

City of Juliaetta News

City Elections

It's election year for City of Juliaetta and the candidate filing period is now open until Friday, September 6 at 5:00 pm. There are one 2-year and two 4-year seats open for those wishing to run for City Council, as well as the 4-year Mayor position. If you are interested in running for any of these positions, contact City Hall. Election Day is November 5, and those who reside within city limits may vote at the City Hall Annex at 203 Main Street.

Clean Up Month

October is Clean Up month at the bulky waste site. If you pay for city garbage collection, you are eligible to take advantage of this resource. During clean up month you're allowed free disposal of all waste, excluding electronic or hazardous waste. The Juliaetta site will be open 8:00 am – 4:00 pm on October 5 and 19.

Dogs On the Loose

Per Juliaetta City Code, dogs are not allowed to roam free in city limits. It doesn't matter if your dog is friendly, or if it's just an escape artist. All dogs must be kept fenced or tied within your yard at all times. Please be a good neighbor and keep your dog at home.

Upcoming Office Closures

City Hall will be closed Monday, September 2 for Labor Day and Monday, October 14 to observe Columbus Day. We will also be closed September 18-20 while we attend a training conference.

City Council Meetings

Upcoming City Council meetings will be held on Tuesday, September 10 and Tuesday, October 8. Meetings begin at 7:00 pm. Agendas are posted in the window at City Hall one week before each meeting, as well as at cityofjuliaetta.com. The public is always welcome to attend. Remember, if you have an issue you would like to have added to the agenda, you must contact City Hall at least 48 hours in advance.

Pastor's Corner

How Many Times In a Day Do You Lie?

Have you found there are things you do that you don't even realize that you do it. I find myself at times using the word "ah" and that is a bad habit for a preacher. Too often I fall back into the habit and don't even realize it. My wife has to remind me that I said "ah" a lot while teaching or preaching. I believe an area in which this happens is telling lies and we don't even realize how many times we do so. One study revealed that on average people tell 200 lies a day. One article concluded "Dishonesty is a fundamental part of life". Has telling a lie become so common that we don't even realize we do it? Scripture reveals the problem we have with telling lies as *Psalm 12:22 states, Everyone lies to his neighbor; their flattering lips speak with deception.*

Let's look at some of the reasons people feel they need to lie.

To manipulate: It may be you want someone to do something and so you tell them everyone else is doing it when you know that is not true.

To withhold a portion of the truth: Reporting that sales are up but not revealing that we are still deeply in the red.

To avoid inconvenience: Ever tell someone else to answer the phone, you know who it is and don't want to talk to them so you tell the one answering to tell the person you are not home.

To excuse your failure: You got up late and tell them at the office you're late because traffic was heavy.

To deceive: We can do the job 15% below the lowest bidder and on time.

To not offend: This is a tricky one for should we lie to protect someone's feelings? I can give you a couple personal situations when I faced such a situation. Personally I think 95% of babies are not cute those first few hours when they are born all red, wrinkly, slimy. And often they have funny shaped pointed heads. Sorry, that doesn't make for cute. I have four children and they were not cute right after birth. My way of avoiding telling a lie is to warn all expectant mothers well before their baby is born that if they don't want to hear the truth, don't ask me if their baby is cute right after it is born. Another personal example of how not to offend goes back to my dating days. My fiancé came out of the beauty parlor with a perm and new hair style. She asked that question I didn't want to hear, "What did I think of her hair?" Yikes, what is a young guy say to the one that he knows he wants to marry? Say the wrong thing and this relationship could come to a quick end, but you don't want to lie to her. After what seemed like an eternity, thoughts come to your mind. Don't say a whole lot, just let your actions speak for you. Give her a not too enthusiastic, "Well not my favorite, but ok." Next you give her a 10 mile ride home in your convertible, with the top down. By the time we got home she knew exactly how I felt about the new hair style and I had not lied to this beautiful gal. As I look back this was probably not the best plan in the world but we just celebrated our 50th wedding anniversary.

Pay close attention and see if you can go a whole day and not lie for one reason or another. As the Psalmist said *"Save me O Lord, from lying lips and from deceitful tongues." Psalm 120:2*

J – K Heritage Foundation

We are busy researching and writing a history of **Texas Ridge**. This project started with Margie Heustis in Deary. For many years she has collected obituaries and articles of interest concerning Texas Ridge. She wanted it published, but was unable to do it herself.

We are seeking pictures, stories, and genealogy of the folks who lived on the ridge. B. J. Swanson graciously provided homesteading maps of the area. That gave us the information of who was

there in the late 1800s and early 1900s. What we are writing will encompass the years 1880-1950.

Killdeer

This most familiar member of the plover family is 8-11” long – overall about the size of a robin, but with a very different shape. Sexes look alike – a typical shorebird appearance of light brown above and white underneath with long legs, 2 black chest bands, white neckring and forehead and a black stripe between the large red-rimmed eyes. The rump is chestnut brown and shows in flight.



They are named for the frequent shrill “Kill-dee” call. You’ll find killdeer on the ground – walking, running, pausing to look around and then running again. If threatened, they will fly in circles calling incessantly and generally land again as soon as possible. Unlike most shorebirds, killdeer are most often nowhere near water. Their preferred habitat is open pastureland, parking lots, golf courses, driveways, sandbars or mudflats – even graveled flat-roofed buildings. A killdeer nest is nothing more than a shallow depression in the open. The male scrapes the area bare and offers the “nest” to the female. Once the site is selected and in use, the pair adds bits of trash, shells, small pebbles or sticks. These oddments are often tossed over their shoulders into the nest. One nest was recorded as having a collection of 1,500 light-colored pebbles added this way.

Plovers, and thus killdeer, are among the best-known users of the “broken-wing” display to lure humans or predators away from nest and young. The babies have a complete covering of down when hatched and as soon as that soft feather covering dries, they can walk, run and forage for themselves.

Killdeer populations seem to be increasing, largely because they are so comfortable around humans. People do not threaten them as much as their animals do – especially in pastures where the nests may be stepped on by livestock. Killdeer are known to spread and cock up the tail and fluff the rest of their feathers to increase their apparent size, and charge the horse or cow, often changing its path away from the nest. And should you worry about nests on flat-rooftops, one set of chicks survived a leap from a seven story building!!
