Senior Projects: Wrapping Up Senior Year

Senior Aiden McCollum

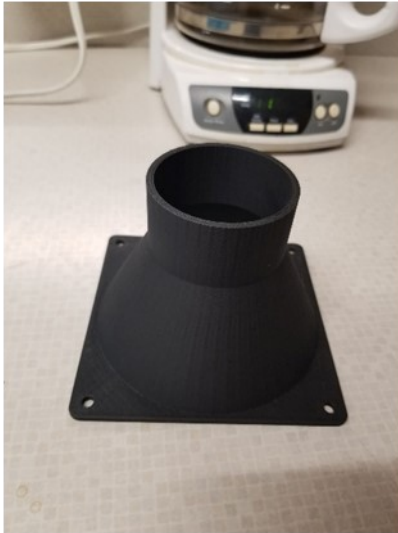
Aiden McCollum is a senior at Kendrick High School who will graduate this spring. For his senior project, he built a ventilation system for the 3-D printer at KHS. The 3-D printer emits fumes that can be harmful if inhaled, so Aiden worked with Mr. McDowell to create a system that would solve the emission problem.

Aiden became interested in 3-D printing when he took Environmental Science from Mr. McDowell. The teacher challenged the class to find a problem that they could solve with the 3-D printer. Aiden started by printing a fully functional Rubik's cube. He then created other items, such as dry boxes for the printer. Students found that the 3-D printer was a way for them to create and design things that could solve a variety of problems. Aiden started the project in the fall shortly after school started and only recently finished it. He used the 3-D printer to print the parts for the ventilation system. Mr. McDowell, his mentor for the project, helped him with the planning and ordered the needed vacuum pump. Once the pump arrived, it took about three weeks to finish. Aiden had to design and create adapters to connect the back of the printer to the vacuum pump; he used the 3-D printer to create the needed parts. The ventilation pump now circulates the air away from the printing spaces and the students in the room.

The project was funded with grants that Mr. McDowell applied for early in the school year. Mr. McDowell created a plan, and then Aiden worked with Mr. McDowell to modify that plan, changing it to fit their needs.

After graduation, Aiden is planning to study mechanical engineering. He believes this experience with the 3-D printer has been valuable in helping him choose that path because he enjoyed the project so much.

Because of this interest, Megan decided to shadow her dad as he builds an Avid airplane. The airplane comes in a kit with just

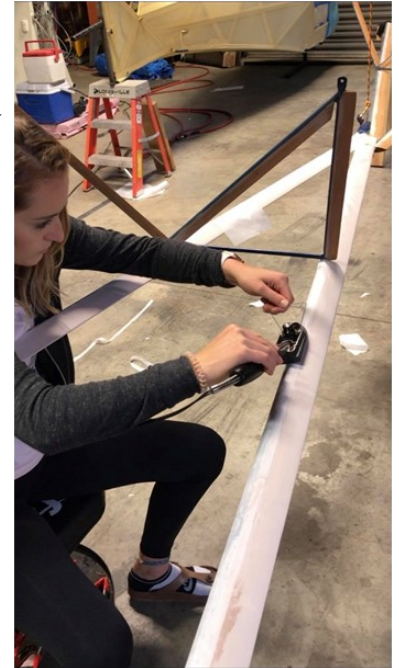
about everything you need to build it. Burt Brocke is taking Megan through the various steps of building the plane. She says she is learning a great deal about mechanics and airplanes in general.

The two have been working on the plane as time allows throughout the school year. They are building it in their shop, and once it is finished, they will have someone come and inspect it to make sure everything is correct and ready to fly.

Seniors complete a research paper as a companion project to the hands-on portion, and Megan researched safety in airplane construction. She learned that every step must be completed carefully and methodically when building an airplane. If a builder uses the wrong hardware, fuselage materials, or any other incorrect parts, the results could be disastrous in the air.

Megan truly appreciates the time and patience her dad has shown as they have worked on this project.

