The Pat Rush Medical Assistance Fund was established by Pat Rush and friends during her courageous battle with cancer. It was Pat's wish to continue helping individuals facing life threatening illnesses caused by disease or accident. Since the first Octoberfest in 2009 the Pat Rush Medical Assistance Fund has assisted 9 individuals. The Friends of Pat Rush would like to thank the community for the amazing show of support. Often times community members want to know who we have helped and how much money was provided. Due to our confidentiality by-laws we cannot share this information. We are proud to say that in the past 2 years we have raised approximately \$49,000. We have awarded \$37,000 in medical assistance funding to area KJ7 residents.

You may purchase an ornament and have your loved one's name placed on the ornament. The ornament will then be placed on the memorial tree during the Light the Park Ceremony. ## Demands on Food Bank Increase

Since the Spring the demands on the J/K Good Samaritan Food Bank have steadily increased. We are serving more clients than we have ever served before on a weekly basis. Along with the increase of clients we have experienced what all of you have been experiencing, an increase in the cost of food. We do our best to find the best prices and sale prices (yea for Rosauers cereal sales) but the monthly cost continues to rise. The first four months of the year, January thru April, food cost were about \$1900. For just the two months of May and June food cost were over \$2000 and at the end of June we had a lot of empty storage shelves and two empty freezers. We recently received a \$1000 grant from the Idaho Community Foundation for which we are grateful, but you can see how quickly that will be used up. We continue to receive free food from the Idaho Food Bank but the demand on it has increased thus less is available from them

We do appreciate the support from individuals and community groups and want you to know that without that support we would not be able to do what we are doing. The time of year is approaching when various organizations will be having food drives. We want to thank you in advance for your participation in those drives. One request we would make is that you be sure to check dates on any contribution you make for we cannot distribute the food if it is 3 years beyond it date and some foods even less than that. Again thank you for your support and helping us meet the needs of people in our communities. -Pastor Larry Haylett

#### Fire Safety Tips:

**What household appliance causes more than 1,000 residential fires per month in the US? The answer... your clothes dryer!**

Your clothes dryer is one of the most common causes of household fires. If clothes dryers are not properly installed or maintained, life threatening fires can occur.

**"Failure to clean" is the leading factor contributing to clothes dryer fires. Don't ignore these signs that your dryer vent may be obstructed:**

- Clothing is still damp at the end of a typical drying cycle
  - Drying requires longer times than normal
  - Clothes feel hotter than usual at the end of the cycle
  - Outside the dryer is unusually hot
  - Damper (or flappers) on exhaust termination doesn't open or barely opens during drying
  - Laundry room feels warmer or more humid than normal
- Burnt smell in laundry room

#### **Preventative steps**

1. At least once a year have your dryer serviced and cleaned to remove any lint collected on the motor, wires and inside the exhaust pipe. This is critical to safe operation of your dryer.
2. Replace the white vinyl type flexible exhaust hose with flexible metal or sheet metal vent pipe. The metal is more fire resistant and can help contain a fire should one start. Metal pipe is also less likely to kink than vinyl exhaust hose.
3. Exhaust hoses should be kept as short as possible and have a minimum of bends to facilitate adequate airflow.
4. Locate the dryer as close to an outside wall as possible for safe venting.

Do not operate your dryer when no one is home or while you are sleeping.

## Naturalized (Weed) Trees of Kendrick



The beauty and diversity of Kendrick's urban forest helps make this town what it is. Away from Main Street, on stream sides (and back yards), our two most frequently planted street trees are also well represented. Four others have found their way there by themselves. By any other name, these four trees are weeds – plants out of place – are slowly out-competing native vegetation and altering habitat. A brief sketch of each follows.

Black locust (*Robinia pseudoacacia*), from the eastern United States, is our most numerous street tree with about 31% of total inventory. Legume seed falls to the ground or is carried away by birds, and it forms dense groves from root suckers.

Norway maple (*Acer platanoides*), a popular northern European species representing 20% of our urban forest, also escapes cultivation easily and is happy nearly everywhere in our lower valley. Fruit is a dual samara (seed with sail), wind dispersed to great effect.

Mahalab cherry (*Prunus mahaleb*) probably arrived here via birds and has found a home along our streamsides, and then some. From the Mediterranean and Middle East, it was used as rootstock for commercial cherries. Typically it is a small tree with thin-fleshed fruit and small leaves.

