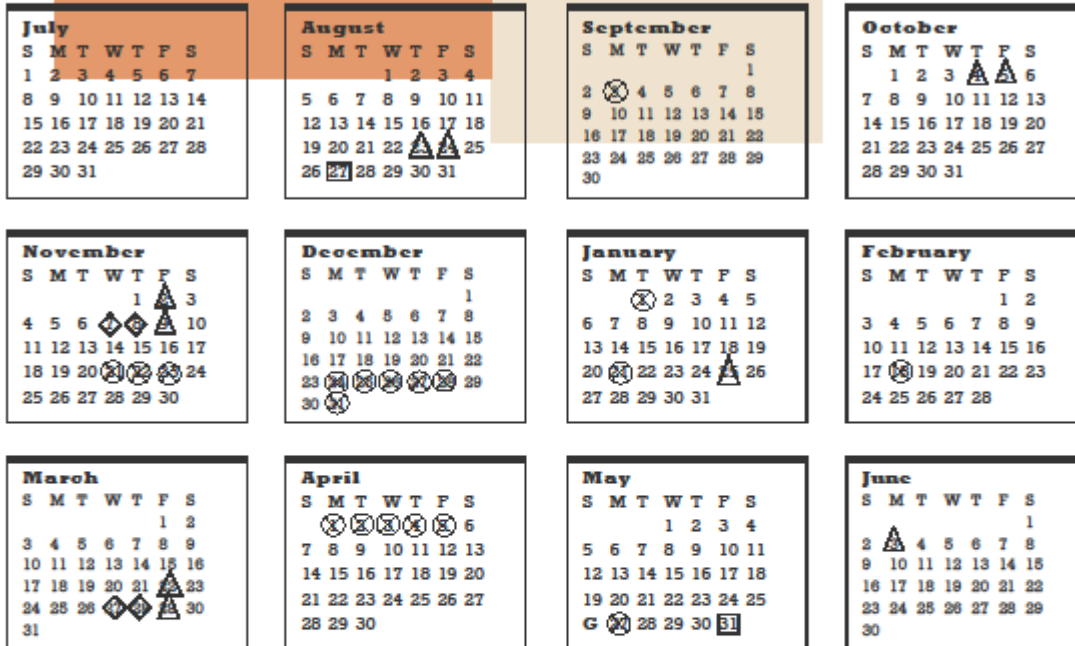

The J-K Walking Tour is receiving JKHF attention with new business and home "Historical Tour" site sign installation. We continue to collect site facts and historic pictures for a new tour booklet and to further produce, a companion DVD detailing sites in each city. This tour has been enhanced and enlarged because a total of \$3,200 was received from the following: J-K Recreation District, Kendrick Lions Club, Latah County Arts & Culture Committee, Colters Creek Winery, and Idaho Community Foundation's Northern Regions Greatest Need Fund.

JKHF funding has also been acquired, in the amount of \$7,700 from Clearwater Power Co, Avista, TDS, Tri-State Outfitters, Moneysaver, and Juliaetta's Zion Lutheran Church. With that money, the Grange building's second floor area, our future home, will receive insulation, electrical and painting attention.

Kendrick Hardware and Red Cross Pharmacy are selling JKHF's latest publication "The History of Leland" available for \$33.00 (add \$3.00 for mailing). It is a 400+ page historical publication that merges past history with present realities. Kendrick Urban Forestry



The Kendrick Urban Forestry Board began the spring/summer activities by sponsoring the annual Arbor Day event on April 21. Partnering with the Art Committee and the Hill and Valley Garden Club, the Forestry Board used grant funds to cover the costs of a breakfast, door prizes and a tree planting ceremony. The local Cub Scouts participated with a skit pertaining to trees. Robert Barkley, Idaho Department of Land's Private Forestry Specialist, presented the Board with a 15 year Tree City USA flag. A nice Red Sunset Maple tree was planted in the park with many of the community youth participating.

The Board, with funds from a Latah County Parks and Recreation grant, has set in motion another summer program of watering and maintenance of plantings along the trail. Local resident Dave Klatt has been hired again to perform the duties of watering, weeding and pruning of trees along the trail. Another project being pursued by the Board includes a tree identification project in the City Park. A grant from the Latah Community Foundation has paid to survey the park, identify tree species and hire someone to prepare the graphic drawing to be displayed on the kiosk in the park. U of I Landscape Architecture student, Brian Edwards of Moscow, has been hired to complete the technical part of this project. This will hopefully be completed by the end of summer.

Pruning and care for residential trees situated in public right of way is the responsibility of the owner adjacent to the trees. Grants have been obtained in the past to perform this type of tree maintenance but presently there are no funds to assist property owners. There have been a few residents showing some interest in having their trees pruned and not sure how to go about getting it done. The Board has started a program to compile a list of names of those interested in having trees pruned. When a sufficient number of names are obtained, the Board will solicit quotes from licensed tree services and then determine if the cost is acceptable to all owners on that list. City of Kendrick

Wastewater Treatment Facility Study

In order to bring the wastewater system into compliance with Department of Environmental Quality and Environmental Protection Agency regulations, the City of Kendrick is moving forward with a wastewater facility plan for upgrading our sewer treatment plant. The city received a \$20,000 grant from the DEQ to help pay for this study. The total cost of the study will be \$40,000. Mountain Water Works Engineering will be doing the study. The study will provide three alternatives for improving the wastewater treatment facility. The selection of the most efficient and cost effective system will be presented to the community. The city council will hold a public hearing to provide information on a bond election and looks forward to public input.

The City of Kendrick is applying for an Idaho Community Block Grant to help fund the wastewater treatment facility. As part of the application, the community has to provide current estimates of the income of the residents of the service area. The city will be conducting a confidential door to door survey. The survey will be conducted in mid-August.

Recycling Center

We need your help! ***The City of Kendrick is in jeopardy of losing our recycling bins due to the amount of trash and non-recyclable items being thrown in our recycle bins.*** Please remember that only recyclable items can be disposed of at our recycling center. We have seen an increase of non-recyclable items, such as Styrofoam, being disposed of in our bins. Also, please do not dump your recyclable items on the ground when the bins are full. If the bins are full, please return at another time. If we cannot keep our bins clean we will lose them! The recycling centers produced 200 tons last year which did not go into the landfill. This helps keep the costs down for everyone!

Budget Hearing

The City of Kendrick Budget Hearing will be held on Tuesday, August 21, at 7:00 PM at City Hall. The public is welcome to attend.

South Latah Highway District

Many of the roads in the Kendrick & Juliaetta area have been treated for dust control with MgCl. Please be especially watchful for trucks and farm equipment on the roads during the harvest season. Drive safely and slow down on the curves.

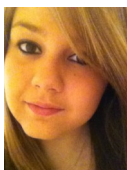