New Plastic Recycling Opportunity at City Hall

A new plastic film recycling program is being introduced in Juliaetta. A collection box is at City Hall and will be available during regular office hours. The program accepts bags for bread, newspaper, produce, dry-cleaning, ice, and Ziploc, all plastic shopping bags, bubble mailers, case overwrap, and cereal liners. Plastic packaging/bags/wrap with the #2 or #4 designation (like on produce bags) are also accepted. As a general rule, if the item is clear and stretchy it is accepted. All items must be clean, dry, and free of any food residue. These recyclables can also be taken to the Moscow Recycling Center the first Saturday of each month 9:30 am -5:30 pm. The material will be shipped to NextTrex and recycled into composite decking. This is a pilot program and subject to change.

April is Clean Up Month

The time for spring cleaning is upon us! On the first and third Saturdays in April, 8:00 am-4:00 pm, the Bulky Waste Site will also accept household trash, including rubber and plastic, along with demolition waste, yard debris, and four passenger tires. So that everyone can take advantage of this opportunity, you are limited to two trips per household. Extremely large loads must be taken to the Transfer Station at 3299 Hwy 8 (Troy Hwy) on April 11 and 25.

A Free Shred Day will also be offered Saturday, April 25 from 9:00 am-3:00 pm at the Latah County Fairgrounds in Moscow. Latah County residents may bring up to three paper grocery bags full for professional shredding.

Upcoming City Council meetings will be held on Tuesday, March 10 and Tuesday, April 14. Meetings begin at 7:00 pm. 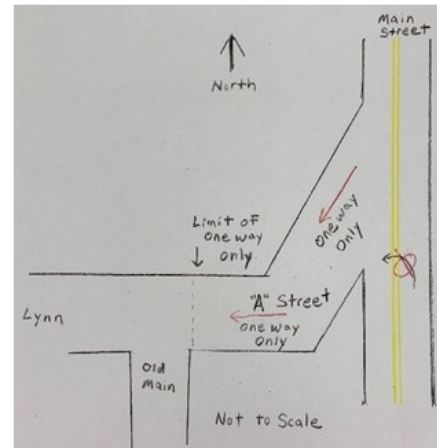

Proposed Juliaetta Traffic Revision

Juliaetta Fire Chief Mike McGee has submitted two proposals for consideration to Juliaetta City Council “to increase traffic safety by reconfiguring the flow of motor vehicle traffic at the intersection of Main and A Streets.” His proposals were prompted by witnessing and experiencing close calls himself, as well as a recent motor vehicle accident at the location wherein a northbound vehicle on Main Street attempting a left-hand turn onto A Street was struck by a southbound vehicle on Main Street.

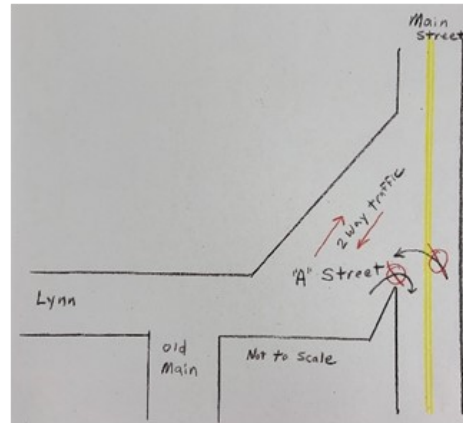
City Council would like to know Juliaetta residents’ opinions on this traffic revision proposal. Public comment will be heard at the regular Council meeting to be held Tuesday, April 14 at 7:00 pm.

Proposal 1 would make A Street ONE WAY southbound from Main Street onto A Street as far as Old Main Street. It would treat A Street as an “off ramp” from Main Street for southbound traffic, and would prohibit left hand turns to northbound traffic from Main Street onto A Street.



Proposal 2 would maintain the current 2-way traffic configuration, but would prohibit left hand turns to southbound traffic from Main Street onto A Street, and prohibit right hand turns to southbound traffic from A Street onto Main Street.

