## Hats off to the Kendrick Lions Club, Serving the Area for 63 Years



The Lions Club got its start almost 100 years ago when one man, Melvin Jones, asked himself a world-changing question, "What if people put their talents to work improving their communities?" What began with one man has now spread across the globe into 200 countries with 1.4 million members, it is the largest service organization in the world. The local club started in 1953 and was an offshoot of the Kendrick Commercial Club. It started with 58 members and has 32 members today. There are two charter members still living in the community: George Brocke and Charles Deobald. In the early years, the Lions Club met at the Fraternal Temple. Dick Benjamin would load two buckets of coal and haul it upstairs to fire up the stoves to warm up the hall for their meetings.

"Where there's a need, there's a Lion." Our communities are made better by the Lion's Club in many, many ways. They do simple things, like provide **memorial benches** for seating; and they do complex things like **sponsoring the annual Locust Blossom Festival** for the past 56 years.

Lions concentrate on bringing healthy solutions to local and worldwide neighborhoods in the areas of **sight, hearing, and diabetes**. A worthwhile project of the NW Lions Foundation is the **eyeglass recycling** program. If you have old glasses to donate, take them to Kendrick Ag & Supply to donate to this worthy cause.

The Lions Club has **provided community support** to the Distinguished Young Women's Program, the Community Newsletter, and the Latah County Youth Advocacy Council, BPA delegates, Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts, and the Juliaetta Library. When the renovation of the Fraternal Temple started, the Lion's Club was present to provide funding for the windows. Each year they give two scholarships to graduating seniors.

One large project the club undertook was the **complete redo of the Kendrick Park** and installation of a sprinkler system. Lion Darrel Brocke has organized many **blood drives** over the years and helped save hundreds of lives.

The club was pleased to accept **new members** this year including Fritz Fliger, Bill Warren, Gary & Marilyn Fix, Dillon Summers, and Amy Harris. You too can become a member of this community service organization. Dues are \$65.00 per year or \$110.00 per couple. The club meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of each month. Archie Johnson is our wonderful cook and we precede the meeting with dinner which each Lion purchases for \$10.00.

The **Community Calendar** is the main source of revenue for our local club. This year will mark 63 years of this project. It is time to submit changes and additions for the upcoming calendar. If you have subscribed in prior years, you are automatically renewed. The calendars are mailed out in December of each year. 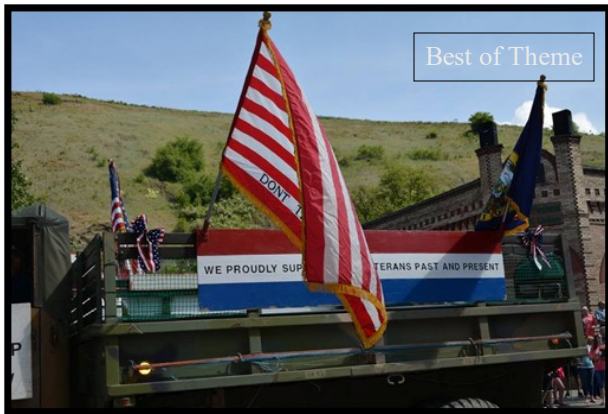

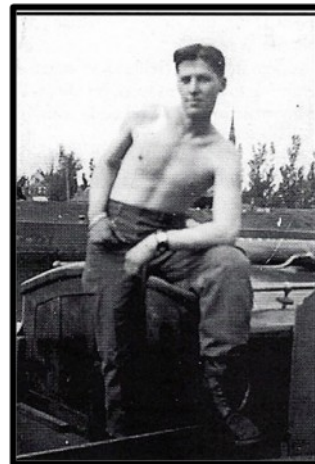

## Soldier Stories from Foreign Wars

Ninety-one year old Charles Deobald "Charlie" was just 18 years old when he was drafted during World War II. He was among the young men that invaded Normandy with the 29<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division, 115<sup>th</sup> Medical Attachment. Although he was a medic, he himself became the patient when he was shot while "just minding his own business" on July 30, 1944. He was transported to a tent hospital unit and then on to England.



