“WHY WAS THE TROY AMBULANCE IN JULIAETTA, IDAHO?”

As I was driving up 4th Street in Juliaetta the other day, I saw a Troy ambulance coming down the hill. “How strange!” I thought. Why isn’t JK Ambulance taking the call?

When I sat down with Wendi and Kim to interview them for this story, I asked about the sighting. “All rural ambulance EMTs are volunteers,” Wendi said. That number of volunteers goes up and down, depending on community involvement, population, and volunteerism. Right now, JK is very low on volunteers. In particular, the crew has very few EMTs, which makes it difficult to be sure someone is always available to answer a call. Typically, they need two EMTs for each call, for a total of three responders. Luckily, rural communities also have something called “Mutual Aid Agreements,” which means that if no one is available to answer the call in our town, one of the neighboring towns will send an ambulance. Troy is the closest ambulance in our mutual aid agreement, so they are usually the team to respond if necessary. Likewise, if Troy did not have any responders available, they would call on Deary and JK Ambulance to take the call.

Small communities must work together to provide the services that cities take for granted. Mutual aid agreements with these other small towns help. The best way to solve this issue, though, would be to bring in more volunteers, have more EMTs train, and increase the JK Ambulance crew. If you’ve thought about helping, now is the time. Give any of the crew members a call; they would be happy to help you get started.

JK AMBULANCE VOLUNTEER, WENDI DODGE

If you’ve met Wendi Dodge, and chances are you have, you probably consider her a friend. A resident of Juliaetta, Idaho, Wendi knows just about everyone who lives in her small town. She worked in the Juliaetta Post Office for three and a half years and has been on the Juliaetta City Council for three years. With four children, three grandchildren, and a husband she brags about constantly, her life is full and rewarding.

However, her life changed three years ago when Wendi was at home on Christmas eve, listening to her husband Joe’s scanner (Joe is a volunteer for the JK Fire Department). A radio call came in for a driver, but Joe was at work, and no one answered the call. Wendi was frustrated because she knew someone needed help; she was an able-bodied person who could have driven, but she was not able to answer the call. Two weeks later, she became a driver for JK Ambulance. “There’s a reason God put me here,” Wendi says, and she saw this as a call to help.

Just over a year ago, Wendi decided she wanted to do more. “I love people. I couldn’t handle being in the front and not helping, even by holding someone’s hand.” She signed up for an EMT course, and with the help of her family and friends, received her basic EMS certification. She is currently a member of the board and responsible for ordering supplies and keeping stock in compliance.

Wendi enjoys working on the crew so much that she would like to complete more training, perhaps the advanced EMT. She says, “I would love to have the confidence that I have seen in paramedics.” She appreciates the calm that comes with knowledge and training.

Wendi loves being a part of the JK Ambulance team. “We’re a family,” she says. She feels comfortable calling her fellow volunteers to chat about issues that only they might truly understand. About the community, Wendi says she loves her relationship with everyone she has come to know. “This is serious business,” she says. “Their lives are important to me.”

JK AMBULANCE VOLUNTEER, KIM CANNON

When it comes to community service, you won't find a better example or advocate than Kim Cannon. He has served on JK Ambulance for the past 15 years in a variety of positions, as an advanced EMT as well as president, vice president, and currently, board member. Kim's interest in being an EMT dates back to the early 90s when he took a class in Cascade, Idaho. "I never wanted to be in a position where someone needed help, and I didn't know what to do," Kim says. He got his certification about ten years later, after moving to the Kendrick/Juliaetta area. Kim trained through LC Workforce Training and joined JK Ambulance to get his certification.

At that time, JK Ambulance was only a basic level ambulance crew. They weren't able to start IV therapy, use advanced airway devices, or complete other tasks that might be provided by a paramedic. Kim decided to go back for more training, becoming an advanced-level EMT. Since that time, several JK Ambulance crew members have gotten their advanced certification. To make life even more interesting, Kim lives on Potalatch Ridge, and that makes a quick response time challenging. He admitted that he once took out a neighbor's mailbox in his rush to get to Kendrick. After that, he realized he needed to slow down. "I can't help anyone if I don't make it myself."

