She dismissed the idea completely and married a painting contractor. However, a couple years later, they went to a Bible College in Georgia.

The couple have been married 45 years and have four children and 14 grand kids. The three daughters live in Spokane and are looking forward to being with Mom and Dad during the Locust Blossom Festival. Their son recently retired after serving 23 years in the Air Force and is starting a missionary assignment in Columbia, South America. Larry and Randy have served on several community groups such as K-J Community Development Assn, Friends of the Library, Clearwater Evangelical Ministerial Assn., and printing the community newsletter committee. Randy says she has slowed down a bit over the past couple of years because of several surgical procedures, but will still play the piano for anyone who asks.

Randy's favorite flower is the rose which Larry provides by raising roses. He has 25 rose plants in their yard. Larry's other hobbies are woodworking (he made most of the wood furniture in their home), fixing computers and helping friends paint their houses.

Matt and Lisa Kathanimané are self-proclaimed dreamers. That "dreaming" has led them to remodel, repurpose and reclaim an older building at 704 E. Main, Kendrick, ID. This newly refurbished building now houses The Locust Blossom Inn, and the newest addition, Kups Koffee House.



Matt and Lisa attended Locust Blossom Days several years ago, and from that moment on, they were struck with the charm and warm social atmosphere of Kendrick. Eight plus years later, they have opened a bed and breakfast and Kups Koffee House where, as their sign reads "Interesting people gather."

So far, Kups Koffee House has surpassed the Kathanimane's hope for success. Every Monday, the same group of women meet to share coffee and conversation in the sophiscated coffee themed sitting area. A group of young ladies, aka the Ya Ya Sisters, meet on Wednesday mornings drinking from oversized decorated tea cups. The informal invitation to the sitting area is evident by the pleasant coffee smells, relaxed music and comfortable table sets, and accent chairs. Wireless technology is available and when the weather becomes warmer, outside seating will be offered.

When asked about their tag line, *Where interesting people gather*, Matt replied, "It's just something we came up with, and now we hear our customers using that phrase when they visit." Matt says when their coffee area is full of people, interesting conversation is shared. "We have farmers, loggers, passers by, high school and elementary kids, business people, retired persons, travelers, and many others that come in. We want people to feel like they belong here." Lisa wants to get a guest book for her patrons so they can keep a journal of customers.

Matt and Lisa believe in buying everything local for personal and business use. Their coffee beans are roasted in Troy, Chai tea is made in Moscow, and their pastries are made by local bakers.

Kups Koffee House offers hot and cold lattes, steamers, brew coffee, Italian sodas, fresh fruit smoothies and pastries. Kups Koffee House is open from 6AM – 4PM, Monday through Friday and 8AM – Noon on Saturdays. JK Senior Meals

JK Senior Meals signed a new 4-year contract with the Area on Aging Agency. There have been many new changes in policies, reports to the Area on Aging, Wa/Id Volun-

teer Center, the way we order from the Idaho Food Bank and the sign-up congregate sheets.

Our Head Cook Abby Forsman rejoined the Meal Site in January, with Kelly Wilson as the prep-cook. Abby arrives as early as 6am and Kelly at 9am every meal day. Their days are completed by 2-2:30pm. Soup is ready at 11am and the main meal is served at noon. Everyone is welcome to join in and listen to the entertainment or just visit with friends and meet new neighbors.

The Meal Site could use more volunteers. There are always things to be done: wrap flatware in napkins, put glasses on the tables, prepare pitchers of ice and water for each table; dishes and laundry after each meal day; pick up trays; deliver Meals on Wheels; pick up from the Food Bank, etc. For each 4 hours of volunteer work you receive a free meal. Last month we had 135 hours and 619 miles donated by volunteers.

To our delight, the number of congregates has been increasing each month. We served 242 meals to seniors and 78 meals to the under 60's and guests. Meals on Wheels delivered 50 meals and Medicaid recipients received 25 meals. If you need to have meals delivered to your home please call the Area on Aging Agency at 208-798-4200. They will assess your situation and call us to begin delivering to you.