By November he was back in commission and joined another unit as they marched through Holland, Belgium, and Luxemburg on their way to Germany. As he was marching through the town of Aachen, which was totally destroyed during the war, he caught up with his original platoon. The Russians were meeting the US troops on opposite sides of the Elbe River at the town of Torgau. The town of Torgau is the site where the US met the Russian forces for the invasion of Germany on April 25, 1945.

When the war ended, troops were shipped home by the "point" system. The troops with the most time and medals were shipped home first.

He returned to the area and enrolled in the University of Idaho. He joined his father's Chevron business in 1947, delivering fuel to local customers in the Kendrick area. He married Elizabeth Oyler in 1950. That same year he was called back into the Army and had to travel to Fort Warden, Washington. He considered it a huge inconvenience, since his eldest son, Denny, was born while he was gone.

## WHAT'S HAPPENING SEPTEMBER 2016 JULIAETTA ELEMENTARY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Every year after the summer break and the beginning of a new school year, I reflect on how fortunate I am to work at Juliaetta Elementary School (JES) with our dedicated, professional educators and community supporters. Our teachers, support staff, and community volunteers are not only highly qualified, but individually, they care deeply about the welfare and academic success of every student.

What are the factors that set Juliaetta Elementary School out as an exceptional school? Well, here are a few of the standouts:

Human relationships are more important than programs. We always put the children first. We do this not only in our planning but also in setting our spending priorities and our commitment of time and energy. The staff at JES is known for stepping up and filling in as needs arise.

Next, the communities of Juliaetta and Kendrick are tight-knit and act wholeheartedly in support of the schools and agree about how to best serve our children. Together with the personnel in our schools, community volunteers feel the commitment to and for our students.

The carnival, conducted on the last day of school, illustrates this perfectly. In close partnership with our PTO (Parent/Teacher Organization) our staff and community volunteers committed their time, effort, and resources to make the carnival an exciting activity and learning day for our students. I marveled at the attention to detail and the hours of work volunteers donated in preparing for this event. The carnival came together wonderfully and created memories for our children that will last a life time.

The instructional staff at JES has a clear focus on the use of student performance data. Our teachers meet regularly in a leadership team led by our fourth grade teacher and annually in our data carousel meeting to analyze trends and strategically address issues.

First rate, high quality schools are expensive. The funding for Kendrick Jt. School District #283 comes from two basic sources and a variety of federal and grant-funded smaller sources. The State of Idaho provides about two-thirds of our basic funding. About one-third of our funding comes locally from an annual supplemental levy. As you may have heard me say several times now, the levy is misnamed. It provides no resources for anything extra or "supplemental." It should be called a maintenance and operations levy because it provides only basic funding for salaries and facilities. The extra things we are able to do, like the before and after school programs and the full-day Kindergarten program, are federally and grant funded. We are very careful with these resources, and under the eye of our school board, we have transformed our schools into the jewels that they are.

As we begin this new school year, let us be grateful for what we have, and please express your genuine appreciation to our teachers, our PTO volunteers, and our community supporters.

## Kendrick Jt. School District Superintendent Message

As the new school year begins, the Kendrick professional, instructional staff will be working on improving their skills in administering formative assessments.

A genuine commitment to helping all students learn requires a systematic process to monitor student learning on an ongoing basis and using student performance data to:

Provide students with information about their progress towards attaining defined learning goals

Respond to individual student needs with appropriate learning interventions

Improve the instructional practices of the students' teacher(s)

**Formative Assessment** is defined as *frequent testing of student performance to identify learning needs and adjust teaching strategies*. I think of formative assessment as testing **for** learning. The big idea behind formative assessment is that evidence of student learning is used *to adjust instruction to better meet the students' needs*. It is not a specific test; it is a process that uses multiple indicators of student learning. It is not something to be purchased; it is a skill that educators must master. It is not something that occurs at the end of instruction; it is an integral part of instruction. It is not designed to result in a final score or grade; it is a process to inform students and better meet their learning needs.

Determining if an assessment is formative or summative is not based on the format of the test or when it is given. Instead, the determining factor is how the results are used. If students and teachers use the information to confirm areas of student proficiency and identify where specific improvement is needed, **then it is formative**. Most importantly, formative assessment should provide students with support and additional opportunities to demonstrate they have mastered the material.