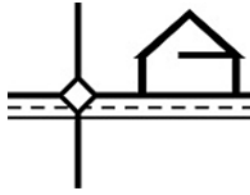
The Clock Repairman's Tale Tom Crooks

After retiring as a professional engineer with the U.S. Department of the Interior, I decided to find something to lend respectability to my retirement without having to really work. Casting around for a field that wouldn't require much of my time, would not involve a whole lot of work, and sounded good when someone asked "what do you do?", I settled on clock repair. After all, mechanical clocks are pretty much a thing of the past, like buggy whips-how many can there be around? I thought most people depended on their various electronic devices for the time, which certainly would seem to limit demand for a repairman. As a clock repairman, I would have the best of all possible worlds-few calls for me to actually do anything, a great job title, plus prestige. After all, how many clock repairmen are there around? This was my plan for a carefree retirement 20 years ago. The upside was plenty of free time for other interests like shooting, fishing, and camping with even some to spare to continue to farm. There didn't appear to be any downside. To make sure someone didn't actually expect me to fix a clock and find out that I was a fraud, I spent three years working in a clock shop learning how to fix every type of clock that came into the shop. After that, I got a fancy business card, laid in some tools and hung out my shingle. Like a lot of "foolproof" plans to avoid actual work, this plan has a serious flaw. To my surprise and consternation, clocks-cuckoo, wall, mantle, grandfather, chiming, striking and time only—started coming from everywhere. Additionally, their owners expected me to fix the darn things. So, to avoid exposure as a fake clock guy, I fixed everything. Even with all this unexpected work, I still found a little time to do some shooting, fishing and even a little farming. After more than 20 years of this, I formulated a new plan: Find someone who really wants a job with little or no work to take my place in the clock fixing field. I got lucky and found a bored retired computer programmer to train. When he was able to do the job, we moved from Joseph, OR to Juliaetta to avoid having my old customers find me. At this point in time, I still do clock repair, concentrating on grandfather clocks and some of the circa 1815-1870 period clocks for people who want them restored. Of course I will work on most clocks, but some take a lot more crying and carrying on to convince me sometimes. My wife Treva takes care of the business end and calms me down when there is a problem and I start to rant. Actually we really like clocks and have enjoyed meeting and knowing their owners over the years. Many old clocks have interesting family histories and deserve to be running and treasured. We both hope we can provide clock repair services to Juliaetta, Kendrick and the 7 Ridges community. A Glimpse of Historical Flood Damage

During the spring of 1948, this area suffered a deluge of rainfall causing local creeks to go on the rampage. Besides Potlatch being at flood stage, Bear Creek was also roaring and taking its toll as it roared downstream. The homes of Nettie Genry, S. B. Mill, Walter Luman, C. H. Fry, Manning Onstott, and Herman Travis were threatened. The flood waters washed out the city dump and deposited debris on the new city “ball park”, as well as on people’s lawns.

In addition to ripping out railroad tracks, the Bear Creek flood waters tore the bridge from its abutments and carried the structure downstream several hundred feet. This left everyone east of Kendrick stranded. Students from the east end of the district were carried across temporary planks by members of the road district. Doris Shreffler Hanson remembers Ed Brown taking her piggy-back across the structure to get her to and from school. She was terrified and kept a choke hold on her ride. Many children were carried to school this way by the road crew.

In the west end of Kendrick, Brady Gulch again did its worst in depositing boulders and debris on the ball diamond and the road. Homes in Kendrick were threatened with flooding.

Ernest Brammer is credited with saving the day by mounting his “trusty” bulldozer and cleaning a path to resume traffic on both the American Ridge Road and the road leading to Lewiston.

The Juliaetta area suffered the loss of two bridges across the Potlatch. The first led to Halliday, Prideaux, and Young homes. The second was located near the Juliaetta Depot. The Middle Fork of the Potlatch River flooded washing out the roads and stranding folks up Cook’s Canyon. The Spaulding Bridge

Pastor's Corner

CAMERON EMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH

TURN! TURN! TURN!

This was the title track of an album released by the folk-rock band *The Byrds* in 1965. Barring the final line of the song, the lyrics (put to music by Pete Seger in 1959) come from the book of Ecclesiastes, a book of the Bible found in the Old Testament. In the third chapter of Ecclesiastes the author notes that “for everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven.” This citation (Eccl 3:1 NRSV) becomes the chorus for the song with the different verses of the song corresponding to the verses found in Ecclesiastes.

As this publication is being distributed, we find ourselves at the beginning of the Lenten season. Lent is a time for deep introspection. Lent is also a time for true contrition and repentance. Lent is a call to turn away from ourselves and turn back to God. In the ancient biblical languages, repentance is more literally translated as turning around and facing a new direction, doing a 180 if you will. The season of Lent offers one an opportunity to seek a new path or return to the highway after a detour or two (or more).

