Working to Improve Our Community

The Community Library Project

A group of community members have been meeting since April to facilitate the building of a new library in Juliaetta. The current building is 100+ years old and, following a survey conducted by the library and presented to the Juliaetta City Council by the Friends of the Library (FOL), it was determined by the Juliaetta City Council that repairing the building was not the most cost effective course of action. The FOL met with the Juliaetta City Council and a series of Town Hall meetings were held. From those meetings the Community Library Project (CLP) was formed and exciting progress has been made toward a new library.

Due to costs associated with changing the name and transporting the elementary school children to and from the library it was determined that the library would remain in Juliaetta. Once that determination was made a committee was delegated to search for available property. The pros and cons of the available properties were presented to the public and evaluated at the July 16th Town Hall meeting. At the August 4th Town Hall meeting it was voted that the Library should remain in its current location. This means the old building will come down and a new one will be built.

The CLP has contacted the Latah County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) who have expressed interest in having office space in the new building. The CLP will continue communications with the LCSO to further explore their needs, and possible contributions to the project. CLP will soon be organizing field trips to recently constructed libraries in the surrounding areas to look at design options and learn from their experience.

Several committees have been formed to carry out the important task of rebuilding our community library and the list of needed committees and volunteers continues to grow as the CLP gains momentum. Current committees include Communications Committee, Building Committee, Fundraising Committee and Budget Committee. The Fundraising Committee was started August 4th and welcomes ideas and support from the community. The Communications Committee will keep the public informed of the CLP activities and progress.

Kendrick War Memorial Pool

A meeting held at the Kendrick Fire hall was well attended with over 50 citizens there to discuss the future of the swimming pool. We have set up a GoFundMe site called "[Save the Kendrick War Memorial Pool](#)" and it was decided that we would need a "Life Cycle Assessment" of the pool before taking any further action on the pool funding or fundraising. Karen Johnston, representative of KJ Design of Colfax Washington offered to do this assessment and the fee for this service would be between \$1,500.00 and \$5,000.00. It was decided by those in attendance to spend this money to see what actually had to be fixed and a cost amount for the repairs.

An impromptu fundraising effort was organized on August 5th in the Kendrick City Park with Inland Cellular providing the meal and free use of the pool for the evening. There were many vendors in the park and \$1000.00 plus was raised.

On August 19th a Committee was formed. The committee board of directors are as follows; Darcie Lynse, Kristina Alexander, Cindy Patterson, Heather Foster, And Richard F. Abrams. This group will elect officers at their next meeting. The public present discussed funding opportunities, marketing of the pool and items from the preliminary inspection done by KJ Design, pool consultants from Colfax Washington. The next meeting will be scheduled after the completion of the leak detection inspection, and upon receiving of their written report.

Is Solar Power in your Future?

Bill Hayward, owner of Seven Ridges Solar, is a huge advocate of solar power. He uses the product himself to power many small appliances in his home in Juliaetta. Seven Ridges Solar will help you ease into Portable Solar Power one part at a time. He does not do home solar systems as such, but a portable system can be expanded greatly to help out in a power outage.



His house is jam packed with gadgets he has improvised or invented. He uses a garden lamp solar panel to power his AM Radio. He got interested in electronics (and solar in particular) as a nine year old child. He begged his mother to buy him a solar cell that at that time cost around \$2.00. She refused, but he did not give up.

Prior to moving to Juliaetta from Hawaii, he used a solar panel to charge a 200 amp hour battery that powered his friend's dialysis system at night. After serving in the Navy, he worked as a rigger at Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics.

He has assembled an 80 watt panel that charges a battery that in turn operates a Xantrex 2000 Watt Pure Sine Wave Inverter. It is mounted on a wagon and he plans to take it to the grade school students for a lesson in solar energy. He powers his Amateur Radio with solar energy. What power you take out of a battery has to be put back in. Five hours of sun on a 100 watt panel will put 500 watts of power back in the battery bank.

