Kendrick Juliaetta & 7 Ridges Education Foundation Launched and Running

Providing funds for student scholarships, additional teaching resources and opportunities to enhance the quality of education for students in Kendrick Joint School District #283 are the priorities of a newly established Education Foundation

The Kendrick Juliaetta & 7 Ridges Education Foundation was organized in February, 2013, introduced to the community in October, and is now fully operational. Fund raising is the next order of business for the foundation Board of Directors. In addition to area individuals and organizations, the Board will be contacting the more than 1200 alumni of Kendrick High School.

The foundation is an independent, nonprofit, community-based organization designed to provide opportunities for stakeholders in the community to support and enhance the quality of education for all students in the district. The foundation is a 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization which means that all contributions are exempt from federal income tax for those who itemize deductions.

"During the planning period there was tremendous support from the individuals in the community, school district board of directors, school administrations and school staff for establishing a foundation that can increases the educations opportunities of the local schools," said Polly Taylor-Dennler, member of the foundation board and leader of the organizing committee. "We are very grateful to our past superintendent, Cal Sprangler, for encouraging us and strongly supporting the idea of starting a foundation."

Several school districts in our area have Education Foundations that support their students. For example, Troy, Genesee and Lewiston school districts have had foundations for a number of years.

Foundations receive and manage donated money by investing it so that the income from the investments will support the scholarships and teaching resource grants. The local board has adopted a prudent and conservative investment policy that will be managed by a professional investment organization in the area.

A unique feature of the KJ7 foundation is that donations can be made to support a specific project or program in the school. By making this type of donation, for example, to support a science field trip, a special music program, or the purchase of special teaching equipment or materials, the donation is tax-deductible.

Applications are required for scholarships to students who plan to attend two and four year training, college and university programs and for grants to teachers asking for teaching resources.

What is KJ72

As Kendrick and Juliaetta community members, we often hear someone mention KJ7 or see this moniker attached to an event, but what is KJ7?

Several years ago, a group of concerned citizens participated in a program called Horizon. This program was developed to hold community meetings and ask area residents about issues which were important to their community. One of the concerns mentioned at each Horizon meeting was the feeling that those who lived outside the cities of Kendrick and Juliaetta were not well represented. When the Horizon program ended and all concerns were documented, the Kendrick Juliaetta and 7 Ridges (KJ7) organization was founded in May, 2010, with representation from Kendrick, Juliaetta, and the 7 Ridges (Fix Ridge, American Ridge, Little Bear Ridge, Big Bear Ridge, Texas Ridge, Cedar Ridge and Potlatch Ridge.)

KJ7 by-laws state in part "The KJ7 Corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, educational or scientific purposes of serving the evolving needs of the KJ7 community through networking, advocacy and education, and providing opportunities to local organizations seeking to build their own capacity to improve the quality of life in their communities." The purpose of KJ7 is to "bring community together to explore the issues of retaining its character and identity, and plan for its future."

Many of our community activities have been sponsored and or supported by KJ7 in direct alignment of their mission statement: "KJ7 is a close knit and nurturing community that attracts families of all ages. We offer a strong and complete education in both academic and vocational areas. We maintain our small town values while growing in a moderate and thoughtful manner. We have a culture of being open and inclusive, offering a diversity of events and attractions that appeal to young and old alike. KJ7 are operating together from a coordinated plan where we are building on, and adding value to, our traditional agricultural and resource based industries. We are THE place to stop for recreation, local food, and a great small town experience. We support our entrepreneurs and our innovative industries with great infrastructure that connects us to the world."

Some of the activities KJ7 has brought to our communities include Summer Night in the Park; Light the Park; Get Acquainted Bags; What's Happening Newsletter; Stars of Our Community, and Latah County Youth Advocacy Council. Within these activities, opportunities are given to other agencies to participate.

Most rural towns have difficulty knowing what is happening in their own neighborhoods. The KJ7 Facebook page, newsletter, and website (www.kendrick-juliaetta.org) give our area residents access to dates of upcoming events as well as an avenue to report on their particular activity. These social media tools are updated regularly.



Gritman has been serving the medical needs of Kendrick since 1999.

