- \* Candles

If your smoke alarms are older than ten years old, they need to be replaced. Make sure you have tested your alarm or changed the battery.

## Kendrick United Methodist Church Closes

The familiar building on Main Street was built in 1919, after a fire destroyed the previous church on Schoolhouse Hill. The new location was unfortunate, as the slope behind the building was unstable. Over the years, the congregation "dug out" earth that slid down against the building. Finally, the first story windows at the back of the building were walled over after heavy rain sent water and mud through the windows and into the basement. Within the last 5 years, serious maintenance was performed, installing a new drain and a retaining wall. However, the hill won, when more dirt pushed the new wall into the building, compromising the foundation.

The decision was made to empty and sell the building. The church furniture was sold or donated to other churches. A rummage sale held, and unsold items donated to thrift stores.

We still have a small group of members and the continued purpose to witness Jesus Christ in the world, and to follow his teachings through acts of compassion, justice, worship and devotion under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The VFW members graciously offered space for worship. The newly formed Fellowship Group has Services on Sundays at the traditional 10:00 a.m., except for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of the month at 1:00 p.m., when Pastor Mike Lawson of Lewiston's Orchards Methodist Church officiates. The other weeks, the congregation members lead the service themselves, each participating in his or her own way. It may be similar to the early "meetings" of this country's history, with Pastor Lawson filling the part of circuit rider.

## Common Ravens

Range – much of North America and Europe, parts of Asia and coastal Greenland. Habitats – desert, coniferous forest, coastlines, sagebrush, tundra, grasslands.

Crows and Ravens are of the same family and often confused. Both birds are completely black. The larger raven measures 27” long and has a 46” wingspan while the crow measures 20” long with a 36” wingspan. In flight, the crow’s tail is squared off. The Raven’s tail forms a wedge. The raven’s head and beak are more massive – a thick neck, thick strong beak with a curved tip. The crow’s neck is trim and the beak is straight and sharp. Ravens have “whiskers” that extend half-way along the top of the beak.

Crows “caw” and ravens “croak.” Ravens are often found alone or in pairs, where crows are more likely to form large flocks.

Ravens are omnivorous, dining on carrion, creatures the size of grasshoppers up to and including great blue heron nestlings. They eat fish, grain, fruit and berries, pet food, garbage and they will rob nests. These birds form extended pair bonds, remaining together for several years. They build their nests on cliffs, in trees, and on structures such as power-line towers, telephone poles, billboards, and bridges. The nests are as massive as their makers, requiring around 9 days to construct and measuring 5 feet across and 2 feet high. Nests may be reused, but not necessarily by the same birds.

The Raven has shared human spaces for centuries, following hunting parties, wagons, sleds in hopes of a quick meal. They trail after predators for the same reason: looking for leftovers.

Common Ravens are so bold, playful, and clever that they’re almost always worth watching. On the ground ravens walk boldly, sometimes with a swagger, sometimes sidling. In flight, they perform aerobatics including sudden rolls, wing-tucked dives, and playing with objects by dropping and catching them midair. Among the smartest of all birds, ravens have a name for solving the most difficult problems posed by scientists. Common Ravens can work together to solve new problems. They have followed researchers who were setting up artificial nests, and raiding them soon after the researchers left. Young ravens just out of the nest pick up and examine almost anything new as they learn what’s useful and what isn’t. No wonder the raven is a significant figure in most Native American culture. *Nora Abbott*
