Each year the Kendrick Lions Club is happy to honor people who have made a difference in the quality of life in our area. When there is mention of community service, two loyal supporters of any fundraiser or cause in the community come to mind. Horst and Loeda Reil. They give cheerfully and generously to their church and community.

Horst emigrated from Germany to the United States in 1961. Being the nephew of Henry Reil, he was promised a look at America's style of living. He is a man of many talents and always "Johnny on the spot" to help with any project. For years he has trimmed meat for the Lion's Club the day before cooking it for Locust Blossom Festival. He has been there for many a friend or neighbor when they had problems with appliances, plumbing, or needed something built. He and Loeda are avid gardeners and many people benefit from the bounty of their garden. Each January they butcher and process all of their own home grown meat.

Loeda has been volunteering with the Food Bank from the time of its inception approximately 25 years ago. She and Horst have been lifelong members of Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church where they both sing in the choir. They can be depended on to help with any function at the church. Loeda has been involved with making hundreds of world relief quilts to send to disaster areas as well as fancy quilts to sell for the annual bazaar for funding needy causes.

Both of them work diligently on historical preservation of this area. An ongoing Cemetery Project has them out scrubbing and photographing tombstones, researching for information on the person buried there, and compiling extensive books with the information available to future generations. Loeda authored an historical book on Leland last year and is co-authoring another this year on Southwick and Cedar Ridge.

The couple raised two daughters, which connected them to involvement with the local schools and 4-H Clubs. Karen lives in Lewiston with husband Mike Larson and two sons. Heidi also lives in Lewiston with her two young sons.

They are supporters of the Senior Citizen site at Kendrick and Horst often entertains with his squeeze-box. Whether Loeda is baking pies for a fundraiser or compiling information for a historical novel for the area, there is no such thing as idle time on the agenda.

The Kendrick Lions Club is honoring a couple from Juliaetta who have been active in civic affairs for many years.

Janice has been a lifelong educator, having taught school at Lapwai for forty-two years prior to retiring recently. She is a talented pianist and has shared her talents with the community by playing at events and playing for the Juliaetta Community Church for many years in the past. She has taught Sunday School, Bible School, and is currently sharing her love of music with some music pupils. She is the secretary-treasurer of the Juliaetta TV Association and recently applied for and received a grant of \$88,770.00 to upgrade the equipment for the reflector system.

Dick retired worked for Mead & Howard Lumber Company, which later became Gem State Lumber Company for forty years. He then worked an additional six years at Bennett Lumber Company before retiring. He has served for over thirty years on the Juliaetta City Council, and has overseen the summer employees for many years. Many locals are happy to see him coming with his snow plowing equipment during the winter, and his John Deere tractor and equipment when it is time to work gardens in the spring.

Dick, with his wife's help, has always been very proactive in Juliaetta with projects involving the town as well as the Centennial Park and trail. He has donated hundreds of hours to making Juliaetta be the best it can be. He has served for over thirty years on the Juliaetta City Council and has volunteered with the Juliaetta Volunteer Fire Department in the past. Dick and Janice have maintained the television reflector for the past forty plus years as well. Each year the Groseclose family has seen to it that the Star and Cross on the hill overlooking Juliaetta are lit up to bring happiness to the community.

LOTS OF HISTORY IN COLTER'S CREEK WINERY

It was the road less taken that brought Mike Pearson and Melissa Sanborn on a drive in 2007 along the Potlatch River and ultimately on the journey of a lifetime. They are the owners and operators of the Colter's Creek Winery and Vineyard and now the new Tasting Room and Wine Bar open in Juliaetta.

Long before Pearson and Sanborn's time, the Lewis and Clark expedition named the current Potlatch River after John Colter, an important member of and chief hunter for Lewis and Clark. Later, sometime around 1872, vines were planted near Lewiston and wine was produced from nearly 40 different varieties for over 40 years. In the early 1900's, Prohibition forced the abandonment of commercial wine making. But thanks to the skill and passion of Mike and Melissa, the Colter's Creek winery is again producing a variety of wines.

Not only do Mike and Melissa produce excellent wines, but they do it while involving local community members as well as maintaining the vineyards using many earth-friendly methods and materials. They use both chemicals and a mechanized tool to prevent weeds. A "weed badger" is employed that mechanically removes weeds from the vine rows. They reuse water as much as possible and have installed a rainwater collection system that filters and purifies water so it can be reused. Solar panels help pump water for irrigation. The winery is a collection site for the ReCorkSM program where wine corks are collected for recycling, ultimately becoming footwear, flooring and other building materials.

When harvest time rolls around, many volunteers can be found in the vineyard picking the beautiful grape clusters, getting them on the conveyer belt to prepare them for de-stemming and then crushing the fruit. The winery has involved groups like the WSU rowers, the UI cycling team and even the Juliaetta Elementary teachers.

