Kendrick Jt. School District Superintendent's Report

Today's 6th Graders in Mrs. Brammer's class will hit their Prime Working Years in 2030. Technological change, globalization, and even climate change seem to be happening at an accelerating pace. Artificial intelligence (AI) and automation are the engines driving much of the transformation in the workplace. What this means, according to Thomas L. Friedman in his latest book, *Thank You For Being Late*, is that "in this age of acceleration, everyone is going to have to raise their game in the classroom and for their whole lifetime."

So, what skills do students need to succeed in the uncertain, intensely competitive workplace of the future? Kendrick School District students, of course, will continue to need a solid grounding in core academics, especially math, science, and literacy. But what else? Given that no one really knows which skills will be in demand, the default for public schools must be teaching students to *learn-how-to-learn*. Mrs. Brammer's sixth graders will need to be able to acquire new skills throughout their lifetimes just to stay employable.

When it comes to predicting the future of work, top economists and technologists are all over the map. So, what does the changing nature of work mean for public schools? What skills do our teachers need to train our students to be able to do in order to prepare them for their futures? Will the jobs available now still be around in 2030? Should every student learn to code? What about apprenticeships, career-and-technical education, and lifelong learning?

In 2014, the Pew Research Center surveyed 1,896 technology experts. Nearly half said they envision a future in which robots have displaced significant numbers of both blue- and white-collar workers (Aaron Smith and Janna Anderson. *AI, Robotics, and the Future of Jobs*. August 8, 2014).

Importantly, what can Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick Jr/Sr. High School teachers do to prepare students today to engage in the job market they will participate in during their prime working years? The time to have these discussions is soon, because one thing the experts agree on is *change is coming*.

Idaho parents can sign their pre-K kids up for free online learning now Smarty Ants

(BOISE) – Idaho's new web-based program to help children get ready for reading and kindergarten is ready to roll, and parents are encouraged to sign up online at <http://ww2.achieve3000.com/SmartyIdaho>. Smarty Ants is intended to make free, interactive learning available to children before they enter kindergarten. The five-year agreement between the State Department of Education and the online literacy program Achieve3000 was approved by the State Board of Education April 5 and is free for the state as well as for families. "In the few days between last week's acceptance of the Smarty Ants grant and the website going live, we have already heard from numerous parents anxious to sign their 4-year-olds up for this free, fun online program," Superintendent of Public Instruction Sherri Ybarra said Tuesday. "Our hope is that every Idaho child headed for kindergarten will use Smarty Ants to help build a strong foundation for loving reading and succeeding in school." Smarty Ants is open to all Idaho 4-year-olds as well as children who have already turned 5 but are not yet in kindergarten. When parents sign up, they will be greeted by introductory videos and a coloring sheet to help children become familiar with the colorful animated characters that will lead them through their journey to kindergarten readiness. As children progress through lesson games, parents can monitor their child's progress via an online dashboard and other tools. The JES History Club has had a fun and eventful year. In November we traveled to Spokane to visit the Titanic exhibit. In January we began working on our research project title, "*Where Are They Now? The Mystery Artists at JES.*" Mrs. Tweit taught us how to think like a historian and find out who painted the pictures from 1981 and the stories behind them. We also learned the important of preservation. In February we visited the museum in Kendrick with a guided tour from Sharon Harris and Jan Patterson. In March we toured the Juliaetta Castle with Justin Cope. In April we had our Night at the Museum event where we shared our research projects and held an open house at the Kendrick Museum. Our favorite part of history club is hearing stories about the past (especially ghost stories!) and taking field trips.

KJ7 Education Foundation Announces “Tiger of Distinction” for 2018

What could be more inspiring for KHS students than to meet with graduates who have excelled in their chosen career paths and ways of life? That is what the Foundation’s Tiger of Distinction program offers, and the inaugural honoree was a huge hit. U.S. Navy Admiral Kenneth Heimgartner is a hard act to follow, but we think we have found just the man for the job in Jim Peavey. The following article will provide a brief introduction to our honoree for 2018.

James Peavey, KHS Class of 1978

Jim Peavey lived in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area from 1974-1978, and as he said, “It was the most important five years of my life during that time.” He started school in Kendrick as an eighth grader, and graduated from Kendrick High School. Jim then joined the U.S. Navy, and served as an air traffic controller for five years, 1978-1983, stationed at Whidbey Naval Air Station and Guam. He then worked in air traffic control for the FAA for 27 years, until retiring in 2009.