A Solar Panel System that would supply adequate power for a camper can be purchased for less than \$200.00. Letting the sun charge the batteries is reaping a reward for something God provides each day free. When I asked him how it all works, the explanation quickly lost me. Essentially the sun (or light) excites the atoms in a cell that go to work providing energy to the battery to store until used.

Bill loves experimenting with equipment and homemade inventions. He recently constructed a homebrew 5 element Yagi-Oda Beam antenna using an old television antenna. He established voice contact with a space station. Admittedly he has read and studied every issue of Popular Electronics, which he keeps handy on a thumb drive. He has an RF Detector as well as a future Lightning Detector on his desk, both items were made with his two hands.

Bill likes Juliaetta and gives back to his community. He volunteers at the Community Church doing the lawns and tree upkeep and ringing the church bell. He also volunteers at the Good Samaritan Food Bank. He can be reached at 208-790-6795. -Sharon Harris

In Good Hands with Carol Bradford

Carol Bradford is an experienced, licensed massage and manual therapist, but she is also a natural teacher who makes her passion come alive and makes complicated ideas easily understood. Understanding these complex ideas and systems and then having the knowledge and skill to help her clients is indeed a unique gift.

"I knew immediately that this was what I needed to do!" she says of her chosen profession. At 46, in a transition period of her life and on a river rafting trip, she chatted with a raftmate who mentioned massage therapy. "It was like – BAM! – this is what I'm supposed to do, and three months later I was enrolled in classes at San Diego Mueller College of Holistic Studies."

Carol's talents and interests are not limited to her chosen profession. "I love using my hands," she says. Her art is testament to that. She sculpts in clay, draws and paints, plays piano and enjoys gardening. Other hobbies include anything outdoors, such as biking, river rafting and cross-country skiing.

So, who can benefit from manual therapy and massage? "Everybody!" Carol says emphatically. "Biology reflects biography," she says, meaning that the things that happen to us throughout our lives impact our health. Carol says there is interconnectedness between all our systems and when one isn't working properly or is stressed, other systems can be adversely affected. Stress is a normal part of everyone's lives, but too much stress can compromise the body in many ways. Anything that can relieve some stress is a good thing, and massage can help. "It feels good and it's good for you," she says.

And what about the skeptics or those who are nervous about getting a massage? Carol nods and says "That's very common and normal. People need to know that *they* are in control of the session, not me. I always drape and ask permission before touching someone. Some people prefer to wear sweats or a tee shirt and shorts, and that is just fine." Carol stresses that it is important for her to be respectful and gentle, explaining what she is doing and why.

City of Juliaetta

City Election This year's city election is right around the corner. Election Day is Tuesday, November 3 and two councilmember positions and the office of Mayor are up for election. All are four year positions. If you would like to run for office, you can pick up a Declaration of Candidacy and Petition of Candidacy beginning Monday, August 24 at 8:00. The candidate filing period closes at 5:00 pm on September 4. After this time, write in candidates may file their declaration of intent until Tuesday, October 6. Sewer Rate Increase On June 9, a Resolution was passed which will raise the sewer rates by 4.99% for the next three years. Beginning October 1, 2015 the monthly sewer rate will increase from \$21.85 to \$22.49, which will be reflected on your November bill.

City Council Positions Open The City of Kendrick will have two council positions on the November ballot. Both city council positions are four year terms. This is a great way to serve your community. Applications must be returned to City Hall by 5:00 PM on Friday, September 4. Even though City Hall is normally closed on Fridays, it will be open from 9:15 – 5:00 on Friday, September 4, to receive applications.

Pool Fundraising The City is accepting donations for the renovation of the Kendrick War Memorial Pool. You can donate directly to the city by mailing checks made out to City of Kendrick, with pool on the memo line, and mailing them to PO Box 195, Kendrick, ID 83537. You can also donate at any Wells Fargo Bank to the Kendrick War Memorial Pool Fund Raiser account. Increases in Sewer and Water Fees The City Council is planning to increase the base water fee from \$42 to \$44, and the sewer rate from \$40 to \$42 on October 1, 2015. It is necessary to increase the water fees to allow for equipment replacement and the sewer fees are for our sewer upgrade project. You will see this increase on the utility bill that you receive on November 1, 2015.