The Colter's Creek Tasting Room and Wine Bar has been recently renovated and is now open for business in Juliaetta. The building housing the Tasting Room was built in 1905 and has been occupied over the past 100+ years by an automotive shop, a café and a tavern. Not only are Colter's Creek wines available, but also other select local wines, beers and products. Other offerings include items like salads, a cheese plate and lobster cakes.

Colter's Creek has a terrific website that includes so much information about the winery, the new tasting room and the wine-making process. Its website is colterscreek.com and is well worth taking a look. Their blog offers delicious sounding recipes, especially for soups, information on harvesting cork, other vineyards worth a visit and much more. Treat yourself to not only a sip of good wine, but also a bit of history as you visit Colter's Creek in Juliaetta!

May Bond Election

The citizens of Kendrick should have received a letter in April inviting them to a Bond Informational Open House that will take place on Monday, May 13, from 5:30 - 7:00pm, at the Kendrick Fire Hall. We hope our residents will take the time to stop by our open house any time between 5:30 and 7:00 to understand why it is so important to pass the bond that will be on the May 21st ballot. We have been mandated by the EPA and DEQ to upgrade our sewer lagoons to avoid expensive fines. The city is actively seeking grants and other funding options to keep the cost as low as possible to the residents. If you have questions, you can contact City Hall at 289-5157.

Council Positions Open

The City of Kendrick will have three council positions and the mayor position on the November ballot. Two council positions and the mayor position will be a four year commitment and one of the council positions will be a two year commitment. Be thinking about if this is a way you would like to serve your community. Applications will be available in August and must be returned to City Hall by 5:00 PM on Friday, September 6.

Dog Licenses

Important date to remember: <u>May 10th</u> is the last day for the open burning season.

Open "outdoor" burning is any burning outdoors that does not pass through a stack, duct, or chimney. This includes outdoor residential, crop residue, and prescribed burning. Open burning also applies to material that is burned in burn barrels, air curtain destructors, or other such devices.

It is also illegal to burn garbage and most human-made substances, including plastics, hazardous wastes, paints, or painted materials, tires, and trade wastes (produced by a business) which emits hazardous pollutants into the air when they are burned.

It is easy and fun to participate. Exhibit in a clear bottle or jar. You must have grown your own exhibited specimen.

To exhibit in the **Artistic Design** category, you may use commercially grown plants and flowers. All material must be fresh. Exhibits cannot be over 20 inches tall or wide. There are two categories: "Jewels of Spring" and "Water Colors." The third category is "Precious Moments" which is using dried plant material in a creative design.

Bring your entries to the Grange Hall on Friday from 1:00 pm. To 4:00 pm Friday for judging on Friday evening and display at Locust Blossom Festival.

Several schools in our area have a motorized flag which drops down from the ceiling of their gymnasium. As it unrolls, it is an impressive sight as the

crowd immediately quiets, hats come off, and hands are placed over hearts. Kendrick Family Care

During the three years I have worked at Kendrick Family Care, the clinic staff has experienced many trials and emotions. These have also been experienced within the community. The emotions which are hardest to deal with are the feelings that come with death of a loved one.

There are many emotions that come with the loss of a loved one. The hardest is the idea of "assumptive loss".

Dealing With Loss

Assumptive loss is feelings and emotions that come when the person in loss has an expectation of the person that is gone. They want them to be able to fulfill a task or personal need. There is an emptiness that may never heal. Time may dull the emotions, but we may never get rid of these feelings.

Losing Loved Ones To Cancer

We have lost many people in these last few years to cancer.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), there is about a 20 percent increased risk to have lung cancer if you have ever smoked. That risk increases with the years of smoking and number of cigarettes. The Surgeon General reports lung cancer is the number one cancer from smokers.

Other types of cancer that could occur from smoking are oral, pharynx, throat, cervical, prostate and bladder cancer. The CDC reports annual health care costs for America due to smoking is \$96 billion dollars. Smoking is the worst preventable cause of disease.



I write this article the day after the bombing at the Boston Marathon. Another example of how easy it seems for an individual or individuals to take the life of another. Events such as this are becoming all too common as we hear about shootings or bombings.

One has to ask how did we get here and how do we fix it? I believe the answer to both of those questions is found in one common factor. Some believe that if we make the right laws we will be able to control society. What is the right law and do we need to control society or fix society? Time has proven that making new laws does not work. We still find it all too easy to take another's life. Could it be that we have always had the answer of what is wrong and how to fix it, but just refuse to accept it? Over the years we have tried to take God out of the picture by teaching that He is not necessary or even that He doesn't exist. When that happens something very significant changes as to how we view life. The answer we don't want to accept is found in the first book of the Bible, Genesis. It tells us that we are created in the image of God. That makes man special. That is what sets him apart from everything else God created. Is it by chance that at the same time we have raised a society to not believe in God that we also have a society that has little value for life? continue to believe we can control man by making laws we will head down the same road we are on. Over two thousand years ago Christ died on the cross not to try and control man, but fix that which was broken in man's relationship with God-John 3:16. The Kendrick – Juliaetta Historical Tour project continues to move forward. Marsha Que Sera Productions of Moscow, owned by Marsha Schoeffler, is producing a Kendrick video that is an expansion of the tour guide booklet. The historical homes on the tour will have their designating signs hung in the coming few months. Richard Abrams is the contact for a discussion to where we are to hang each home sign. Watch for our enlarged Kendrick Historical Tour booklets and new DVD's in local stores. We gratefully acknowledge grants from the JK Recreation District, Lion's Club, Colters Creek Winery, and Idaho Community Foundation.

