Hill and Valley Garden Club

One of our main projects has been the town welcome signs at the north and south side of Kendrick on Route 3, as you have been reading about for several issues.

The club officers have all agreed to stay on an extra term due to all the COVID cancellations that occurred over the last two years. That was welcome news. The officers are **Barbara Heimgartner**, President; **Raina Weyen**, Vice President; **Sharon Harris**, Treasurer; and **Kathy Cassin**, Secretary. The meetings are held on the fourth Tuesday of the month, at the Kendrick Grange beginning at 1:00 pm until about 3:00 pm including the speaker’s presentation or activity. Leland Church News

Historically at Leland there were two churches located directly across from each other on Main Street. They were both Methodist Episcopal Churches, but they had a difference of opinion on the issue of slavery. Although they were neighbors, they did not worship together. Both churches were erected early with the South church being built in 1890 followed by the North church construction in 1895.

Prior to that time the area was served by a circuit rider pastor of the United Brethren named Rev. John A. Black. He eventually erected a church and it flourished for a time in 1901, before most of its members moved away. Walter Hoffman tore it down in 1915 and moved the lumber to his place to build a house.

Methodist Church South became inactive in 1946 and was torn down in 1962, and the lumber given to the Peck parsonage. Methodist North remained open until 1932, when it became inadequate to serve a growing congregation. Under the able leadership of Rev. Howard Graybeal, a new church was constructed in 1933 with the help of local volunteer labor. It was dedicated on December 17, 1933 and is still standing today with its four Doric columns and beautiful stained glass windows.

The church thrived until lack of participation closed its doors in 1972. It remained closed until Jim and Juanita Soyk reopened it thirty years later, in September 2002 with one hundred guests celebrating the reopening. For the next dozen years, the church would host Christian performing groups for the entertainment and enjoyment of the community. The church has been offering Sunday morning services at 10: am continually since that time.



Kendrick Methodist Church. Chris and Will Loo gave a hand moving it to the museum.




Don't Step on That Stick!

When Georgia Martinell was walking her dog on the JK Path near the east end of Kendrick on June 22, she wasn't really paying attention to the path. She was looking ahead to homes nearby to be sure their dogs were not loose. It was approximately 90 degrees and at 8:00 o'clock in the evening. Likely the rattle snake had crawled onto the path for some warmth.

She stepped on the rattler and it immediately bit her ankle on the right side. After biting her, it coiled and started rattling. Her dog was interested in the new phenomenon, and she had trouble controlling him.

Georgia hopped home on one foot holding the bitten foot in the air, since it was extremely painful. "Like being stung by 10,000 wasps," according to Georgia. She lives in the Tom McDowell house, so it was not easy getting home.

She fed and watered her dogs, and then called her sister, Angie Pomponio, who is a nurse. Angie told her to get to a hospital as fast as she could go. She got into her car and drove herself to Lewiston. Meanwhile, Angie was arranging for the crisis behind-the-scenes.

On her drive to Lewiston, she had to stop several times because the pain was excruciating. By the time she reached St. Joseph's Hospital, her tongue was swelling and her lips tingling. At St. Joes they put her on a jet plane to St. Alphonse Hospital in Boise, where there was anti-venom available. She spent 30 hours in ICU, and another 24 hours on the 9th Floor before being cleared to return home.

It was then she discovered she had to find a way home. Life flights are a one-way ticket. She is back home in Kendrick, thankful to be alive and well. *Sharon Harris*

Western Tanager

The first time you see a male western tanager, you may rub your eyes in disbelief. It's a chunky bird, smaller than a robin, but larger than a sparrow or goldfinch. With its orange-red head and face, black back and wings, and yellow body, it reminds one of a child's crayon experiment. How could you NOT have noticed one before? Only the breeding males are this colorful. Out-of-season males, immature, and female Western Tanagers are less dramatic, with dull gray-green bodies and just a bit of yellow about the face. All of these birds have 2 distinct wing bars. Coupled with their tendency to stay high in the tree canopy, it's not surprising that they are infrequently seen.

Most birds with red plumage require certain plant pigments to provide the redness. This tanager has a different source: insects provide a substance called rhodoxanthin. Only by eating the "right" insects, does the Western Tanager have red-orange feathers. Over the course of the year, western tanagers visit the western side of our continent, from southwestern Alaska to Central America. Their chosen breeding sites are coniferous forests. They will nest in junipers, pines, firs, spruces or any other cone-bearing, needled tree, but rarely in oaks, maples or other broad-leaved species.

The females do the nest building and the mates supervise. The pair searches for a suitable site immediately on arriving in the spring and they prefer the tallest trees. Nest construction requires 4 or 5 days and follows a complicated pattern. First the female lays a foundation of large twigs. Then she weaves finer branches into the base, building up a sturdy cup. This is lined with soft fibers which may include grasses, mosses, feathers, cow or horsehair.

Western tanagers are insect eaters during the breeding season, catching wasps, ants, stinkbugs, grasshoppers, termites and even flying insects which they chase and catch on the wing. They also glean small insects from leaves and twigs high in the treetops. They will eat fruit in the fall and winter, and are very occasionally enticed by seeds to feeding trays.

Ornithologist Alexander Wilson formally described the species in 1811, based on a specimen collected by Lewis and Clark near Kamiah. The Western Tanager and all other North American tanagers are classified in the same family as Cardinals.

The family is remodeling the old farmhouse to its original glory. A professional filming crew is on hand filming the progress for national television. It will be viewable after the first of the year on Magnolia Network with is part of the Discovery Channel.