This 5-day event helps young people to better understand their role as a citizen. They work in teams to solve business and political issues and overcome physical challenges. They also learn more about effective leadership. Dynamic guest speakers help teach the value of making positive choices in life. Students also learn about consumer-owned utilities, the U.S. Government, and the basics of electricity. Superintendent's Message

As the new school year begins, the Kendrick professional, instructional staff will be working on improving their skills in administering formative assessments.

A genuine commitment to helping all students learn requires a systematic process to monitor student learning on an ongoing basis and using student performance data to:

1. Provide students with information about their progress towards attaining defined learning goals
2. Respond to individual student needs with appropriate learning interventions
3. Improve the instructional practices of the students' teachers

Formative Assessment is defined as *frequent testing of student performance to identify learning needs and adjust teaching strategies*. I personally think of formative assessment as testing **for** learning. The big idea behind formative assessment is that evidence of student learning is used *to adjust instruction to better meet the students' needs*. Formative assessment is not a specific test; it is a process that uses multiple indicators of student learning. It is not something to be purchased; it is a skill that educators must master. It is not something that occurs at the end of instruction; it is an integral part of good instruction. It is not designed to result in a final score or grade; it is a process to inform students and better meet their learning needs.

Determining if an assessment is formative or summative is not based on the format of the test or when it is given. Instead, the critical determining factor is how the results are used. If students and teachers use the information to confirm areas of student proficiency and identify where specific improvement is needed, **then it is formative**. Most importantly, formative assessment should provide students with support and additional opportunities to demonstrate they have mastered the material.

In fact, in some cases, a test can be both summative and formative. For example, an end-of the unit test might be given to determine if students have mastered a skill. For students who demonstrate mastery, the assessment is summative. But for students who do not meet the required proficiencies, the test assumes the formative role. The information will indicate to both the teacher and specific students that additional time and support are needed to help them develop the required proficiencies.

In Juliaetta and Kendrick, we are indeed fortunate to have dedicated teachers who care about our students enough to work hard and master skills, such as using formative assessments, to lift the performance of all our students. Just administering the ISAT is not enough. Formative tests help our students achieve their learning goals and advance from level to level in proficiency.

JES Principal Message

The Juliaetta Elementary staff is excited to welcome our students back from summer break. We have upgraded the technology at both schools and provided enhanced access to the Internet which we think will better prepare our students for their futures.

The elementary students of today are generally referred to as "digital natives" because they came into a world already enhanced by technological advancements and social media. They can handle learning about technology. They have been surrounded by it practically since the day they were born. I think this gives them a native's advantage or natural ability when it comes to learning new technology skills. They are also uninhibited when it comes to using technology.

One of the outcomes of the digital age is the ability to monitor student progress using computer programs. For the past few years the Idaho State Legislature has provided additional resources to prepare public schools to test students interactively. I am proud of the way the Juliaetta Elementary staff has embraced these changes which include using computerized testing.

We administered the Idaho Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) last spring at computer work stations to our third graders through sixth graders. The ISAT is a summative test. We are ready to make the best use of the data, improve instruction, and address the needs of all our students. The results of the test will guide us in the process of setting our "smart goals" and planning for the current school year.

Summative tests ask, "Has the student *learned* the content by the deadline?" A summative assessment is intended to produce a divided result – pass or fail; proficient or not proficient; or to produce a grade of A, B, C, D, or F.

The ISAT is a standardized test that is used to determine if our students are proficient at learning the core standards of the curricula. The focus is on differentiating the number of students who demonstrate, or fail to demonstrate, proficiency on the day the test was given.

In my judgment, and taken as a whole, the test administered last spring fails to provide teachers with detailed information on the difficulties specific students are experiencing. Furthermore, the results were not available until months after students took the test, and the Idaho State Department of Education portal for accessing individual student performance data was only briefly available and then shut down, with little advanced warning, and was not available again until the end of August 2015. As a result, the results have been of little value to our instructional staff and administration in planning for the opening of this school year.