Repentance is sometimes confused with being apologetic or a feeling of guilt or shame. Repentance goes deeper than “I’m sorry.” Repentance is an invitation to change one’s mind and heart; to turn from the way of destruction and head toward the One who gives life – Jesus Christ. In Christ, our sins are forgiven. We not only have Jesus’ word on that, we have his very own innocent and precious body and blood as well.

Repentance is not easy. It is hard work. Any meaningful change usually is. But the invitation is always present – Turn! Turn! Turn! We aren’t alone in our journey. God has promised to help us through the gift of the Holy Spirit. Lent is a time to “recalculate our route” and turn in the right direction. We continue to get sidetracked. We struggle with denying ourselves and taking up our cross. But the events of Holy Week following Lent remind us of how far Christ is willing to go on our behalf – all the way to the cross!

All this serves as a prelude to the sweet symphony of Easter morning alleluias trumpeting the sounds of victory over death and the grave.

As we transition from winter to spring, the seasons of Lent and Easter are upon us. We continue our tradition of hosting Lenten mid-week services on Wednesday evenings at 7 PM. Those dates are March 4th, March 11th, March 18th, March 25th and April 1st. Reflections on the passage from Philippians 2:5-11 will be our focus. Sunday morning worship begins at 10 AM. We will be celebrating Holy Communion each Sunday during Lent. Another Lenten season tradition is collecting items for health kits which are part of a partnership program with Lutheran World Relief. The kits are distributed throughout the globe to people in need.

Last month, the congregation joined in marking the 30th anniversary of the Souper Bowl of Caring. The proceeds from that collection were given to our local food bank. Upcoming events include **March 19th** – The **Spring Meeting of the Clearwater District** is being planned by the Nezperce Garden Club. A number of HVGC members will be attending. It is such a great opportunity to meet other gardeners from Moscow, Lewiston, Nezperce, Kooskia/Kamiah. Red-winged black birds



A red-winged blackbird is slightly smaller and slimmer than a robin (males are 8.7 to 9.4”,

beak to tail-tip; females 6.7 to 7.1” long). He is a glossy black bird with red shoulder patches and bright yellow wing bars below. These colorful markers can be displayed or hidden, depending on his mood of the moment, but they are always displayed when in flight. She is dark brown and buff striped and may resemble a large sparrow.

There may be more red-winged blackbirds than any other land bird in North America. Winter bird censuses can tally over a million birds per flock, and flocks are common. Blackbirds range from southern Alaska to the Yucatan peninsula and east to west across the continent.

The birds that breed and nest in the north migrate south in the winter. Birds in western North America and in Central America are generally non-migratory. In our area, red-wing blackbirds migrate, with the males starting to arrive late February. Females will follow a little later. This gives each male a chance to claim territory – often the same area he used in previous years. A successful territory is frequently near water or swampy ground. A cattail marsh offers the perfect habitat, but meadows, prairies and old fields will do in a pinch. The male will spend much of the summer on a high perch, singing his heart out. The song broadcasts claim to “his spot” and advertises its attributes to unattached females. He attempts to attract not one mate, but as many as 10 or 12, all building nests within the claimed territory.

The female is far more self-effacing. While he is advertising to the world, she will be slinking quietly among the reeds and vegetation. She sometimes slinks out of the territory as well, and mates with neighboring males. As many as half the nestlings may have been fathered by males other than the owner of the territory.

Domestic chores fall to the female who creates a nest-support by binding vertical reeds together. Then she weaves in a collection of cattails, rushes, and grasses. She adds a layer of wet leaves and then mud to form a bowl which is lined with fine, dry grass. A naturalist in the 1930’s picked apart a nest and recorded among the components 34 strips of willow bark and 142 cattail leaves - some 2 feet long. The finished nest is 4 to 7” across and 3 to 7” deep. Each female may raise 1 or 2 broods of 2-4 young, each brood raised in a separate nest.

That gives you something to think about when the familiar “Cong-a-lee” announces male redwings are back and spring is almost here.
