Back to school...

The Juliaetta Elementary School office will be open beginning August 2nd from 7am to 3pm. We are continuing to take Kindergarten and new enrollment registrations. Kindergartners must be 5 years old on or before August 31st. Please bring birth certificate and immunization record when you register. Most five year olds are due for a follow-up immunization before school begins. We are happy to announce an all day Kindergarten program this year, thanks to the 21st Century Grant.

Class supply lists for grades K - 6 are available in the JES office as well as the application for the Latah County School Supply program.

School begins Wednesday, August 25th at 8:25AM. Students and their parents may arrive early that morning to visit the classrooms and put supplies away.

The 21st Century Before and After School Programs will begin the first week of September. This exciting program will benefit students in many academic and social goals. The 21st Century Grant projects will be available for five years at JES.

Our district custodians, Sharon Harvey, Tracey Boltz and their summer hire, Gabe Cirka have been busy so our building is ready for students. A big thank you for their diligence and consistent hard work. Maintenance Supervisor Joe Chapman and summer help Mike Hogan have been working on the outside of the building and grounds for a great appearance and sound maintenance. A big thank you for their perfecting work.

Our JES building and staff will be ready and excited to welcome all students back for the 2010-2011 school year.

Superintendent's Message

It is hard to believe we are gearing up for the 2010/11 School Year to begin. To reflect upon last year, it was a very tough year as we faced the cuts to our state funding, this was due to a decrease in students plus the state reduction, and unfortunately we expect more to come. Our entire staff took a 5% cut in salary and we will have less dollars for supplies and materials this year. As many already know we have cut our teaching staff by over three full time positions. This year the Supplemental Levy remained the same, so no new taxes will be levied. All recommendations and decisions were based upon the student education.

Important changes that have occurred in our school begin with the award of the 21st Century Grant, which creates a full time, all day, 5 day a week Kindergarten program. This change all by itself will be positive for the education of our students and will elevate the curriculum.

The next change, is in the school calendar, with the aid of early release time for teachers and staff collaboration. This will provide quality time for the staff to develop the curriculum, assessments, and lessons for all grade levels. These release days will be the first Friday of each month. Please note your calendar for the dates and times.

Another change I will mention is that of restricted field trips and the limit on supplies ordered, as the state has withdrawn funding for both of these activities. School funding will be an ongoing issue in Idaho and Kendrick Joint School District for years to come. With the changes we have put into effect, I hope we are in a good position now to weather the storm.

The last change is that of the new state requirement for reporting all data to the state. Idaho System for Education Excellence (ISEE) is the new system that begins this fall. The vision is "Every parent and educator will have access to the data they need to guide instruction on a daily basis and measure the academic progress of all students". What this means to us is that the school will be sending home a form for information that will need to be updated. This form needs to be returned with accurate information. It is very important that the staff and parents make sure what is being reported is correct, as funding is tied to this program.

On a positive side, our school has met or exceeded the No Child Left Behind standards for the second year. This is a compliment to the staff, students and the parents for all the hard work in improving our schools, test scores. Although with each bright side comes another challenge, next year the scores will need to increase, so we as a district continue to improve.

Youth Advocacy Council

Julietta-Kendrick Youth Advocacy Council (J-KYAC) is a subcommittee of the KJ7 (formerly KJCDA) formed with the goals of providing support and guidance to local youth at risk for substance abuse, and promoting healthy choices among this vulnerable segment of our community.

KJ7 is a member of the Latah County Youth Advocacy Council (LCYAC), whose mission is “promoting and facilitating youth development in Latah County by working together, strengthening families and involving youth.” One of KJ7’s primary goals is to improve the level of community programs addressing the issue of substance abuse among our local youth.

During its second meeting, the J-KYAC outlined a list of specific activities and strategies to research, sponsor or promote. These include school-based programs that have already proved successful in our community, and others that have not yet been implemented.

In addition, J-KYAC plans to provide information on substance abuse prevention to parents and the community as a whole, through open meetings, distribution of literature, and publication of updates and events on the KJ7 community website at <http://www.kendrick-juliaetta.org>

One of the council’s most important initiatives will be to advocate for administration of the Statewide Substance Use and School Climate Survey in our local district this fall, with the 6th, 8th, 10th and 12th grades participating. The information compiled would be invaluable, as it is crucial for the council to understand the youth perspective on substance use in our community.