Jim serves on the Board of Directors of Puget Sound Honor Flight, an organization with the mission “to transport Western Washington war veterans to Washington D.C., to visit and reflect at memorials dedicated to honor their service and sacrifices.” By the beginning of 2013 the program had transported more than 100,000 war veterans to Washington D.C. to attend their memorials. The organization’s focus has been on World War II veterans, but in the future they will be expanding their services to include Korean and Vietnam war veterans, and those who have served in more recent wars.

As Jim has written, “I love World War II history and had a very good friend who was a World War II veteran pass away not long ago. I had learned of Honor Flight through my wife, and thought it would be a wonderful way to honor his memory, by becoming a guardian. With the lack of a hub in Western Washington, we worked to get Puget Sound Honor Flight up and running so we could honor our local veterans and get these quiet heroes back to see their memorial—to say thank you to our ‘Greatest Generation.’” Jim’s father had a career in the U.S. Air Force, and his uncle served as an Army field medic in both World War II and the Korean War. His work in this organization honors their service as well.

Jim will make his presentation to the students at KHS, but a public event will also be held on Friday, May 25th at 1:00 PM at the KJ Senior Meals Site. We hope you will attend, and help to celebrate the newest Tiger of Distinction.

From Graduation to the Military

Over the past four years, we have had a few students that graduated and enlisted into the military. I had the chance to talk to five of those past KHS students about their experience in their designated branches. The students I talked to were; Dylan James White, Caleb Olson, Megan Heimgartner (MH), Dallas Evernden(DE), and Abbi Scheline(AS). This article features Abbi, Dallas, and Megan. I asked them some questions about what they thought about the military from their point of view and what they thought about future graduates enlisting as well. **First, I asked each of them the year they graduated and what branch they were in.**

MH: I graduated in May 2015, and I’m in the Navy.

DE: 2016, and I’m in the Navy

AS: I graduated last year, and I went into Navy basic training the 6th of February.

I then asked them what they thought about future graduates going into the military and what advice they would give to them.

MH: As far as if future graduates should think about a future serving, I believe it should at least be considered. The military is definitely not for everyone. It’s difficult to describe the experience of being in the military, because everyone’s story is different. For those looking to join, the best source of basic information would definitely be a recruiter, but I would advise that the recruiter NOT be their ONLY source of information. If you want to get to know what the experience might be like for you, ask around to people who you know are in or have been in.

DE: Yes, I think they should! Honestly, what else are you going to do? Advice...like, why not? Definitely get into shape beforehand. Respect your elders, be a good person, that’s really all you need. There are some good benefits, you get free college and free traveling. It’s a family, everyone has each other’s back no matter what.

AS: I think it’s something everyone should get the chance to do. You get to play with some cool stuff, too. If it’s something you’ve wanted to do, pursue it!

Last, I asked them what the easiest and hardest part about being in the military was.

DE: Easiest part would be the fact that you don’t have to plan the day. The hardest part would be being away from family and friends.

I would like to thank each and every past KHS graduate who is serving, or has served for our country, for everything they have done!



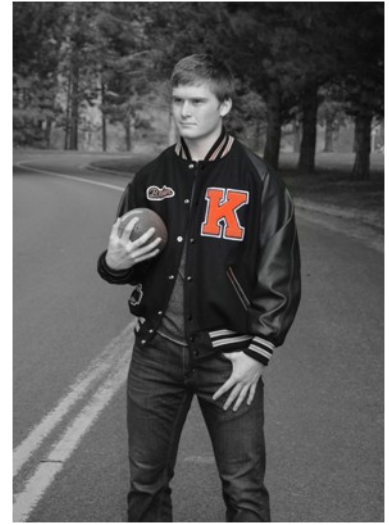

Lachy plans on pursuing a computer science and computer engineering major at the U of I.



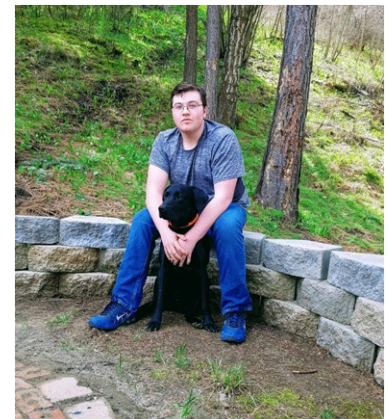

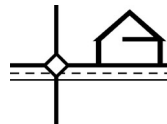
VFW membership has decided to sell their hall and the property it sits on.

