## **The KJ7 Education Foundation: Springing Ahead!**

This spring we celebrated the Foundation's second successful year of operations, and the exciting developments we have seen over the course of the year. We are proud to have added 2 new initiatives to our program roster, and our year-end activities honored the accomplishments of graduating seniors.

### **Coming Up: Community Building Day!**

Our 3<sup>rd</sup> annual Community Building Day is scheduled for October 14<sup>th</sup>, and once again this popular activity will provide opportunities for local students to volunteer for community projects. Community organizations should be thinking about ways in which students can help out, and adult volunteers will also be needed to supervise and provide food for the workers.

### **Online Fundraising Success**

On May 5<sup>th</sup>, the Foundation took part in the Idaho Gives campaign, and raised \$1,590.00 through 28 individual donations. This campaign was so successful that we plan to participate again next year.

Students from JES donated proceeds from their popsicle sale, and two scholarship recipients from previous years made individual donations. We are so thankful for these contributions, and for the ongoing support of the community.

### **Reception for Graduating Seniors and Families**

A special gathering was held to honor graduating seniors, and to give students and their families a chance to meet informally with Foundation Board members and guests.

### **Locust Blossom Festival**

The Foundation provided transport for KHS Seniors who created an Education Foundation float for the Locust Blossom Festival, and rode the float in the parade.

### **The KJ7 Education Foundation: Ongoing Programs**

The Kendrick Juliaetta and 7 Ridges Education Foundation is a community organization committed to supporting the development of educational opportunities for students in our district. Thanks to the generous donations of community members and local businesses and organizations, the Foundation has been able to establish or facilitate the following initiatives. Two new initiatives were funded this year: the Educational Technology, and Support for Senior Class Projects.

#### **Benscoter Lyle Scholarships**

Awarded every year to support the post-secondary educational goals of students graduating from Kendrick High School. 11 scholarships awarded in 2016.

#### **Teaching Resources Grant Program**

Offering teachers and administrators the opportunity to devise and deploy programs or projects that promote higher levels of student learning in new ways. One grant awarded in the Spring Semester of 2016.

#### **Innovative Student Grant Program**

Offering students the opportunity to devise and deploy activities or projects in areas of special interest. 37 grants awarded in the 2015-16 academic year.

#### **Classroom Technology**

In May of 2016, the Foundation supported the purchase of an interactive panel for the kindergarten classroom to enhance students' learning experience by sparking curiosity and participatory learning.

#### **Support for Senior Class Projects**

This new initiative helps to defray the costs of materials used for the display of Senior Projects at Kendrick High School

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

### **Kendrick High School Receives Idaho National Labs and Avista Grants for the 2016-2017 School Year.**

Students returning to Kendrick High School (KHS) for the 2016-2017 school year will experience a few changes thanks to two substantial grants from both Avista and the Idaho National Labs (INL). Specifically, KHS has received a \$37,556.80 grant from Avista and \$4,998.00 from the INL.

Avista's generous donation to KHS is in response to a successful application by Maintenance Supervisor Joe Chapman and KHS Science Teacher Eric McDowell to Avista's Buck-A-Block Solar Grant Program. The Buck-A-Block Solar Grant Program is a program offered by Avista to promote renewable energy and community projects. Monies from the Avista grant will be used to buy and install solar panels and other associated equipment on the roof of KHS. The solar panels will serve two purposes : to reduce the district's electric bill and as a teaching tool for KHS students. The panels should be up and running by late October and will be featured in signage around KHS, the KHS website, and electronic bulletin boards that will be installed in the KHS lobby. The solar panels will also be incorporated into relevant KHS classes starting in the 2016-2017 school year. For more information, please feel free to contact either Joe Chapman or Eric McDowell.

The second grant received by the KHS science department is from the INL Classroom Makeover Grant Program. This grant provides schools with funds to upgrade science laboratories or transform classrooms into modern STEM learning environments. Thus, it will fund the purchase of equipment necessary to start an apiary program for KHS. Students participating in various science, business and industrial arts/agriculture classes will all take part in the KHS apiary program in some fashion. Science students will use the apiaries as a means to experience the ecology and chemistry of bees, industrial arts students will be involved in the fabrication of necessary equipment, and business students will be responsible for the marketing of all bee products. Besides being an educational tool, it is hoped that the KHS Apiary Program will be successful enough to maintain itself or even become a future fundraising tool. These new grants, together with the 21<sup>st</sup> Century grant, will help us expand our programs and services without increasing our local supplemental levy. The solar panels will have a significant impact on reducing future costs. Thank you for your support in passing our annual levies which keep our schools moving forward.

The City of Kendrick is pleased to welcome Jake Lustig to the City of Kendrick. Jake was hired to replace Steve Howerton as the Public Works Director. Jake is a 2015 graduate of Kendrick High School. ### Election Poll Workers Needed

Latah County is in need of poll workers for the Elections in Kendrick. Poll workers begin at

7:30 AM at the Kendrick Fire Hall and are done by around 8:30 PM. The workers are expected to remain at the polling location the entire day until the ballots are collected by a Deputy. Each poll worker is required to attend a training class that lasts around 1½ hours to learn about the upcoming election (poll workers are paid for the training class). Poll workers earn \$9.00/hour and also receive a per diem for one meal of around \$10.00. ### The Industrious Hummingbird

The tiniest of all birds, this one weighs less than a penny. Common to this area, the Ruby-throated hummingbird migrates from Central America and Mexico. They fly non-stop across the Gulf of Mexico in their migration to Idaho



Hummingbirds feed on the nectar of tubular flowers such as trumpet creeper, cardinal flower, honeysuckle, jewelweed, bee-balm, red buckeye and red morning glory, as well as at hummingbird feeders. Hummingbirds also catch insects in midair or pull them out of spider webs. Main insect prey includes mosquitoes, gnats, fruit flies, and small bees; also eats spiders.

These birds are precision flyers, with the ability to fly full out and stop in an instant, hang motionless in midair, and adjust their position up, down, sideways, and backwards with minute control. They dart between nectar sources with fast, straight flights or sit on a small twig keeping a lookout, bill waving back and forth as the bird looks around. Male hummingbirds aggressively defend flowers and feeders, leading to spectacular chases and dogfights.

The female's nest will have 1-3 eggs in the clutch. It takes 18-22 days to produce chicks. Each family will produce two sets of chicks each year.

Give them a hand with providing feeders. The recipe is: Mix 1 part sugar with 4 parts water and bring to a boil to kill any bacteria or mold present. Cool and fill feeder. Extra sugar water may be stored in a refrigerator.