Emo's Masonry, Gutters & Roofing from Deary has already begun preserving needs to the Kendrick Fraternal Temple's external brick surface. Kendrick Urban Forestry

The Kendrick Urban Forestry Board began the spring /summer activities by sponsoring the annual Arbor Day event on April 27. Partnering with the K/J Art Committee and the Hill and Valley Garden Club, the Forestry Board held a tree planting ceremony near the Sixth Street trail entrance. A nice Mountain Ash tree was planted with the help of local youths attending the event. The event kicked off in the Senior Center with cinnamon rolls and coffee, a silent auction, entertainment by the cub scouts and several awards to local youths and organizations.

`The Board, with funds from a Latah County Parks and Recreation grant, will begin spring maintenance activities of plantings along the trail and prepare for watering and weeding as the temperatures warm up. The Board also hopes to plant two more crabapple trees along the trail between Sixth and Eighth Streets.

The tree identification project in the City Park is nearing completion. A grant from the Latah Community Foundation funded the survey of the park, identification of tree species and the hiring of U of I Landscape Architecture student, Brian Edwards of Moscow to prepare a drawing that will be displayed on the kiosk in the park. The framed drawing will be on display at the Arbor Day event and then mounted on a kiosk wall before Locust Blossom Festival.

The Urban Forestry Board started a program last fall to compile a list of names of residents interested in having trees pruned. A contractor was invited to provide quotes to those residents and several trees have been pruned. The contractor will resume this work in April as the leaves come on. The Board intends to continue this program and interested residents may call Dave Klatt at 208-289-5511 if they would like to receive a quote for pruning trees. Pruning and care for residential trees situated in public right of way is the responsibility of the owner adjacent to the trees.

JK Senior Meals



The JK Senior Meal Site's Mission is to increase our local senior citizen's health and quality of life by providing nutritionally balanced meals, and economic education.

We run our program under the guidance of Area Agency on Aging (AAA), a federally funded program addressing the special needs of senior nutrition in our country. This program provides less than half of our operation budget. Voluntary contributions go towards the overall programs and services that we provide. Seniors who dine with us donate only what they can afford.

We depend on many volunteers to help serve food, make home deliveries, wash dishes, shop for groceries, pick up from The Food Bank in Lewiston each month, and clean the facility after meals. We have one paid employee to cook for the center (Abby Forsmann). Karen Lewis, one of our most innovative and faithful volunteers, not only does all of the above, but also cooks along side Abby.

We reopened on September 19th 2012, after a closure of 3 months last summer due to demolition by Primeland across the street from the center. Primeland, has completed it's project and has repaved that section of road by the meal site. Thank you Primeland, so much nicer.

The Center now has 4 new Parking Curbs, Thanks to Dale Lisher, who took out the old curbs, and replaced with 4 new ones from the Port of Wilma.

New flowers have been planted in the planters in front of the Senior Center by Karen Lewis, Thanks Karen.

In the last 7 months we have increased our Congregate count, and attendance on meal days. The first 4 months of 2013 we served 1120 meals at the center, and 550 home deliveries to our shut -ins.

Meals are served each Wednesday and Friday. Our doors are open at 11:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. Soup is ready by 11:15 a.m and the main meal is served at 12 noon. Menus are available at the Senior Meal Site at 104 6th Street, and also pinned up in the Kendrick and Juliaetta Post Offices each month.

In 2006 J-K received a grant and acquired a new Extrication truck. In 2011 we received a grant and purchased a new ambulance and extrication equipment. All of this new equipment is useless if we do not have the trained volunteers to operate it and respond to our community's emergency needs. The requirements to become a volunteer are:

Must be 19 years of age or older and have a HS diploma or GED;

Must be willing to be on-call by radio at least one duty shift per week and one weekend shift per month for one year minimum or repay for training expenses;

Must be in good health, must have a valid driver's license, clear driving record, and be able to pass a criminal background check.

Be able to respond to the ambulance from home in 10 minutes or less when paged.

J-K will pay for the cost of training. We pay a stipend reimbursement for response to calls. Jackets & emergency response kits will be provided with one year of active service. Many hands make light work, the more volunteers the easier the duty. The benefits of being a member are to serve the emergency needs of your friends, coworkers, neighbors, family, and children. Without J-K Ambulance emergency response the people you care about will be forced to wait for another department at least 30 minutes away to respond . . . if there is a crew available.
