## WHAT KEEPS THE FOOD BANK OPEN?

Have you noticed an increase in your monthly grocery bill lately? I'm sure you answered with a resounding yes. At the food bank we have not only seen an increase in the cost of food but also an increase in the number of clients we are serving. Since the first of the year we are adding 1-3 families to our client list monthly. Over the past weeks our shelves holding our reserves have quickly emptied. Three weeks before the picture on the cover was taken our shelves were packed full. We are going through our stock faster than ever before.

For years the food bank was able to get by on what was donated through the various food drives during the year but a couple years ago we started to realize this would not be enough to meet the many needs in our We now seek to find funds from outside sources. One of those is through FEMA. For the last 3 years we have qualified for funds of approximately \$1200 each year. That has been a big help but still was not sufficient. Last year we applied for the Latah County Community Foundation Grant, AND the Idaho Community Grant. We received funds from each totaling about \$2700 dollars. Also the food bank received a \$1000 dollar donation from TDS. With the grants, donations, and food drives we were able to keep up with the demand for 2007.

Do these grants and donations mean we no longer need the food drives we have depended upon in the past? 2008 has brought us new challenges. There has been the increase in cost of food and we did not Latah County the Community Foundation Grant this Spring. We now find ourselves needing to buy more food than ever with less funds than we had last year. We continue to count on all those who have had food drives in the past to do so once again this year. If your organization or group plan to have a food drive please contact Pastor Larry Haylett at 276-4510 to schedule a time for the drive. We do not want to overburden our communities by having food drives that overlap or are held at the same time. The people of the area have always responded well to the drives and it would be best for them if the drives are spaced out over time.

So what keeps the food bank doors open? It is all of you that put on the food drives, that give to the food drives and the volunteers who work at the food bank and serve on the food bank board seeking further resources for buying food. It is a community of people working together to meet the needs of people in their communities.

The Food Bank Board would like to thank each organization that has sponsored a food drive in the past and for all the people that have supported the food drives with their generous giving so that we can continue to meet the food needs of those in our communities.

#### What is "What's Happening"?

"What's Happening" is your community newsletter, created by a team of committed local citizens in response to a call for greater communication within the community Kendrick-Juliaetta and the 7 Ridges. pressing need was identified at the hugely successful "Community Visioning Rally," which was sponsored by the Horizons Program in October of 2007. "What's Happening" is published quarterly, and is mailed to 1,100 households free of charge. The newsletter's content is designed to provide information about upcoming community events, and to highlight one social service effort and one community organization in each issue.

Recently the publishing team invited officials serving on local elected boards and commissions to use the newsletter as a medium for communicating with their constituents. Organizations contacted included the City Councils of Kendrick and Juliaetta, the Juliaetta-Kendrick Recreation District, the South Latah Highway District, the Neztah Cemetery Maintenance Board, and the District #283 School Board. We are hoping that the elementary, junior high and high schools will also use this publication to inform the community important news and events.

"What's Happening" is produced solely through volunteer efforts, and funding for the project was initially provided by the Horizons Program. However, as the original grant expired on June 30th, the newsletter must henceforth rely on community funding to ensure its ongoing publication. Production costs for each issue are in excess of \$500, and while we have funds to cover the cost of paper and printing, we are now actively seeking donations to cover the cost of mailing. We encourage community businesses and individuals to consider supporting this important effort with their donations. Donors names will be listed in the newsletter, and the amounts of individual gifts will not be published.

## Never Too Late to Join Pug Marks CSI WE HAVE FUN!

Pug Marks CSI, a community service group for youth, families, and adults, has been involved in three major projects the last three months.

Pug Marks CSI has adopted the road between Juliaetta and Kendrick for two years. Have you noticed the signs? We have a commitment to clean the roadside at least twice a year. At the end of May we had our first road clean-up, completing one mile of the nearly three miles we have adopted with just three volunteers and a volunteer driver, joined later by two additional volunteers. We will be scheduling another road pick-up in early - mid October. We would welcome any help. If you are unable to do the actual labor, maybe you, too, could be a volunteer driver who could pick up and move the "road crew" (or run them to the nearest bathroom when necessary). Pug Marks CSI provides drinks and snacks; the highway department provides signs, vests, and garbage sacks. We do suggest that all volunteer road crew members wear gloves and dress appropriately for the weather, and with good footwear.

Theresa and Andy Holmes, mother and son, have been the project leaders of our community garden next to Juliaetta Zion Church. It is appreciated that Bruce Sherman donated the space, while the City of Juliaetta has donated the water. For a first attempt, and with a small crew of volunteers, we are all very proud of what we have accomplished. The produce being grown is used for Random Acts of Kindness (RAK's) and to sell at the local Farmers' Market, from 8am until we sell out, each Saturday. The funds raised at the Farmers' Market will be used to plant a garden again next year and any additional money will be used to do other service projects and more RAK's. Our produce this year consists mostly of corn, cucumbers, zucchini, and yellow crookneck squash.

The newest service project is one started and being led by Holden Nelson and Taylor Walton. They are leading a recycling project.