Tree of heaven (*Ailanthus altissima*) is native to China. To date, I have only seen it along the guard rail (and below) going up Hwy 99, 500' or so from Main Street. However, its widespread occurrence in the L/C Valley gives a hint as to how it might impact our landscape in future decades. Seed is a single samara, seed pods light brownish, conspicuous, beginning around mid-to-late July; male and female flowers borne on separate trees. Spreading freely underground, plants are very difficult to eradicate once established. The large leaves, 2' - 4' long, are alternate each other, pinnately compound (like mt. ashes and elderberries) and contain 10-25 leaflets, the margins of which have no serrations or saw-teeth, with 1-4 small lobes at leaflet base. Spreading freely underground, plants are very difficult to eradicate once established. I suggest all homeowners and the City be aware of this one and stop naturalization – or at least slow it down.

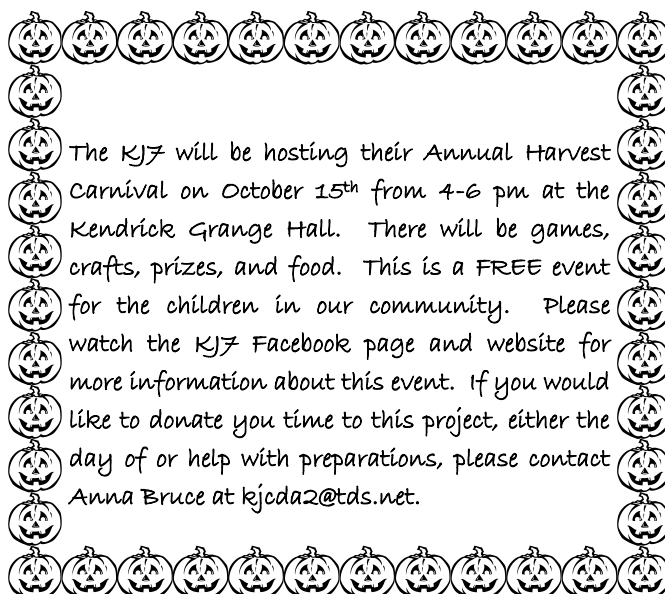
## Summer Night in the Park

### TRAVELING MOBILE PET SURGICAL UNIT

Dr. Tammy Faulkner, director of a non-profit Spay Neuter Clinic in Moscow, has acquired a grant to buy a mobile surgical unit that may come to our area to provide low cost services. The main target will be dogs 40 pounds and over as they fill shelters with the biggest litters and these will be free. This mobile unit will provide spays and neuters for small dogs, cats, kittens and puppies at whatever people can afford. Surgeries will be performed in a 20-foot mobile surgical unit that will come on a consistent basis depending on the need of this community. Vaccinations will cost \$15.

In order for this to happen Dr. Faulkner must have a volunteer who can offer a main contact phone number and the commitment of volunteers to advertise and schedule surgeries. ## A Glimpse of History

The following is from the life of Effie Faw, who came to Big Pottlatch Ridge in the spring of 1882 when she was three years old. Her family consisted of an older brother Charles, a sister Clara (then 12 years old), along with her mother and father. They all traveled by covered wagon to this area seeking fertile farm land to homestead. She describes the area as deep timbered canyons with rolling grassland. In those days it was a full day's travel to get from one ridge to another.

Since there were only half a dozen homesteads, her father had a good choice of land. The first year he constructed a small two-room log cabin. It had a board loft overhead where the children slept in ticks filled with bunchgrass. They had a fireplace for heat and a small sheet metal cook stove. The family arrived late in the fall and didn't have many staples to see them through the winter. They brought flour, sugar, bacon, and potatoes with them. They had no vegetables, no canned fruits, no milk, and no fresh meat, since their father had fallen ill with rheumatism. To compound their trouble, their mother became ill and unable to care for the family. All the care of the family fell upon Clara. By the end of the winter, they had only wheat left which they would grind into a mush in their coffee grinder. Two of their horses died from inadequate feed. The next year brought scarlet fever to the family and her brother died.

After that things got better. Their father's health improved and he built a kitchen, a bedroom, and a lean-to onto the log cabin. He also helped build the Grinold's School House which was a box house. The first year the school operated three months out of the year. Gradually it was increased by another month until it reached a six-month school year. Effie received an 8<sup>th</sup> Grade education at the school, which was all the education that was afforded to females at that time. Anyone desiring a high school education had to move to Kendrick and live with a family there and work for room and board. An education in those days was earned. *-Sharon Harris*