Like other crew members, Kim enjoys the small-town atmosphere and the camaraderie of the crew. But the most important part of being on the ambulance relates to the reason he took his first training all those years ago. The most rewarding part is the personal standpoint: "I have been able to help family members," Kim says. "I've been on three calls with family [as patients]," and Kim likes to be able to help in true times of need.

The main message Kim would like to send to the community is one of involvement. "I realize it's hard for people to volunteer...but I wish they would." Kim adds that JK Ambulance will help pay for training if individuals would like to give back to the community by becoming a member of the crew.



Pastor's Corner

“...When it is evening you say, ‘It will be fair weather, for the sky is red’; and in the morning, ‘It will be foul weather today, for the sky is red and threatening.’ Hypocrites! You know how to discern the face of the sky, but you cannot discern the signs of the times.” – Matthew 16:1-3

In Christ’s day there was no means of forecasting the weather further than just a day or so. We now have the ability to monitor weather worldwide and read patterns and study all the factors that produce the weather. Jesus made a very important and valid point. That point is much more valid and appropriate today in the light of such advances in weather forecasting. Scientists seem much more intent on learning how to make these forecasts than we Christians do to discern “*the signs of the times*”. Our carefulness is lacking at a time when it is far more crucial to see these things than it has ever been, and especially more crucial than it is to know the weather on any given day. With events of the world bringing about the apparent fulfillment of prophecy, how much more vital is it for us to be able to understand what these “signs” are foretelling? Believing that the antichrist and false prophet are likely on the doorstep and about ready to step into their prophetic role leading to the final moments before the end of this age, where are those who will make that supreme effort and personal sacrifice to obtain the understanding of these “*signs of the times*”? There seems to be a major disconnect with the only source of that ability and those who would propose to forecast it. As in the days of Jesus, their ability to recognize the signs that would identify Christ was sadly lacking because of their failure to walk according to the truth. So, likewise, we have brilliant scholars today who think research and study will bring them the answers they seek, but fail to recognize that this truth is only obtained by revelation from the Spirit of God. This is only obtainable on your knees and in your heart as you seek earnestly to walk in obedience to the Word and the Spirit. We should put as much effort into discerning the signs of the times as scientists of the world do to forecast the weather, don’t you think? Pastor Gary Fix, Ret.

Cedar Waxwings By Nora Abbott



The Cedar Waxwing is a lovely bird with smooth shiny feathers. Its head is a light brown, topped with a crest and accented by a striking black mask. The back is gray-brown and the underside a soft lemon yellow. Tail tip is bright crayon yellow. There are often brilliant red wax droplets on the secondary wing feathers and these give the bird its name. (Wingtip feathers are Primary feathers, Secondary feathers are on the back of the wings, closer to the body.)

Cedar waxwings (5.5" to 6.7") may be confused with their less common close relatives, Bohemian waxwings. The Bohemian waxwing is slightly larger, with gray chest and belly and cinnamon on the underside of the tail. The Bohemian waxwing breeds north of us, but is frequently seen in Northern Idaho as it moves north or south during migration, and may flock with Cedar waxwings.

The Cedar waxwing is a year-round resident in our area, and survives almost entirely on fruit. It seems to have a built-in fruit sensor. You may hear them before you see them. Voice is a short, high-pitched, whizzy zeeee or quick trill and will come from the tops of evergreen trees or low in berry bushes. Once they locate a food source, they may descend by the dozens or even the hundreds to devour the fruit before moving on. Waxwings swallow berries whole. Unlike most fruit-eating birds, seeds pass through the body instead of being regurgitated, making the feeding process very fast and efficient. Their heavy fruit diet means they occasionally "pig out" on over-ripe or fermenting fruit and become thoroughly intoxicated.

Nest building is another absorbing task taking 5 or 6 days of labor. A female may make more than 2,500 trips to the nest with building materials. Sometimes, she steals materials from other birds' nests, which does make the process go faster.

Cowbirds routinely lay eggs in the nests of other birds, letting someone else do the parenting. Baby cowbirds in waxwing nests are singularly unlucky, as they do not thrive on the fruit diet provided by Mr. and Mrs. Cedar Waxwing! To attract waxwings to your yard, plant native trees and shrubs that bear small fruits such as dogwood, serviceberry, cedar, juniper, hawthorn, and mountain ash.
