## **SUPPORT OUR SCHOOLS**

Rural schools in Latah County and throughout Idaho maintain their facilities through local levies. Here in Kendrick Jt. School District, we include our facilities in our strategic planning and draw funds for these projects at levy time. Our constituents trust us because we are very careful with these funds and use them to the best advantage. For example, for the past three years, we have systematically installed split-duct heating and cooling systems in both of our schools. Because these units are more efficient than oil-burning-furnaces, we have significantly reduced our heating costs year-over-year. At Kendrick Jr/Sr. High School we have replaced interior classroom doors and door handles for safety; replaced classroom windows in two classrooms; plan to install classroom suspended ceilings to improve R-values; seal-coated the parking lots at both schools; installed lighting along the entry sidewalk at Kendrick High School; replaced the antiquated kitchen lighting with LED lighting; maintained the roofs at both schools by applying WDG Silicone materials; and installed a vacuum system and added a greenhouse to our agriculture science building. Our buildings are more than 50 years old, but you wouldn't know it when you walk through them, because they are so well maintained. Our philosophy is to maintain, maintain, and maintain some more. We remodel and upgrade instead of replace. As a result, we serve our rural students well and stay within the resources provided to us.

Once again, it is time to support our critical annual levy. On March 8, 2016, please go to your local polling station and cast your vote in support of our schools. The levy provides about one-third of the core funding for our school district. Without these resources, we would be forced to lay off staff and defer maintenance projects. Our mission is "preparing today's children for the challenges of tomorrow." Simply put, we are preparing our children for the rigors of the digital age in a global economy. A quality education levels the playing field for the children of Kendrick, Juliaetta and the Seven Ridges. I am proud of the well-rounded, quality education our highly qualified staff provide for all of our children. Every employee knows the critical nature of our mission and is dedicated to serving our students. Our staff does a great job and one that is worthy of your continued support.

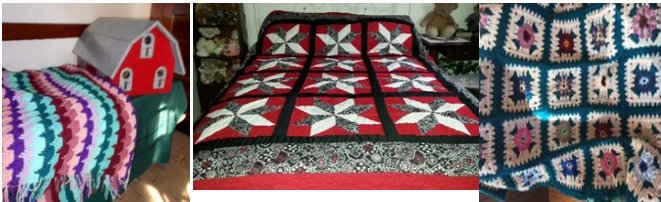

## New Faces At Gritman Clinic



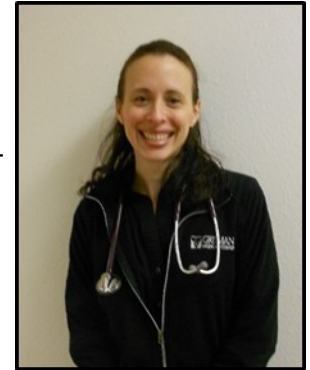

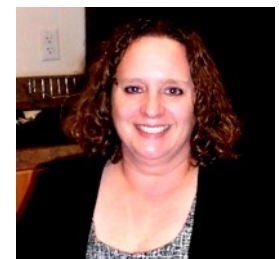

## TURN AROUND

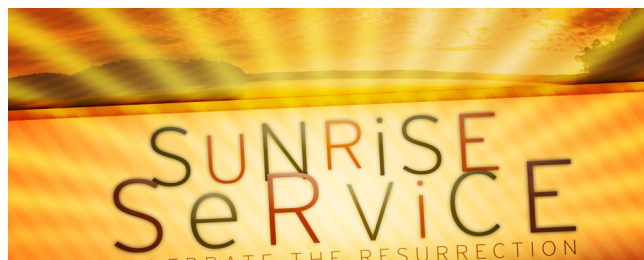
As we begin the transition from the dormancy of winter into the new growth of spring, we once again find ourselves amid the season of Lent with its call to solemn reflection and repentance in contrast to, and in anticipation of, the upcoming joy of Easter.

A call to repentance may literally be thought of as making a 180° turn in the other direction. If one is going south, then to repent is to turn around and head north. Repentance is a call to turn in God's direction and to turn away from our self-interest. Repentance is a call to come home to our loving Father; much like the story of the forgiving father and wayward son that we find in Luke's Gospel (Lk. 15:11-32).