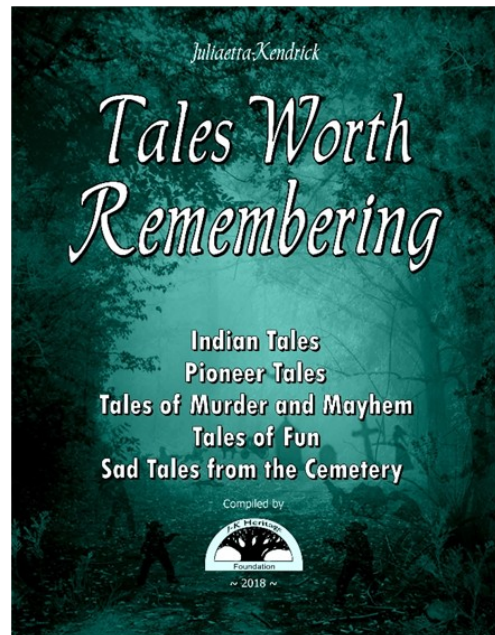

Presentation on CCC in Idaho

Ivar Nelson and Patricia Hart of the University of Idaho treated Kendrick and Juliaetta residents, as well as many out-of-towners, to a most interesting presentation of the CCC in Idaho. The program was held at the Fraternal Temple with JKHF and the Juliaetta Library hosting on April 12th.

President Roosevelt's Civilian Conservation Corp had a great impact on Idaho during the depression years 1933-1942. Over 86,000 men worked in Idaho's 270 camps making trails, building roads and bridges, stringing telephone lines, fighting fires, planting trees and fighting blister rust. Moreover, nearly 30,000 Idaho men found jobs in the CCC in a time when joblessness was rampant.

The CCC men worked with national and state forests and parks, soil conservation agencies, and national grazing programs. Many rural towns were saved during the Depression by selling food and goods to the CCC camps and by the CCC employing local men. While Kendrick did not have a camp, there were camps at Bovill, Genesee, Moscow, Potlatch, and Troy. Kendrick had a threatening fire in August



1936, which was extinguished quickly by the CCC men. Seven truckloads came to the rescue and squelched the 100 acre fire that threatened the Freytag and Wegner properties. The fire was blamed on a careless smoker.

Forest fires in Idaho diminished during the 1930s with the presence of the men.

When World War II broke out, these men were in the front lines of military enlistment. 1942 saw the end of the CCC camps. Young men who came to Idaho poor, hungry and with few skills, left with confidence, skills and money in their pocket. Some made Idaho their permanent home.

Little Yellow Birds

Our area has three species of little yellow birds. All of them are busy little fellows and a glimpse of yellow in the trees may be all you see.

The best known of these “flits” is the American Goldfinch. During breeding season (i.e. in the spring and early summer) the male is as yellow as a crayon with a black cap and black wings with white bars. The black cap extends from the top of the head to the base of the bill. All but the cap, wings and tail are yellow. Females and out-of-season males trade bright yellow for pale yellow to light olive green – but the dark wings with white wing bars plus pinkish cone-shaped beak are the giveaways. At 5” from tip of beak to end of tail. This is a small bird.

Once you know the American Goldfinch, when you see the Lesser Goldfinch, you may think “there is something wrong about that bird.” The lesser goldfinch is slightly smaller (4.5”) and has an olive green back. The upper side of the bird is dark from cap on the head to the tip of the tail. In the southern states, the upper portion of the bird is black; here it tends to be olive green. The underside of the bird is yellow as a goldfinch should be, but the wings are not as distinctly marked as those of the American Goldfinch.

The goldfinches are year-around residents. If you have bird feeders out, especially thistle seed feeders, you probably have goldfinches. Their love of thistle seed and thistle down (for nests) gives them one of their nicknames: thistle birds. They are sometimes called wild canaries. Goldfinches fly in bouncy, undulating groups and flock together with other small birds such as house finches, pine siskin's, and western bluebirds.

In April or May, our third yellow flit arrives. The yellow warbler is the yellowiest of all the little birds, just a little butterball. It prefers small trees and shrubs such as willows and alders, which it scours for insects. The male has russet streaks on the breast, streaks that are much fainter to nonexistent on the female. Their spring song is an easy-to-identify “sweet-sweet-sweet-I’m so sweet.” The yellow warbler is much the same size as the American Goldfinch, but has a narrow black bill and none of the dark markings associated with the goldfinches.

A little yellow bird you see here in the winter is probably one of the goldfinches, particularly if it is with other birds in open areas. Lesser goldfinches especially like seeds of the sunflower family such as thistles and asters. They will occasionally eat tiny insects. American goldfinches like thistles and grass seeds and are almost entirely vegetarian. They even raise their babies on seeds. In summer, a small yellow bird all by itself hunting insects and moving quickly around in small trees or shrubs is likely to be a yellow warbler. And now, if the bird will hold still, in plain sight for a few seconds, you can be sure.