As the school year commences, we will use the ISAT data to our best advantage identifying the areas where we can help our students and best focus our resources and efforts in SY 2015-16. **Dr. Lindsay Park**

The Bank Swallows or Sand Pipers

If you travel Highway 3 near Kendrick you will find the Bear Ridge Bank Swallow Nesting Society....or they might find you. These birds are very protective of their nests and look like a scene from Alfred Hitchcock's "The Birds" as they dart back and forth across the road with no regard at all for your windshield.



The clay walls are literally drilled with their nests. Both the male and the female excavate a tunnel from 20 to 40 inches into a bank. Initial digging is with the beak, but once inside the tunnel, the birds take turns kicking sand out of the tunnel. The tunnel slopes gently upward and ends in a wider chamber lined with dry grasses, leaves, and pine needles. Although birds may use tunnels from the previous season, birds often dig a new tunnel to avoid parasites from the previous nest. Hot dry weather is hard on these birds, so we can only guess that they have had a bad season.

The adult birds are avid hunters of insects to feed their fledglings. They often carry up to sixty insects per trip to the nest.

They have begun to migrate to Central America to spend the winter. We will see them again next April when they return to nest in Northern Idaho. - Sharon Harris

Reminder of Burning Ordinances Kendrick

No Open Burning is allowed in Kendrick during the State wide dates of May 15th through October 20th. Ordinance# 4-1-11: A. Restricted: The burning of substances of any kind within the city is hereby prohibited during those periods when burning is prohibited or restricted by the Department of Lands and or Department of Forestry of the state of Idaho, or it is determined that burning could be detrimental to the health or well being of city inhabitants.

Juliaetta

Open Burning within Juliaetta City Limits is prohibited without a burn permit until October 20th. Permits are available from Juliaetta City Hall during normal business hours.



Just half way into the fire year and both fire departments have experienced a busy fire season with 31 calls to date for service in fire, motor vehicle accidents and mutual aid to Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance. We have also held trainings in Highway Scene Safety, Life Flight Helicopter Landing Zone and two Wildland Fire Classes, in addition to staying prepared for the Wildland Fire season.

The Fire Departments in Kendrick and Juliaetta are still in need of volunteers for us to adequately staff our departments. Adopt-A-Tree Program Takes Root



The Kendrick Urban Forestry Board has long wanted to place identification plaques by trees along the bike path and around town. Funding for a project of that scope has been outside the realization of the Board. This summer the Board decided to sponsor the Adopt-A-Tree program, allowing local individuals,

organizations, groups or businesses the opportunity to add an educational element to the local flora, make a contribution to our community and at the same time perhaps honor a loved one and create a lasting memorial.

Here's how the program works: Interested parties would contact Urban Forestry member Andrea Masom (289-5949) indicating they would like to "Adopt-A-Tree." Specific existing trees have been identified around town and along the bike path that need identification plaques. Choose a tree from this list, which includes its common and scientific name. You can then add up to two lines of text to be inscribed into the plaque. Common inscriptions include "In memory of (name)", "To honor (name)" and perhaps a date.

The plaques themselves are 4 inch by 6 inch burnished gold-colored metal. They are inscribed locally by Aunie Ouderkerken. The cost of the plaque, the inscripting, the mounting and placement by the tree is \$75. You can see samples of two plaques already in place, one as a memorial to Jim Hornberger at the junction of the bike path and the Sperry Grade bridge and one by the scarlet oak tree on the east side of the old Kendrick Garage on South Kirby Street. A simple application form is all you need to let us know what text you would like on your plaque.

We are indeed fortunate to live in a community with so many diverse and beautiful trees. Wouldn't it be nice to be able to tell your children and grandchildren the names of some of them? And nicer yet to be able to go to one with a plaque honoring a loved one. This is just one more way we are making Kendrick an outstanding community. Get on board! Help Adopt-A-Tree take root and grow !
