Soldier Stories from Foreign Wars

Families often sent a son off to war during World War II. However, the family of Ed and Olga Klette Halseth, who resided for many years on Big Bear Ridge, sent all but one of their seven children to the war effort. The children were all raised together on the family farm.

Ervin graduated from Kendrick High School in 1936 and enlisted with the Army in 1940. He served in the South Pacific Theater. He contracted a vicious case of malaria while serving in New Guinea. He was deployed to Australia and placed in charge of a supply depot.

Margaret graduated in 1938 and enrolled in the School of Nursing at Lewiston. She joined the Army Nurse Corp in 1943. She met her future husband, Stan Cox, in the military. They made the military a career.

Sister Helen graduated in 1940. She enlisted in the Navy in June of 1943. She worked as an aviation machinist during the war preparing planes for shipment overseas.

Arnold followed closely behind his sisters. He graduated with the Class of 1941. He joined the Army Air Corp in 1942 and was sent to England. From there he was sent to North Africa with General Patton. He accompanied Patton into Italy and France as a glider mechanic.

Gerald & Harold were twins. They were drafted into the Army together in 1950 and went for basic training at Ft. Ord. Harold served as a radio operator. Both of the boys were deployed to Germany.

Youngest brother, Orville, enlisted in 1953. He too went to Ft. Ord before being deployed to Hawaii and later to Korea. He finished his term of service in 1955.

The youngest daughter, Betty, wanted to enlist, but her father refused to have the entire family away in the war.

As we celebrate Veteran's Day November 11th, let us remember the remarkable service of the Halseth family. - Sharon Harris

Praise

As we come to November we often think of Thanksgiving as a reminder to give thanks to God. There are many scripture references that also encourage us to thank God and praise God, such as Ephesians 5:20, *And give thanks for everything to God the Father in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ.*

Here we see that we are to praise and thank God in all circumstances, the good times and the challenging times. When we praise God, we are letting go of the need to "see" first, and then submit. We don't wait until we feel like it to give thanks; we do it out of obedience. We stop fighting the circumstances and acknowledge God's participating presence.

This reminds me of the book, The Hiding Place, which is the story of Corrie Ten Boom, her sister Betsie, and their father who hid Jews in their home during World War II. They were eventually discovered and taken to concentration camps to live under despicable conditions. The sisters were placed in Barracks 28, where Corrie despaired of hope. Betsie suggested that they give thanks—that it would encourage their hearts. Corrie said that she could give thanks for everything but the fleas, which were everywhere and horrible to live with. As the days wore on, Corrie and Betsie had the freedom to talk to other prisoners, read the Bible with them, and minister without interference. Then one day a prisoner asked a guard to settle a dispute, and the guard said, "That place is crawling with fleas. I'm not stepping through the door." Corrie realized why they had been given such liberties in that place—even the fleas were instruments of God. Who knew!? God.

Praise may seem to be passive, at times when we stop and worship and rest in God's sovereignty. But it is also active, because when we give thanks, we are involving God, inviting God into the circumstance, and "getting out of the way."

The Importance of Parent Involvement

Education research supports the general idea that students do better in school when parents are involved in their education. Studies have focused on a variety of parent-involvement activities, such as setting high expectations, supervising homework, attending school events and regularly communicating with teachers. These activities do work and do produce higher levels of student performance, and I encourage all parents to engage in them, but there is an exciting new analogy researchers use to help parents understand and create the right conditions for their children's success at school. This new concept of parental involvement is called *stage-setting*.

Stage-setting is the degree to which parents convey the importance of education to their children and create and maintain an environment in which learning can flourish. In theater, stage-setters are responsible for creating a context that allows the cast to successfully enact the performance. Stage-setters create an environment—the conditions within which the actor's performance occurs—and that corresponds closely with the intended actions to be performed on stage.

Poor stage-setting can compromise an actor's ability to successfully play a role, thereby leading to a poor performance because it does not draw the audience into the world intended by the playwright. The stage-setter reinforces the performance at critical transition points, such as between acts. Thus, a good performance can be characterized as a partnership between two critical factors: (1) the actor playing his or her role, and (2) the stage-setter creating and maintaining an environment that reinforces the actor's portrayal of the role.

In a like manner, many parents construct and manage the learning environment around their children in a manner that creates the conditions in which school success is possible. The analogy of stage-setting captures what parents should do to position their children for success at school.

Most parents believe that education is important, but parents differ in their ability to pass on this belief to their children. What is clear is that parental involvement is critical to a child's success at school. I invite and encourage all of our parents to be actively involved in setting the stage for their children's educational success at Juliaetta Elementary School and Kendrick Jr/Sr. High School.

New At the Museum


Thanks to **Collin and Dale Wolff**, the old theater seats have made their way to the museum. Dale is shown replacing screws and bolts.

Art Teacher Needed



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FLICKERS

Northern Flickers are found across most of North America. In fact, this is the only North American bird to nest in all 49 of the continental states! Many flickers summer and raise their young in Canada and into Alaska. They are found year round in the contiguous United States and some make it into Mexico for the winter. Here in the Pacific Northwest, flickers can be seen all year long, but it is possible that the individual birds are not the same. Some of our winter birds may have spent the summer farther north – and some may just like it here and not migrate at all.



In early October, we had more than the usual number of flickers. My neighbor mentioned that he had a crowd of woodpeckers, including flickers, visiting his ash trees, congregating to feast on the ash aphids. Ash aphid is a common name for those little fuzzy blue insects that are everywhere prior to the first hard frost. They are in the air, on people, plastered to the front of cars, and by the thousands on ash trees. They provide an easy banquet for the insect-eaters. Flickers who summered in the north had timed their migration south exactly right.

There are two “races” of flickers. Yellow-shafted flickers have lemon yellow on the undersides of the wings and tail and are found in the East; we have red-shafted flickers here in the West. Where the races overlap, they interbreed and birds can be found with features of both races. All northern flickers have the distinctive white rump. Males have mustache stripes which may be either red or black. Females do not have mustaches.

Unlike most woodpeckers, flickers spend much time on the ground. With a sticky tongue that can reach a couple inches beyond the end of the beak, all flickers are well designed to collect ants and beetles from leaf litter and the first few inches of soil. The birds have been observed hammering holes into the ground, just as most woodpeckers drill into trees for their supper. And unlike most woodpeckers, flickers enjoy fruits and seeds, especially in the winter.

Flickers have a variety of calls –a single word: “*keeoh*”, a distinctive “*woika woika woika*” and a repetitive “*kekekekeke*.” And sometimes, they hammer on the loudest “drum” they can find, often metal. When they seem trying to drill into a metal roof or an abandoned vehicle, they are not searching for food. They are proclaiming their territory as loudly as they can. Drumming for effect is the flicker equivalent of a songbird’s song.