Because this project is so new, please watch for updates on how we are implementing the project. As of now, recyclables can be left at Holden's house between the hours of 9am and 6pm daily. For more information, please see the flyers at the community bulletin boards at the Juliaetta Library, on the Kendrick Grange, at Phil's Family Foods, or at the Juliaetta Market. We should also have updated information on our website soon. This is a service project to help those who would like to recycle but are unable to get their recyclables to Lewiston or Moscow to the recycling centers. There is potential for receiving payment for some articles, such as aluminum cans, and any funds acquired this way will be put to good use in providing funds to better implement this project, for other projects and RAK. You will notice on the flyer that Holden and Taylor are also accepting bicycles. They hope to turn those into another service project/RAK by working on the bikes and making them available to youth who could use one.

The young people in our community are AWESOME! When you see them doing good things, whether with Pug Marks CSI, or on their own, please tell them that it makes a difference and that you appreciate them.

#### KENDRICK POOL UPDATE



ing season is the olved in the opening rick War Memorial er. The pool was ig over \$120,000 for enormous amount inesses. The project,

which is still continuing this fall and next spring, was financed by over \$105,000 of donations from over 210 individuals, businesses, organizations and grants in a fund raising campaign sponsored by the Save Our Community Pool Committee and funds from the J-K Recreation District.

Renovations completed to open the pool this summer included a new water filtration system, chlorination system, water circulation pumping system, pool drainage piping, lifeguard chairs, easy access steps, removing the old paint, pool floor repair and painting with a long-lasting epoxybased paint, fence repair, pool covers, a slide, a vacuum cleaning system, new entry handrails and kiddy pool toy.

"A Big Thank You to everyone in the Community that contributed to the fund raising campaign and supported the pool project," this is a statement from the Save Our Pool Committee. The Committee also recognizes support from two grants, Thrivent Financial for Lutherans and the Idaho Community Foundation.

The Pool closed for the season Saturday, August 16. During the first six week of the pool's operation 2719 people used the pool. There was the expected heavy use during the day time swimming, also a very dedicated group of about 15 adults enjoyed the 5:15-6:45 p.m. lap swimming. There were also good crowds at the evening open swimming. Swimming lessons were given to 62 individuals in three different teaching sessions.

The pool is closing because the pool manager and lifeguards are leaving for college and attending local school programs, and it is the typical time to close pools with summer programs. "We want to thank our pool manager, Joanna Brammer, and the lifeguards, Brittani Nagle, Shandi Reid, John Liedkie and Lisa Utke and cashier Dakota White for doing an outstanding job this year," Lisher said. "Also thanks to the swimmers, their parents and

friends, the local businesses and people in the community for supporting the pool staff."

"We are exploring ways to operate the pool into September next year," Lisher said. "I have heard from a number of Mothers, who were former lifeguards and are interested in renewing their certification. This would make it possible for the pool to be operated longer. I want to encourage anyone interested in becoming part of this program to contact me."

"We are going into a busy and exciting fall and spring season for the pool," report Lisher and Don Ingle, treasurer of the Save Our Community Pool Committee. "We need to replace part of the decking around the pool, install a solar water heating system for early season swimming, and upgrading the bath house to make it handicap accessible (ADA). For ADA accessibility we will need pool entry lift equipment."

Ingle said the Save Our Community Pool committee still needs donations to finish the fall and spring projects. Donation can be send to the Save Our Community Pool, P.O. Box 242, Kendrick, Idaho, 83537.

The Save Our Community Pool Committee, operating under the J-K Recreation District, conducted the campaign to raise the money, plan the renovations and negotiated the agreement with the City of Kendrick, City of Juliaetta and the J-K Recreation District that will financially support the long term operation of the pool. They also set up the Pool Advisory committee to have community involvement in management of the pool. Committee members were George Brocke, chairman, Patti vice-chairman, Polly Taylor-Dennler Silflow secretary, Don Ingle Treasurer, Greg Mann and Lee Heath.

Representatives on the Advisory Committee are Dale Lisher, Kendrick and Chairman; Jeff Lohman (alternate Ed Pea), Juliaetta; and Chad Henson, Recreation District Board, and community representatives replacing Patti Silflow (alternate Julie Heimgartner) and Mellissa Eichner.

The program has operated in the community for the past 6 years, and is currently overseen by board members Lauralee Kunder, Hermina Meyers, Jean Clemenhagen, and Polly Taylor Dennler.

Students are referred to the program by elementary school staff, and attendance averages around 12 children per session. The group meets every Thursday from 3:00 p.m. till 5:00 p.m., starting in the last week of September, and continuing through the second week of May. The sessions are held in the basement of Zion Lutheran Church, which is located just a few blocks from the school, and students are escorted from the school to the church by a volunteer.

Upon arrival, students are given a snack (donated by members of the partner churches), and then they are asked to complete their school homework assignments. Adult and high school volunteers are available to serve as mentors, providing support for the children as they work. When they have finished their homework, students may engage in their choice of free activities such as board games, puzzles, reading and drawing, or take part in structured cooking, gardening, music and art projects until the end of the session. Parents are responsible for their children's transportation home from the church.

This valuable service is provided to participants free of charge, so the program relies entirely on the generous support of community volunteers and donors. As the new school year approaches, the C4F Board is seeking volunteers to mentor the children's work and/or lead group activities, as well as financial contributions to defray the costs of operation. We also welcome donations of books, games, puzzles, and snacks for the children.