The clinic can take care of the following needs for you or your family: Wellness checks, pre-employment physicals, Infant to senior care, Medicare and

Medicaid exams, Chronic disease management ,Immunizations, Pregnancy and reproductive health testing, and Urgent care for influenza, coughs and colds, minor cuts and injuries. Bob will refer you on to specialist care when appropriate. The clinic is open to serve you Monday through Friday from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm.

Juliaetta Community Library

President, Dana Kelly, and Librarian, Linda Dahl, presented information to the Juliaetta City Council during the Council's November meeting. Information was presented about suggestions the public listed in the recent library surveys and the results of those surveys. These results led us to set some small goals and one big goal, some of which we asked for the City's permission and help with. These small goals included projects such as painting, shelving, diaper changing station, bathroom upgrade, drinking fountain, and windows. However, we needed to know more about the structure of the building and how to proceed with some of these projects. After little discussion it was unanimous in opinion, by the council members, that the current building is not structurally sound enough to put a large amount of money into. They feel it would be better to explore the avenues of relocating or building a new library for our community, which happened to be the bigger goal desired by the Friends of the Library.

In order to achieve this goal it will take the work of grant writing which the City feels they can help with. It will be our job as the Friends of the Library to begin to elicit help from you, the community. It will be very important for us to have matching funds and, in kind, donations of materials, time, and labor by people. Even though the completion of this goal might be years away, we want to start collecting information now. We will need help in every area of construction or remodeling. Troy recently remodeled their library and if you have not seen it you should stop by. It is beautiful and only cost them approximately \$42,000 since most of the work was donated by local community members. Please help us by thinking about how you can help with this project.

In the meantime we will continue to work on the smaller goals. If you haven't seen the lobby since we rearranged it, you need to stop by. Ellen made some wonderful new curtains, Rob did maintenance work, and it is now a welcoming entrance, complete with our book sale area. Now imagine what that will look like when we get it painted in the spring! We also plan to paint the bathroom and add a diaper changing station. In Kendrick School District we pride ourselves in caring for our students and giving them the best education possible. I firmly believe that we provide a well-rounded and quality education for all of our children. Every employee is here to serve our students and their families. I hope that we can earn your respect and trust in helping your child become the best that he or she can be academically, socially, emotionally and physically.

Lookin ahead to 2014, we will be asking for your support in the upcoming levy on March 11th. Our School Board does its best to keep the levy rate stable from year to year, and we do not anticipate the need to raise it this year, but we want you to know that the levy is crucial to maintaining the quality of our children's education. As you know, education is not funded adequately at the State level. So, the local annual levy provides essential resources to keep our schools operating in the black.

During 2014 we will begin the important work of long— and short-term facility and program planning to identify the District's priorities. These efforts will develop and use information from several sources and consult a broad range of key stakeholders including the School Board of Trustees, the KJ7 Educational Foundation, the PTO, parents, students and KJ7 community members. We invite you to participate in an open-forum session on January 15th at 7:00pm, held in the Juliaetta Elementary School Cafeteria. This occasion will provide you with an opportunity to learn more about the schools and to give your input about what we need to do in the future.

Please also calendar February 5th at Kendrick High School for a special meeting focusing on the March 11th Levy. I will explain why we need to maintain the current levy rate and together with our board members, business manager and high school principal, we will answer your questions and encourage you once again to financially support our children's education. *-Dr. Lindsay Park*

JES Principal's Report

The children at Juliaetta Elementary School are energetic and enthusiastic. They proved this during the celebration of our Holiday Concert on December 13th. Under the direction of Joanne Gertje, every student participated and the result was wonderful. Kindergarten through fourth grade children sang songs with their classmates and the fifth and sixth grade students performed in a well-produced and acted play. Many students had leading roles which they performed with confidence. The children had worked very hard preparing for their parents and community members. The concert was well-attended, and we thank you for attending and supporting all of our children.

Our students regularly show their abundant *Tiger Spirit*. Just in the last few weeks they have participated in a community food drive and decorated our school Christmas tree with their own unique holiday creations. We have a wonderful school with a highly professional staff, and we care deeply for the welfare and progress of every student.

This year we are implementing the common core state standards (CCSS). There is evidence that these standards are better preparing students to go on after high school. In Kentucky, which implemented these higher academic standards before any other state, they have now tested students for two years and seen positive results. In 2010, only 34% of Kentucky students graduated prepared for college or career. Now, 54% are graduating prepared, a significant increase in the number of students who do not need to take remedial courses once they go on to postsecondary.