In some cases, a test can be both summative and formative. For example, an end-of the unit test might be given to determine if students have mastered a skill. For students who demonstrate mastery, the assessment is summative. But for students who do not master the skill, the test assumes the formative role. The information will indicate to both the teacher and students that additional time and support are needed to help them develop the required proficiencies.

In Juliaetta and Kendrick, we are fortunate to have dedicated teachers who care about our students enough to work hard and master skills, such as using this information, to lift the performance of all our students. Just administering the ISAT is not enough. Formative tests help our students achieve their learning goals and advance from level to level in proficiency.

**ECHOCARDIOGRAMS  
BEING DONE IN KENDRICK**

Did you know the Kendrick Family Care Clinic offers echocardiograms? Many need this noninvasive test that uses sound waves to produce images of the heart. Folks who have had coronary bi-pass surgery, people with stents, and valve-replacement pa-



tients are all candidates for an echocardiogram exam. Patients with congenital heart defects, heart murmurs, or simply people experiencing chest pain or shortness of breath can also benefit from an echocardiogram exam.

Doug Rogan, an ultrasound technologist at Gritman Medical Center, comes to Kendrick every Thursday to do echocardiograms. This eliminates the need to travel long distances for this service. After taking care of patients at Kendrick, Doug then travels on to the Troy Clinic to see patients. He then returns to Gritman Medical Center where he types up the reports and transmits the scans to Kootenai Heart Clinics Northwest in Coeur d'Alene. Later on Thursday, he sees patients at the Potlatch Family Care Clinic. Doug is highly qualified and has twelve years of experience in the field, having been associated with Spokane Cardiology and prior to that Duke University Hospital.

One of the local patients who has benefitted from this service is 90-year-old Robert (Bob) Heidenreich. Bob recently had his echocardiogram done in Kendrick. Then he was able to go on to Moscow to confer with cardiologist Dr. Michael Williams, who comes to Moscow three times a month from Coeur d'Alene to see patients.

Another service that will soon be added to the echocardiogram service to the Palouse's rural clinic is a probe. This new probe will enable Gritman specialist's to perform carotid artery screenings for carotid diseases and stroke victims.

**GRANGE RECEIVES GRANTS**

Thanks to the generosity of Latah County Community Foundation, the Grange has received \$2,500.00 to be used toward an upgrade of the antiquated electrical system. Idaho Community Foundation has awarded the Grange \$2,000.00 toward heat pumps that will be installed soon. The bid was awarded to Quality Heating of Grangeville and the work will commence in September. This will enable a much quieter and more economical way of heating the hall.

## LATAH COUNTY COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT) AND AMERICAN RED CROSS (ARC)

Latah County CERT volunteers and the ARC are teaming up to install free smoke detectors in at-risk neighborhoods in the Juliaetta/Kendrick area. This Home Fire Safety Campaign is part of a 5 year initiative to reduce home fire deaths and injuries by 25%.

In the United States, 7 people die and 36 people are injured as a result of home fires every day. Fire experts agree that people have as little as 2 minutes to escape a burning home before it's too late to get out. Smoke detectors and escape plans can significantly increase your odds of surviving a fire.

## JK Fire News

### Reminder: Open burning Restrictions between May 15<sup>th</sup> and October 20<sup>th</sup>

Please remember that Fire season is still here and there is no open burning in the cities of Kendrick and Juliaetta during these dates. This includes fire pits and burn piles. With weather and fire conditions still at high risk and dangerous, we ask that you please follow the burning ordinances in your town. In Kendrick there is no open burning until October 20th. In Juliaetta contact city hall for a burn permit which could be issued dependent upon fire conditions. Since January we have responded to 26 calls. Our most recent call was an intentionally set fire in a dryer on Little Bear Road at an illegal dump site on the 14th of August. Luckily witnesses in the area called it in and reported the suspicious vehicle seen leaving the area of the fire, the fire was extinguished and a possible wildland fire was averted in the canyon. Thank you to the witnesses for their prompt action.

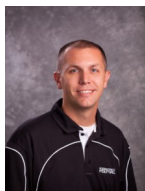