When we turn toward God, we find that God is already headed toward us. Our Lenten journey leads us to Jerusalem and to our Lord's Passion. It is in the words of Jesus at the Last Supper where we hear of his desire for a deep and abiding relationship with each of us. It is at the foot of the cross that we see how far our God is willing to go for our sake. And it is at the empty tomb on Easter morning where we find the surprising, grace-filled joy that awaits us one day.

Lent, in the words of Dr. Rich Bimier, "is not the time to remind the Lord that we are trying harder in our faith life, but rather the time to realize that regardless of how hard we try, we are never going to redeem ourselves." When we turn away from our own selfish ambition and recall the selfless sacrifice of Christ, we then begin to blossom and grow in faith, hope, and love. We then become the Easter people God intends us to be.

## Seniors at KHS Lead all the Way

The State Board of Education started requiring a Senior Project as a requirement for graduation beginning in 2013. The project must contain a written paper, a portfolio, and a public presentation of the final product.

This year the High School will host a program on March 23 and 24<sup>th</sup>. The public will be welcomed to view these outstanding projects. The students will display their projects during Parent/Teacher conferences and all is open to the public from 3:30 pm to 7:00 pm. Under the direction of Jennifer Ingalls these students have excelled in their various areas of interest.

### ***More details from Harley Cope...***

Throughout the first semester, the graduating class of 2016 worked hard to research their topics, write a ten page paper, and successfully execute their projects. As the new semester begins, Kendrick High School's senior class experiences a wave of relief after they've completed their senior projects. The projects themselves held a wide range of variety; Layne Harris researched regulations on and established a 3D printer, while Samantha Schroeder and Dallas Evernden hosted and coached a "Teeny Tigers Softball Camp." Kylee Sneve even observed her mentor, Jane Zyph, at Kadlec Regional Medical Center to further her education in the medical field.

Taylor Holden's project included helping Amy Brogan with Group Home placement in order to help foster kids. She learned about the complicated process, along with seeing the reality of the things that foster kids experience. Taylor claims that this project will have an influence on her and her career; she plans on going into family law so that she can have a more important role in helping foster kids. The same goes for Holli Heinen, who created a water safety video and display to raise money to buy the Kendrick Memorial Pool new lifejackets as her project. She would like to continue teaching swimming lessons as a water safety instructor, and thinks that the experiences with young children would be valuable going into elementary education. Holli wanted to spread the awareness of the dangers of aquatic environments while taking into consideration who it would affect and why it would help our small community.

Some of the projects included more hands-on labor, such as those of Jon Gilmore and Jarred Kasper. Jon's project was a "Leland Sign Facelift." He says that building the sign was the most fun part, but it was also interesting to learn about the history of the town. Jarred Kasper also valued learning about the history of Juli-

aetta and Kendrick when he helped clean the Grange Museum as part of the KHS Community Service Day. Jarred says that he's proud to be more knowledgeable about the community that he lives in, and is glad he was able to give back.

Projects like Kadence Lanier's and Ashley Wegner's however, were completed almost strictly through software on computers. Kadence Lanier chose to look at photo-manipulation in digital photography. She made a PowerPoint (including photos she had taken) before and after they had been edited using programs like Lightroom and Photoshop. By completing this project, Kadence learned the ethics behind photo manipulation, as well as what a big difference editing can make in a picture. Ashley Wegner performed a similar process, except she created her own video game and researched why women typically didn't enter Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) fields. Ashley had to take into consideration her hobbies, skills, the challenges, and perhaps most of all her inexperience. Both Kadence and Ashley claim that these projects will help them in their careers, mostly valuing the experiences. Kadence says that she will be using images in the future as a graphic designer, so she's glad that she learned the affects that photo manipulation can have on an audience (including hopes to prevent the public from being exposed to false-advertisement in the future). Ashley's excited to be able to put this in her portfolio – she'll be able to show that she has experience in this field and is knowledgeable on the topic.