Statewide academic standards are not new in Idaho. Achievement standards were developed in the 1990s to ensure students were mastering the same information and knowledge at the end of a grade level no matter where they lived in the state. When these standards first began, they were based on research and they have raised student achievement significantly. When educators and state policy makers compared Idaho's previous standards to the new CCSS, however, they found that the CCSS were considerably higher.

This year and next, as we transition to the CCSS, we ask for your patience. All the experts anticipate a decline in student performance as we implement the higher standards and more difficult and sophisticated tests. That may happen, so we are notifying you in advance. I want you also to know that we will do everything in our power to maintain our four-star rating as one of Idaho's best elementary schools. We have a wonderful, professional, hard-working staff and smart children, and I think we will emerge from the transition better and stronger than before. Stay tuned...

After all the fall and Christmas activities, things have slowed down a bit at Cameron Lutheran...at least for a little while!

The Sunday schedule will stay the same, with Sunday School for children and adults at 9:30 Sunday morning, and worship services at 11:00. The women will resume their meetings at 9 a.m. on the first and third Wednesdays of each month (and the fifth, if there is a fifth Wednesday), with lunch served at noon. The day is filled with hand-quilting for those who love to do that, assembling and tying relief quilts, working on relief kits, and doing whatever else needs to be done. ALL hands are welcome! The evening Bible study will continue to meet on the first Monday night of the month, and the afternoon group meets on the second Tuesday.

The library at Cameron is absolutely full of good reading, ranging from Bibles, study guides, and reference books to a lot of good Christian fiction, biographies, and inspirational books; there are also videos and childrens' books. There are a number of locally-written family histories available, as well as the complete history of the Cameron cemetery, including pictures of each tombstone. Anonymous donors are contributing \$2 per book read to a project which will supply well-digging equipment to villages whose people sometimes have to walk miles a day to get clean water. The librarians sponsor a yearly reading celebration for everyone who wants to come - those who have read 10 books over the year get to eat free, and others are asked for a small donation. This year's party will be on January 12 right after church. Any money raised at the party goes for buying more books.

Cameron is enjoying having Pastor Craig Groseclose on board, and has certainly gotten him thoroughly broken in with all the fall activities!. He is planning on beginning a study on the Sermon on the Mount sometime in mid-January - stay tuned for exact dates and times.

The season of Lent begins on Wednesday, March 3rd. There will be a service at 7:00 p.m. on Ash Wednesday (March 3), then there will be services each Wednesday at 7:00 until Holy Week. Easter will be April 20. The choir will meet at 7:30 each Wednesday until March 3, then will rehearse after the services during Lent.

The Latah Trail in Bear Creek Canyon



Bear Creek
Canyon is one of those
special places we are
lucky to have in our own
backyard. A trek down
this portion of the Latah
Trail will bring you in the
midst of towering pines
and the meandering

Bear Creek whose intensity changes with the seasons. It is a beautiful, peaceful place during any season. We are now coming upon the snowy time of year, and this portion of the trail makes for a wonderful (and easy) snowshoe or crosscountry ski journey.

In the coming years we will have more of this lovely canyon to enjoy. The Latah Trail Foundation is excited to announce that through its efforts, Latah County has acquired an additional ¾ of a mile of public trail in Bear Creek Canyon. We enjoyed working with a Bear Creek Canyon land owner to negotiate the sale of their rail property to Latah County. We thank them very much for the time they spent with us to work on the transfer of their property. The funds to purchase the property were donated to the Foundation from a generous anonymous donor. The Foundation thanks all who were involved in this exciting project.

Following the railroad being abandoned, and thus also its maintenance, there is damage to this section over the years due to mud slides from above and washouts from below. Latah County and trail volunteers are working to mitigate further damage to the trail this winter season, while the County and the Foundation are actively pursuing funding to repair the trail in 2014. Once repairs are completed, the Bear Creek Canyon portion of the Latah Trail will extend almost 5 miles from Troy toward Kendrick.

Accessed from Troy, the trail in Bear Creek Canyon is a very different, more isolated experience than the rest of the Latah Trail. Remember that experiencing Bear Creek Canyon is like a backcountry experience in both its remoteness and proximity to wildlife (bears and moose have been sighted in the past). Please be safe and respect private property.