Fun with Flowers

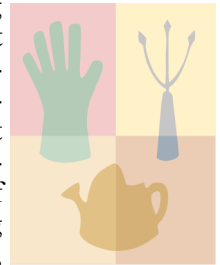

Please plan to join us at the Kendrick City Park beginning at 9:00 am on Saturday, August 21st and Saturday, September 18th.

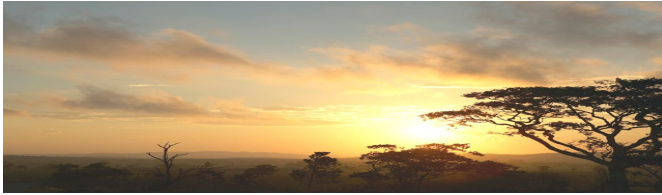
Garden Club Plans Busy Year

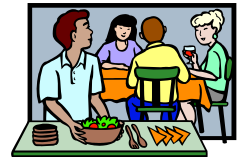
Swim Team

JK Senior Meals, an IRS designated public non-profit charity, has been in business since 2006 serving tasty home style meals to area seniors, and non-seniors. Our meals are reasonably priced at a suggested donation of \$4 for seniors willing to register, and a mandatory fee of \$6 for under sixty patrons, \$3 for youth ages 3-12 (accompanied by an adult please), and FREE to those under three years old (also accompanied by an adult please). All meals include a main entree, salad or mashed potatoes and gravy or both, desert and a drink. In an effort to make more residents aware of our services, we are opening our doors to the public at 9am on meal days, Wednesdays and Fridays. We will be serving coffee until lunch is served at noon. It is our hope that area residents will come in, bring a checker set or deck of cards, or even a puzzle, and visit with other patrons. Coffee, a bottomless cup no less, will be served with a suggested donation of 50 cents. For non coffee drinkers, we have tea and fruit juice too. We also hope to have cookies and breads or other snacks available during the morning coffee time. So, if you know of a senior citizen that could use a little socializing and friendship, a good meal, and entertainment during or after the meal in the form of music, health and nutrition information, or maybe just to get out of the house, bring them down to the JK Senior Meals in the J-K Senior Citizen building on the corner of South 6th and Railroad. Our number here is 289-5031. We are here mostly on Wednesday and Friday, but we have a message machine and will call you back if you have a question. Transitions

In the next couple of months you are going to watch a transition take place that is easily missed. We will move from the hot days of summer into the cooler days of fall. As we watch it occur from day to day we see little that changes but when we put those days together we then realize much has changed. We have moved from Summer activities and begin school activities. We may look back and ask ourselves how did we get here? As God works and makes changes in our lives each one may seem insignificant. Somewhere though we see the individual small changes as a whole and realize some rather significant changes have occurred. A STORY FROM EARLY KENDRICK



Ernest Clem came to Kendrick in 1902. He promptly sent for his wife Nellie (Martin) and two small children, Esther and William (Bill.) Nellie gave birth to four more children in Kendrick. Sadly, a baby boy named Edgar died of whooping cough when he was two weeks old. The remaining children were George, Shirley (Denham), and Helen (Gehrke.) The family first lived in North Kendrick near the current football field and later in west Kendrick. Both

houses burned down.

Ernest was a house painter and wall paper hanger. He rode his horse into the surrounding countryside with his saddlebags bulging with wall paper and paint samples. Farm wives would order and a week later he would perform the work.

He was also a scout master for the troop pictured below. On one of their campouts they hiked into Atwater Lake. One of the scouts was bitten by a rattlesnake. Ernest got the chance to practice what he preached, and promptly sucked the venom from the wound. He put the injured scout on a horse and rode back to Kendrick with him. The boy lived.

Ernest owned the first truck in Kendrick. He started a fresh produce business. He drove to Lewiston each week to purchase vegetables and fruits. He delivered them to homes and stores in Kendrick on the following day. It proved unprofitable and was soon discontinued.

South Latah Highway District

The Road Commissioners made a resolution to restrict the traffic on the South Grade Road to downhill traffic only during the harvest season under the provision of Title 40 of the Idaho Code. The commissioners feel this is necessary to improve the safety of this road since it is a narrow, winding grade where a near fatal accident occurred in 2009 involving a grain truck. In addition, there have been numerous complaints about the safety of the road during harvest.

During the 2009 harvest season, South Latah Highway District incurred some major damage to some of its roads partly due to overweight trucks. We ask that you haul legal loads and be courteous to other drivers. Also, there have been complaints of some trucks driving too fast. Please watch your speed for your safety and the safety of other drivers and residents.
