## Update on the Kendrick Pharmacy

Demolition and remodeling has begun at the Kendrick Pharmacy. The tentative completion date for this stage of the project is mid-October 2017.

Once the remodel is completed, Idaho State University (ISU) Bengal Pharmacy will begin setting up their telepharmacy services. The opening date for the pharmacy has not been set at this

time, but we will keep the community updated as the project progresses.

ISU's telepharmacy project has allowed rural communities to retain access to pharmacy services. The university opened its first telepharmacy location in Arco, Idaho in 2014. Telepharmacy provides pharmacy services through audio and video connections. Pharmacy technicians are supervised by pharmacists in Pocatello and both locations work together to fill prescriptions for patients. Finished prescriptions are checked remotely by the pharmacists who can then speak to patients about their medications using high-quality video connections.

## Kendrick to be on the National Registry

Kendrick residents have a reason to feel a great deal of pride. There are few Idaho towns that have maintained a Main Street with historically valuable properties in addition to still being a viable business district for 113 years.

The contractor that worked on this project, Kerry Davis out of Boise, was paid entirely by a grant from the National Park Service through the work of the Latah County Historical Preservation Committee. The 50 page study has been submitted to the National Park Service headquarters in Washington DC.

While being named to the National Registry of Historic Places is a great honor and will surely bring more tourists to Kendrick, otherwise it will not change a thing. The qualifying historical buildings may qualify for low interest improvement loans.

A question that is frequently asked is, "Will this make me comply to certain guidelines if I wish to alter my property?" The answer is no. Currently there are no local ordinances in place that govern the appearance or use of historical properties.


Other towns that have acquired this status in our county are Troy, Moscow Main Street, and parts of Potlatch.

## JK Fire News Update

Both Juliaetta and Kendrick Fire Departments were awarded the Volunteer Firefighter Assistance Grant this year in June. We have been busy this summer with the building of the surplus Army trucks we received through the FEP program from the Department of Lands. These trucks will help with firefighting in the cities where extra water might be needed to help with additional water flow and in our areas of impact which might affect our cities. Juliaetta Fire department has put their truck into service and Kendrick is in the process of building theirs and adding a 2500 gallon tank to the truck. Kendrick also received a 60,000 watt generator to be used by the city in case of a long term power outage.

We also had an Extrication training in June held in conjunction with JK Ambulance. Thank you to Ed Groseclose for donating the car

## CONQUERING TEMPTATION TO SIN

*"Your word I have hidden in my heart, that I might not sin against You." Psalm 119:11 (NKJV)*

As we have all learned, temptation to sin can sometimes be very overwhelming, and often seems to be more than we can resist in our humanness. Every one of us is hit daily with circumstances and issues that propel us toward sinful responses and behavior. This is true even with the promise that God will not allow us to be hit with anything that is greater than our ability to bear it and overcome it. This is such a wonderful promise that we can rest in when we are overwhelmed with tempting circumstances. However, with such a promise as this, we must understand that, as with all other promises, it is conditional! Our ability to take the "...way of escape..." will always hinge on whether or not we have maintained our relationship with God and our spiritual strength and health. If we allow ourselves to become weakened through lack of maintenance of spiritual discipline in the Word and in prayer, we make ourselves more susceptible to temptations, and the enemy of our souls will jump on that without any hesitation and take advantage of our weakened state. I am quite sure that many, if not all of us, can recall such times of susceptibility because of a letdown in giving attention to these particular disciplines. The Psalmist, David, understood very well the importance, even necessity of hiding God's Word in our heart, or treasuring it there, as a strengthening agent against the often overwhelming temptations that attack us on a daily basis. He knew, that his strength against the enemy was based on His consistency in putting into his heart the wonderful spiritual nutrients that are only to be found in God's Word.

In order to get God's Word hidden in our hearts we have to spend time in it, and especially taking time to commit it to memory! Maybe our brains are not geared the way we would like, to memorizing things, but I have learned that it only requires the self-discipline of exercising our brain to commit something to memory. When we do this, we accomplish the objective of treasuring His Word in our hearts. Then it is that we give the Holy Spirit something to draw from when He needs to bring to our remembrance the things Jesus has spoken. (see John 14:26) . How very important this spiritual discipline is to all of us – to our health and strength and growth toward mature Christianity. I am sure that we all aspire to grow up in Christ and in our growth, to attain to this maturity in Christ. So let's commit ourselves to begin now, or begin again, to hide God's Word in our hearts as a hedge against even that sin that so easily besets! Hebrews 12:1-2 speaks of laying aside anything that slows us down or hinders us in reaching our objective. Whatever sin easily seduces us must be set aside and only by consistently hiding His Word in our hearts can we be assured of having the ability to accomplish this.

The Apostle Paul makes it clear that this Word of God is our only actual weapon for defeating the enemy when he comes firing at us. He calls it "the sword of the Spirit" and admonishes us to wield it with confidence when we are under attack, and by this means we can be assured of conquering our enemy and overcoming all of our temptations.