MESSAGE FROM SOUTH LATAH HIGHWAY DISTRICT

Drivers should check Idaho's 511 Traveler Services website (511.idaho.gov) or call 5-1-1 before traveling out of town in the winter for the latest reports on highway and weather conditions. Get information available 24 hours per day about road closures, highway and weather conditions, mountain passes and the interstate highway system. Reports are updated at least twice daily during the week and at least once daily on weekends. They also are changed more frequently as weather and highway conditions change.

Slow down. Leave a few minutes early, allow windshields adequate time to defrost and allow extra time to get to your destination. It is better to be a few minutes late than to not arrive at all. Don't put yourself and others at risk by driving too fast for the conditions. Posted speed limits represent maximum speeds for ideal conditions. The basic rule suggests lower speeds as dictated by weather and highway conditions.

Use extra caution. Be aware of potentially icy areas such as shady spots and bridges. Take caution against black ice. Drive less than the speed limit if conditions warrant. Allow extra distance between your car and the one you're following. Check your mirrors to see how other motorists are driving; anticipate their actions

Keep emergency supplies in the car. Flashlights, extra batteries, first aid kit, pocket knife/multi-purpose tool, blanket or sleeping bag, extra clothing, small sack of sand or cat litter for generating traction under vehicle wheels, a small shovel, bottled water, booster cables, rope, energy bars or other food, brightly-colored scarf to attract attention in case of an emergency, waterproof matches or cigarette lighter and a map of the area.

Never drink and drive. Idaho law enforcement officers will increase patrols, especially during holidays, to catch and arrest drunk drivers. Be safe and keep others safe by designating a sober driver before traveling to any party or event involving alcohol consumption.

Dog Licenses

The City of Kendrick requires dogs to be licensed each year. A dog that is spayed or neutered is \$5.00 and dogs that are not are \$10.00. Please do not include the fee with your utility bill as they are separate accounts. You can purchase licenses at City Hall.

Garbage Roll-carts

Hopefully you are finding the new roll-carts easy to use. Remember that all trash put in the roll-cart must be bagged. If you have extra trash, it must also be bagged and placed next to your roll-cart. The sanitation employees are not allowed to throw anything into the truck anymore, so once the automatic arm dumps your roll-cart, they put the extra bagged trash into your roll-cart and the arm dumps that as well. Therefore, it does not work to put extra trash in a box. You will be charged a \$2.00 fee for any extra bags or if the lid will not close. If you would like a different size roll-cart, please call City Hall. The fee to change roll-cart sizes is now \$18.00. Please keep the lid closed on your roll-cart at all times to keep water weight out of the cart. Please make sure to place your roll-cart properly at the curb. The arrows should face the street, so the open part of the lid is facing the street and the handles are towards the sidewalk. Thank you!

News from the City of Juliaetta

A New Way to Pay

We are now accepting debit and credit cards both in the office and on our website, www.cityofjuliaetta.com, as a convenient way to pay your City utility bill. We will accept Visa, MasterCard, Discover and American Express. Access Idaho is the provider of this service, and will charge a 3% + \$1.00 administration fee per transaction. No portion of the fee is received by the City of Juliaetta. Contact us at City Hall at 276-7791 with any questions.

Garbage Roll Carts

The transition to the new garbage roll carts has been an interesting one, with many residents opting to take advantage of the 60 day period in which they may exchange their cart for one of a different size at no cost. Beginning January 1st, there will be a \$15 fee to exchange roll carts. New residents will be an exception to that rule. Latah Sanitation has also notified City Hall of a few instances of trash or boxes being left out next to some roll carts as well as over-full carts. They haven't charged the City any additional fees at this time, but if they do, those charges will be passed on to the offender on his or her next city utility bill at a cost of \$3.00 per item. The bulky waste site will still open on the first and third Saturday of each month, and the recycle bin is always available. The cost of these services is included in your monthly garbage charge, so take advantage of them to help reduce the volume in your roll cart.

Thank you to all who voted in November's city election. There were two seats up for election; they will be filled by Nick Anderson and incumbent council member Ed Pea. Nick and Ed will be sworn in at the regular council meeting on January 14th. February's regular Council meeting will be held on the 11th of that month.