Other students specifically enjoyed working with their mentors. Connor Steiger decided that farming would be an interesting topic, since he held previous knowledge about it, and the most fun part was working with his mentor, Richard Silflow. Connor said that the most difficult part of his project was understanding how seeding poundage worked. Allen Longstreet also liked working with his mentor, Mr. McDowell, on the germinating process of seeds. Allen's project included the study of foreign plants being brought into native culture, learning that it's difficult to grow tea and coffee plants.

Lastly, Lucas Lysne investigated audio stimulation in autistic individuals. Lucas took into consideration music, autism, and synesthesia while learning a lot about human experiment ethics. He says that the most fun part was collecting the data, while the hardest part was his experiment. The experiment included testing twelve autistic kids by asking them to listen to musical tracks that Lucas made, but all had different underlying tones of white noise (he wanted to know whether or not the white noise would help the kids).

As you can see, each individual worked very hard on their projects, and all take pride in certain aspects. Some will be able to apply what they've learned into college or their careers, and others appreciated the history behind our small community that their projects revolved around.

**Elementary School Principal's Report**

In the best of times elementary teachers are thoughtful counselors, listeners, disciplinarians, coaches and instructors. In the worst of times they are all those things too, but perhaps not so thoughtful, more quick tempered, and overwhelmed with the demands of their jobs and the problems of those whom they teach and care for.

Teaching elementary school children is one of the most challenging occupations in the world - among the most rewarding under good conditions, and one of the most frustrating under poor ones.

What amazes me is even with budget constraints, rising class sizes, the gutting of physical education programs and libraries, and all the mandated testing, the staff at Juliaetta Elementary still welcomes each new school day with fresh anticipation. There's a hopefulness that despite the many problems, the upcoming school day will somehow bring new opportunities to teach creatively and help our students grow and mature.

Why do our teachers have such hopeful notions at the beginning of each new day? What gives teaching such powerful potential? Without a doubt, teaching elementary school children is a venerable occupation. All teaching matters, and all levels of teaching offer unique challenges and opportunities. But there is something especially essential about teaching at Juliaetta Elementary.

First, it's our children. Their curiosity. Their energy. Their sense of fairness. And the fact they've not yet been conditioned to all of the habits and prejudices of adulthood. Their inquisitiveness is amazing. Their questions are endless. And teaching them offers rich opportunities to weave together math and writing, science and reading, social studies and the real world.

Of course, there still needs to be explicit and sequential instruction in core subjects, but those same subjects are most engaging and most motivating to students when they are integrated together. I admire every one of our teachers at Juliaetta Elementary School. Kendrick and Juliaetta are very fortunate to have such a caring and dedicated cadre of professional educators serving our children.

**Johnson Manor Apartments under new ownership**

The Johnson Manor Apartments in Juliaetta is seeing some major changes. Last summer Greg and Brenda Ahmann purchased the building and started working on long-deferred maintenance. On December 19<sup>th</sup>, 2015, they hosted an open house to showcase the improvements and interest new tenants.

The outside of the building has been scraped and painted. All the carpet was taken up inside and the hallways and common area covered with vinyl flooring. Each unit has been cleaned and painted. New rules are now in effect. Some people had to leave and others moved in. Eleven units were rented and 11 were available for rent as of mid-December. The cost of rent for a 1-bedroom apartment is \$500 a month and requires a 1-year lease contract. Heat and utilities are included in the rent. Washers and dryers are also available.

The complex was built in the early 1970s and managed as a retirement home. Later it became an apartment complex without retired status restrictions. In addition to the apartments there is a commons area with an adjacent kitchen and new couches, coffee table and artwork on the walls. People have been gathering there Monday evenings for line dancing.