## KHS English Department News

### Junior High

Mrs. Lamoreaux's classes will continue to develop critical thinking skills that will help them become better writers, thinkers, and citizens. She has developed a unit that integrates learning across the curriculum in the area of controversial nuclear technology and its many uses. Students will also be introduced to classroom technology that will allow them access to collaboration and criticism wherever they are through Google Classrooms and the Google Suite of applications. The skills they master in these earlier Secondary grades will carry through their education as they advance toward college and career readiness. Peer review and constructive teacher-based criticism are vital during grades 7-9, so that students learn how to self-identify mistakes as well as develop strategies for improving their own and their peers' writing. Mrs. Lamoreaux remains committed to increasing literacy, reading, and writing skills, as well as engaging students in materials that resonate with students and help to motivate them to learn and grow.

### High School English

I (Ingalls) have spent a huge amount of time this summer working in new ways to incorporate daily writing. While this might not sound like a blast-for students, it is one of those exercises that will guide you toward higher SAT, ACT, and college entrance scores. Grades 10-12 can look forward to guided journals that contain daily prompts to "write into the day." Each daily journal prompt is designed to spark imagination and free writers and non-writers, alike, to express imagination and thoughtfulness. We will start each class period with a 5-minute writing warm-up before getting into the grit of the daily reading and writing assignments. These journal entries are not only meant to "get you writing," but also to stimulate thought and participation. It won't be easy, but it will help build your skills so that "high stakes" assignments take less effort and planning.

### High School Humanities

**Sociology** will continue to be an exploration into how people interact with both intra and inter-culturally. We will touch on topics that we see every day in the news but we will examine them in different ways than what we might conventionally think. For example, we will look at criminology insofar as the myriad reasons people turn to criminal actions: what are risk-factors, early signs, and conditions that propagate a criminal climate.

**Creative Writing** will allow room for creative thought at exploration of style and voice, while also teaching about revision, workshopping, and publication. We will actively submit written work to publications that specialize in high school writing as we build robust portfolios of which we can be proud to share with family, friends, and the public. Finished work will be on display throughout the year on bulletin boards and in other public forums. -Jennifer McFarland Ingalls

## 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Center



The 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Center at Juliaetta Elementary School is getting geared up for back to school! The 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC is a grant-funded program and offers many services to the students at JES. The program provides the afternoon service of Kindergarten at JES allowing full day kindergarten and a chance for students to continue working on their social and emotional development while continuing academics.

The 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC also provides before and afterschool programs. Before school program runs Monday-Friday 7-8am with after-school running Monday-Thursday 3-5:30. Every day, students receive a snack, help with homework, get exercise, and participate in fun enrichment activities! All students grades K-6 are welcome to attend! Programs begin September 20 and fill up quickly!

**PRESCHOOL!** New to the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC this year is preschool! We are thrilled to have this available to our families in the district. Preschool will begin September 26 and run Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from noon-3:00pm. The following are some of the eligibility requirements that need to be met to enroll: Children must be 4 years old on or before September 1, 2017; Children who are 5 years old on or before September 1, 2017 but are not kindergarten ready will be admitted; Children that are 3 years old with an Individualized Education Plan; and families must attend a parent orientation OR meet with director & teacher prior to starting program.

### **“Cutting-Edge” Technology for KHS Vocational Education Program**

The KJ7 Education Foundation has secured grant funding and is seeking additional donors to help support the purchase of a new state-of-the-art plasma cutter for the Vocational/Technical Education Program at Kendrick High School. The Torchmate® 4400 system is the industry standard used in manufacturing and creative studios around the world, and it will enable KHS students to acquire hands-on training in essential design and manufacturing skills.

The computerized, robotic Torchmate® system will be used in several classes at KHS, as well as for design and execution of senior projects. It will also be useful for entrepreneurial training, as students will be able to expand the quality, volume and complexity of fundraising projects and contract work for community members. The total cost of the system is \$20,000, and \$11,000 in donations has already been pledged. With more than half of the necessary funds in place, the campaign goal is in sight, and every contribution will make a difference.

## Superintendent Report

Every year, as we gear up for the return of students after the summer break and begin a new school year, I reflect on how fortunate I am to work in a school district with our dedicated, professional educators and community supporters. Our teachers, support staff, and community volunteers are not only highly qualified and engaged with our students, but individually, they care deeply about the welfare and academic success of every child and older student we serve.

What are the factors that set Kendrick Jt. School District out as an exceptional educational system? Well, here are a few of the stand-outs:

To begin with, human relationships are more important than programs. We always put the children first. We do this not only in our planning but also in setting our spending priorities and our commitment of time and energy. These usually go well beyond our job descriptions. The staff is known for stepping up and filling in as needs arise.

Next, the communities of Juliaetta and Kendrick are tight-knit and act wholeheartedly in support of the schools and agree to support our children. Together with the personnel in our schools, our community volunteers feel the strongest commitment to and for our students.

