





The book, which will cost \$33.00 (\$36.00 if being shipped), contains local history documentation of families, schools, agriculture and community events that shaped Leland.

Early settlers experienced extreme hardships almost

unimaginable to our current lifestyles. An excerpt follows from the story of one settler: "They made their first camp on the ridge, where the old barn on the Frank Byrne place now stands. They found water there, and named it "Thorn Springs". Lucy stayed in camp, while the men rode the horses over the country to stake out what land they wanted. While they were gone



some Indians came to their camp. Lucy was afraid and they asked where the men were. She pointed and said, "Over that hill". They rode off, but were soon back. One Indian shook his finger at Lucy and said, "You lie, you lie."......

The book includes the story of the first murder in Nez Perce County which took place in Leland. It would not be the last grizzly murder to happen at Leland. More excitement took place when an attempted assassination took place on the Sperry place.
