One of our foundation's mission and goals is to educate the young people of the area to appreciate our heritage and the history of our towns. On October 7th, Grades 3-6 from Juliaetta Grade School, took both outside tours of the historical zone of Kendrick and inside tours of the museum. Sharon Harris visited these classes the week before to plant seeds of local history in their minds by talking about significant events in Juliaetta and Kendrick.

JKHF is sponsoring a professional writer, Judy Soboloff, who will work with the students until December on historical writing projects. This is made possible by a grant from Idaho Community Foundation. The students are excited about their projects.

By now you will have received a letter requesting funding for the Foundation and the Museum. We hate to have to ask, but we receive no government or local funding for our work. Our members contribute hundreds of donated hours to make sure the history of the area is preserved.

We have three books in the works right now. *A History of Texas Ridge*, *Tales Worth Remembering Volume 111*, and *A History of Cameron*. We are also working on the Leland history for a second printing. In addition to these projects, we are working diligently to collect all copies of the Kendrick Gazette and complete our resource center with local family histories and photo collections. Welcome, Camm Kirk!




Camm Kirk hasn't been in the area long, but he has already found a way to make a lasting impact and give back to our community.

Kendrick High School gets \$32,400 in grants for Science Projects

The upcoming 2019-2020 school year will be eventful for Kendrick Joint School District students. Thanks to grants from the Innovia Foundation (<https://innovia.org>), the Nez Perce Tribe, and the Idaho Community Foundation (<https://www.idahocf.org/>), the Kendrick High School science department was fortunate enough to receive three generous grants that will fund projects for district students and area adults. Specifically, the grants will be used to purchase equipment that will be used to improve existing KHS bee hives, training kits for learning the principles of electricity, and 3D printing/scanning equipment. Also of note, these grants will help purchase a 3D scanner for school projects and help fund an adult class on 3D printing this upcoming winter. Finally, some of the grant funds will also go to JES to purchase an observation beehive and several 3D printers as well.

Pastor's Corner Heaven or Hell? We choose.

If I believe in God I will go to heaven.. I'm a "spiritual person" and I don't believe there is hell or that Satan exists. So if there's "no hell" I won't go there when I die. And.. I pray when there is a crisis and I know God hears me. Isn't that enough? The rest of the time I pretty much have life under control. I just need God now and then when trouble comes along. **Truth: "Even the devils believe in God." (James 2:19) Believing in God is not enough. John, Chapter 3 tells us we "must be born again". Born again calls for letting go of our old life and choosing a new life in Christ.**

This all went to Spokane Oct. 18 to be shipped world-wide to people who need these things so desperately. Millions of people can't afford or don't have access to all these supplies, and that makes it so satisfying to reach out and share with them.


The Senior Meal Site suggests a donation of \$3 per meal for those over 60 and \$5 for those under 60, but they will never turn anyone away. They serve dinner at noon on every Wednesday and Friday.

They also deliver meals to individuals who are shut in, over 60 and not mobile. They only deliver once a week, but that delivery includes several frozen meals that can be re-heated for other days. The site is closed on holidays, but they do have a Thanksgiving-themed dinner near the holiday.

The menu for the meals is posted around town and can also be picked up on site. All meals are at the Senior Citizens Center in Kendrick. The menus are subject to change, as they are made up several weeks ahead of time and must be approved by the AAA.

Jerry is anxious to get the word out about the meal site. They offer great, affordable food in a friendly, welcoming environment. "The food is wonderful, and we have live entertainment two to three times a month." Stop in and say hello the next time you are hungry at noon on a Wednesday or a Friday...and stay for lunch!

Meet Debi Dockins, NW Cancer Foundation of Hope

Debi Dockins, Chair of NW Hope, is one of the original organizers of NW Hope. Several years ago, she and Becky Chavez co-founded the “Light a Candle” program at Gritman Medical Center. That program continues to be very successful. When Debi and Becky left that organization, they decided to continue their dedication to cancer patients on the Palouse. They gathered friends and family, asked for help, and the result was NW Cancer Foundation of Hope.

The planning process began in January, 2018. This included several meetings as a group and with Rotary Club of Pullman. They applied for the DBA designation, held their first fundraising event in March, and were distributing funds by fall.

Cancer has affected so many people’s lives, and Debi is no exception. Her own personal experience is what started her down the path with this organization. She lost her dad to lung cancer only one month after he was diagnosed at 62 years old. Currently, her mom is facing a stage-4 lung cancer diagnosis. As a member of the committee for NW Hope, Debi’s mother regularly attends meetings and donates to the cause because she understands what people are going through and wants to do her part to help them.

Not only does Debi understand the devastation of cancer on the body, she also understands how it can take a toll on finances, families, and futures. Everyday expenses like groceries, utilities, and transportation can become obstacles for patients and their families. NW Hope helps alleviate those burdens. Members of the organization are always thinking about how they can do more for patients and their families. It is a passion for all involved.

The organization serves anyone in Latah or Whitman counties with an active cancer diagnosis. Polly Taylor-Dennler recently sponsored a “Sip and Stack” event, and the committee is open to other ideas for fundraisers. They also take individual donations, and often receive memorial donations from people who want the organization to “pay it forward.”

We say that we want to touch every person fighting cancer in Latah and Whitman Counties. Ospreys

are also known as sea hawks, river hawks, or fish hawks because the primary food is fish, and the birds are usually found near water having large fish populations. The osprey is a large hawk having a 50 to 70 inch wingspan and weighing 2 to 4.5 pounds. Its back, from head to tail, is glossy brown. The breast is mostly white, occasionally streaked with brown. Females often have a brown "necklace." Both sexes have dark masks across the eyes and down the sides of the neck. The beak is black and eyes are yellow.



Coloring is distinctive and so is the wing shape. When soaring, the wings of most hawk species have a fairly straight leading edge. The osprey has arched wings with distinct "elbows." This feature helps identify the birds in flight, even when the color pattern is hard to see.

The Osprey's feet are especially designed in that the outer toe can point either forward – as it is when perched – or backward when fishing. This arrangement of two toes forward and two backward gives a much more secure grip when it is grasping wiggly, slippery prey.

The osprey hunts from high above the water. Its eyesight is well adapted to detecting underwater objects from the air. A meal may be sighted from a height of as much as 130 feet above the surface. The bird typically hovers, then plunges feet first into the water. The birds have a transparent nictitating membrane that covers the eye while underwater. For some reason, the fish is almost always carried head first as the osprey heads for a perch for eating or to the nest to feed the young.

Ospreys are found on every continent except Australia and Antarctica. The birds mate for life and build large messy nests of sticks, driftwood, turf or seaweed in forks of trees, on rocky outcrops, utility poles, platforms or offshore islets. A nest can be 6.5 feet across and weigh 300 pounds. Frequently man-made nesting platforms are accepted and may be used year after year.

Birds reach sexual maturity by about 3 years old. Whether or not they begin breeding then depends on food availability and how dense the osprey population is in the area. Where there are many birds and limited food or few nesting sites, breeding may be postponed as many as 4 more years. Ospreys typically live for 5 to 7 years, although 25 year old individual birds have been recorded.