The carnival, conducted on the last day of school, illustrates this perfectly. In close partnership with our exceptional PTO (Parent/Teacher Organization) the staff and our community volunteers committed their time, effort, and resources to make the carnival an exciting activity and learning day for our students. I marveled at the attention to detail and the hours of work volunteers donated in preparing for this event. In summary, the carnival came together wonderfully and created memories for our children that will last a life time. In addition the instructional staffs at both JES and KHS have a clear focus on the strategic use of student performance data. Our teachers meet regularly with their professional peers to talk about what is working and not working to make adaptations and adjustments to meet the needs of our students.

First rate, high quality schools are expensive. The funding for Kendrick Jt. School District #283 comes from two basic sources and a variety of federal and grant-funded smaller sources. The State of Idaho provides about two-thirds of our basic funding, and we appreciate what they give us. About one-third of our funding comes locally from an annual supplemental levy. The levy is misnamed. It provides no resources for anything “supplemental.” It should be called a maintenance and operations levy because it provides only basic funding for salaries and facilities. The extra things we are able to do, like the before and after school programs, the full-day Kindergarten program, and the pilot pre-school program are federally funded through grants. We are very careful with these resources, and under the watchful eye of our school board, we have transformed our schools into the jewels that they are.

Special thanks goes to the Nez Perce Tribal Council for funding Chromebook computers for our students. As we begin this new school year, let us be grateful for what we have, and whenever possible, please express your genuine appreciation to our teachers, our PTO volunteers, and our community supporters.



Roy Silflow served his country in the US Army, 158<sup>th</sup> Regimental Combat Team Infantry, He received his basic infantry training at Camp Roberts and at Fort Ord in California Cannon Company, 1629 Engineers.

He was deployed from San Francisco to Manila Harbor on July 3, 1945. When his ship arrived in the harbor at the Philippines, many ships had been sunk or damaged so that the harbor was littered with ships. They had to be transported to shore on landing crafts.

He can still remember his weakness from being extremely seasick on the journey. When your name was called, you had to throw your barracks bag onto the craft, grab a rope, and drop into the craft. Having always suffered from motion sickness, taking a leap from a high ship onto a rough sea while not knowing how to swim was certainly no picnic.

He left the Philippines and was deployed from Luzon to Japan in November, 1945. As he was leaving Luzon, he purchased 3 small bottles of whiskey to take home to his father. The whiskey there is very strong. When he got to Japan it was extremely cold. The whiskey never made it back to the states.

While serving there he had the chance to tour Mt. Fuji, Sendai, and Yokohama. It wasn't all hard work, as one of his assignments was to drive officers to their appointments. One officer liked to frequent the resort area of Sendai. Sendai had a heated swimming pool and all of the Japanese women bathed naked there.

He received the following medals: Asiatic Pacific Service Medal, Philippine Liberation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, Victory Medal, and the Army Occupation Medal – Japan.

He had a friend that would occasionally steal a steak or two from the officers so that he and Roy could visit the sites of Sendai on the weekends. They would have a little BBQ with the steak. There were beautiful golden shrines and temples at Sendai. It was an adventure to be remembered by a boy raised in Cameron.



## Kendrick-Juliaetta Area Swallows

Most of us recognize swallows. They are air-born acrobats, feeding on the wing, often nesting in colonies or congregating on wires. Did you realize that we have six swallow species here?

**Tree swallows** are often seen over fields or water. They nest in tree cavities or the blue-bird nesting boxes we so generously provide. The underside is white and the back is a dark iridescent blue. When perched, the tail and wings are about the same length. This is the only swallow that will eat seeds and berries in the early spring if the insects are still scarce.



**Violet green swallows** also have dark, iridescent backs and white underparts, but the white extends up behind the eye. When perched, the wings extend well beyond the tip of the tail. Violet green swallows prefer mixed species woodlands with nearby water. They nest in tree cavities.

**Northern rough winged swallows** are the plainest of the group, mostly brown with no distinguishing marks. These are stocky swallows with long pointed wings that frequent streams and nest in underground burrows.

**Bank swallows** are dainty, slender swallows, dark above and white below with a distinctive dark breast band. These are the swallows that nest in tunnels carved into sandy cliffs such as the road cut near the top of the Deary grade.

**Cliff Swallows** would be better named "bridge swallows" as they frequent bridges and underpasses where they build their mud nests and live in colonies. These are colorful birds, dark above, light below with brick red faces and conspicuous white foreheads.

**Barn Swallows** are perhaps the best known of the swallows, found on every continent but Antarctica and identified by their long forked tails.

What the birds have in common is their ability to feed on the wing, devouring quantities of small flying insects. They have short bills and a wide gape, sometimes with the feathers around the mouth angled to become a funnel. Their acrobatic skill allows them to work insect swarms, choosing their targets with precision. The barn swallow can consume 60 insects per hour. That trims the pest population by 850 per bird per day! All the swallows are migratory, with some of them setting distance records from Alaska to Argentina.


I consider my world richer because of these birds: they reduce the pest population and provide hours of entertainment with their twitters and trills and aerial displays.