What happens when a group of community leaders, devoted citizens, library patrons, and employees share a vision for a gathering place, learning space, and a place to innovate? Dreams of a new library begin to form. That is exactly what happened when a committee hit the ground running with that vision and soon organized themselves into the Community Library Project (CLP) in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area. Their mission statement reads, "*The Community Library Project is a group of community members working in partnership with the Latah County Library District to build a new and improved library. At its completion, we will not only have a more efficient library, but also a useful community meeting space and a satellite sheriff's office. The new Juliaetta Community Library will be a place that brings people, information, ideas, and resources together to support our communities and enrich lives.*"

The existing Juliaetta Community Library, one of seven locations in the Latah County Library District, opened in 1977 in the donated Rebekah Lodge building on Main Street. The building is now owned by the city of Juliaetta and library operations are funded and conducted by the library district. After weeks of investigating various location possibilities, the CLP determined that a new library would probably be built on the library's existing site, replacing a rapidly deteriorating building that is not economically feasible to remodel. Currently the CLP is in its infancy: exploring fundraising opportunities, researching architectural and demolition options, and partnering with various community entities. Initial plans call for a larger library, increased number of shelves, a teen area, a meeting space, compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, and a satellite sheriff's office.

Our vision for a new, larger, and even *more* user-friendly library will take much work and many hands; however, the result will be a library that will be the heart of our communities, both Kendrick and Juliaetta, and surrounding areas. ## *Meet Your Neighbor...*

Almost 90 years old, Donna Cope was born, raised and continues to live in her hometown of Juliaetta, Idaho.

When Donna was seventeen years old, her father died from high blood pressure and her mother died three months later when her clothes caught on fire. Her brother was in the military and told his sister, "Whatever you do, make sure you finish high school."

Donna was determined to stay in her home alone even when others thought she needed to give it up. "I have to have a place for my brother to come home," she would say.

Donna attended school half days and worked half days at Knights Grocery Store in Juliaetta to make ends meet. Tragically, her brother was killed in action soon after she lost her parents.

A small restaurant opened in Juliaetta and Donna was the cook when Onal Cope came to Juliaetta looking for work. He started coming to the restaurant every day and even though Onal and Donna only knew each other three months, they were married and enjoyed marriage for 52 years. "I wanted a family because I didn't have one," said Donna. "Family is very important to me."

Onal and Donna had two children, Fred and Debbie. They were heartbroken when their son was killed in a car accident in 1981. Their daughter lives in Juliaetta.

Donna's most memorable job was at Juliaetta Elementary School as secretary for 33 years. Donna was also in charge of fundraising for the school and discipline for students who were sent out of the classroom. "I loved the kids," she says.

Donna took a first aid class and volunteered with the ambulance service. The ambulance was an old station wagon and Donna was often the only one available to drive and give patient care. Even with curlers in her hair, Donna was ready at a moment's notice!

Donna and her husband had a passion for antiques and purchased many in their lifetime. They were also co-owners of the Juliaetta Castle Museum with Chuck and Phyllis Noble for many years until Nobles sold their half to the Copes.

Gonzaga Basketball has been Donna's college team for over seven years. She sent cookies to the Gonzaga team and now corresponds with Mark Few and some members of the team. One of the players gave Donna a book about their school and every year she receives player trading cards.

Donna is a big sports fan, especially when it comes to her grandchildren who participate in basketball, wrestling, karate, FFA and other school activities. Donna has five grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Donna is called "Grandma Cookie" because her cookies were a special treat for her family. When everyone gets together, Donna is also known for her big turkey dinners and huckleberry jam.

Donna says, "Let me live in a house by the side of the road and be a friend to all." This lady is definitely someone you want to know. There are more stories to tell, and not enough room to print them. Meet your neighbor, Donna Cope.

## Watching for a Robin



As with many birds, the wintering range of American Robins is affected by weather and natural food supply, but as long as food is available, these birds are able to do well for themselves by staying up north.

Robins seem to disappear every winter, however, they are not migratory. Many of these birds stay in the north as long as favorable weather and a plentiful food supply are available. In winter their behavior changes and they form nomadic flocks, which can consist of hundreds to thousands of birds. They show up wherever there are plentiful fruits on trees and shrubs, such as crabapples, hawthorns, holly, and juniper.

When spring rolls around, they go their separate ways. That is when we start seeing robins yanking worms out of our yards again. They are making the switch from members of the flock to being aggressive in defending a territory in advance of courting and raising chicks.

Robins are known as the harbinger of spring, and I cannot wait to see the first one.
