic at hand. As the expectations of this standard progress through the grades, however, the skills become more and more complex. For example, older students, starting as early as first grade, are able to ask clarifying questions and cite evidence to support their conclusions. By grade 12, the first anchor standard encourages students to promote civil and democratic discourse, and to do this "through evaluating the full range of evidence, probing reasoning, and identifying when and how to pursue further explorations of the topic." With this sequence in mind Kendrick School District teachers are using specific techniques to bring deliberate discussion to life in their classrooms. I commend them for their great work.

As he grew a little older, his sister helped him understand. I should do Mom's chores because it is one way I can show her my love. And I found her chores were not that big of a duty. And just as I did chores for my Mom, I learned I must do them for my Father in heaven.

Today, many Christians are persecuted because they DO God's chores as he asks. Ridicule follows obedience to God's way. Mockery accompanies obedience to Christ and his commandments. People laugh as we obey Someone we've never seen, and they bet we do so out of fear.

People in the world don't understand, God loves you and me so much, yesterday, today, and tomorrow. Now, God asks you and me to follow his way and words—to do God's chores—not out of fear, but because it is one way to show God our love.

In whatever situation you find yourself today, it might be hard to do God's chores. The tasks of love, honesty, selflessness, and patience sometimes don't fit well in the current models of our society. And stress can tempt us to wonder why it is important to obey God at any particular moment.

But don't be tempted! No, today, follow the instructions of God, and do so out of love. If you do God's chores as he asks, they will not be a burden. May your love of God flow through your obedience of God's instructions.

What we can do FOR YOU is additionally controlled by financial contributions. Funds come to us through JKHF memberships, gifts, grants, and profits from selling our publications. As a result of people supporting and contributing to our historical preservation efforts and community center renovations the upcoming months will provide numerous Fraternal Temple (Grange) building updates and restorations. The jkhf.info web site provides project updates. Chris Kowrach is chairing each of the below projects.

The Steele-Reese Foundation funding determination in early August dictates the extent of the building's continued critical brick repair and upper window weatherization project. JKHF support too will then join what has been collected from the local Garden Club, J-K Recreation District, the Grange, Inland Northwest Community Foundation, the Idaho Community Foundation, and the Latah County Community Foundation allowing brick and window work to begin in mid-August.

Idaho Community Foundation's Northern Region Greatest Need Fund along with our own contributions is currently allowing work to progress on getting water running through building's upper pipes that have been dry for over 30 years. The second floor bathroom and utility rooms are also receiving a painting makeover.

The Inland Northwest Community Foundation, Clearwater Power, Latah County Community Foundation, and hopefully the Avista Power Foundation will be joining what we can accumulate toward acquiring a museum climate control source and an upper floor electrical wiring update. Insurance mandates have required the 105-year-old knob and tube electrical wire connected circuits be disconnect. This electrical update will better preserve our archives and increase the efficiency of available space.

One of the hardest goals for her students seems to be memorization of the multiplication facts. "When a student learns their math facts, we all celebrate. There are designated dumping bins in Juliaetta and Deary which community members are encouraged to use.

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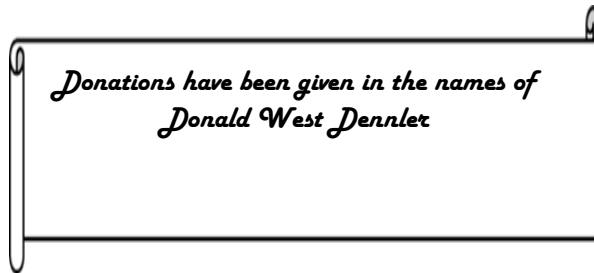