It came to our attention some time ago that there is some confusion on who the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens, Inc. are, what they do and the connection to the JK Senior Meal Center. Golden Sunset Senior Citizens, Inc. are the owners of the building. They pay for electricity, water, garbage, phone, repairs to the building and they own the equipment that the Meal Site and renters use. JK Senior Meals rents the building and pays for the computer service.

9-volt Battery Safety FYI



9-volt batteries power our smoke alarms, household items and toys. But these batteries can be a fire hazard if not stored safely or disposed of with care. The problem with the 9 volt battery is they can be dangerous. The positive and negative posts are close together and if a metal object touches the two posts of a 9-volt battery, it can cause a short circuit. This can make enough heat to start a fire. It is unsafe to store

9-volt batteries in a drawer near paper clips, coins, pens, or other batteries. Do not store the battery with common household items such as steel wool, aluminum foil, and keys near 9-volt batteries. If these items touch the two posts, there is a greater risk of a fire starting. Weak batteries may have enough charge to cause a fire. Some fires have started in trash cans when 9-volt batteries were thrown away with other metal items. Keep batteries in original packaging until you are ready to use them. If loose, keep the posts covered with masking, duct, or electrical tape. Prevent the posts from coming in contact with metal objects.

Who is our Food Bank? Around 1993, some members of Kendrick Methodist Church began saving clothes and giving out Holiday Baskets with gifts to those in our community who might find themselves struggling. It soon became apparent that food was the most obvious need. Because the membership of the church was small, the local Junior Miss program volunteered to advertise and accept donations of gifts for the Holiday Baskets, and the clothing component was discontinued. It was around this time the food bank was given a formal name - JK Good Samaritan Food Bank. (Most people refer to this agency simply as the Food Bank.)

Gathering food items was well supported, but storage was another matter. The location changed several times. During this time, there were many volunteers, but it was Pat Holt who began the data and registration component of distributing food. Government Commodities were offered for those who gualified, but for several years, the commodities were dispersed from a home in Juliaetta because of the paperwork and regulations.

When the Juliaetta Community Center organized and purchased a building in Juliaetta, they offered to house the food bank in part of its kitchen. Building a room in the left hand portion of the kitchen, the food bank is currently in its permanent location.

Larry Haylett, who is on the board of directors, said there is a steady increase of need in our communities. Approximately 10 families were accessing the food bank on a monthly basis in 2004 and in 2013 there were between 25-35 families per month and in 2014 there has been an average addition of three families per "Our communities have really supported the food bank month. with their food drives, and donations. People have been very faithful in their giving," commented Mr. Haylett. "It seems when we are low on supplies, our community giving picks up as well. We are very appreciative." The Food Bank also receives commodities from Community Action Agency in Lewiston, and food items from the Idaho Food Bank. Seasonal food items from gardens and fruit orchards are always welcome. Financial donations are gratefully accepted, and drop off points for food can be found in Phil's Food City and the Kendrick Post Office.

The Food Bank serves the communities of Juliaetta, Kendrick and Lenore. Families who participate in the Food Bank are on a good faith basis because no personal paperwork is allowed due to the Family Privacy Act. No one is turned away. The food bank is open every Friday from 1:00 - 3:00 PM at 214 State Street in Juliaetta. Each participant fills out a sheet of food items wanted from a list of food available. A milk card is given out once a month for milk from Phil's Food City.

The Food Bank continues to supply Holiday Food Baskets during Thanksgiving and Christmas season. A complete holiday meal is provided based on the number of people in the family.

The Food Bank is under the leadership of board members. Larry Haylett, Wilma and Gail Larsen, and Loeda Reil and Bud Holt and is staffed by volunteers. Additional help is always appreciated. Donations can be taken to Latah Credit Union or mailed to PO Box 61, Kendrick, ID 83537. Superintendent's Report

The Common Core State Standards are a new approach to learning and teaching. Developed by education experts from 45 states, these K-12 learning standards go deeper into key concepts in math and English language arts. The standards require a practical, real-life application of knowledge that prepares Kendrick Jt. School District students for success in college, work and life.

Common Core provides:

- Consistent learning expectations for all students.
- Clear standards that focus on understanding over memorization.
- Emphasis on the critical topics students need to succeed after high school.

Our 3rd grade through 12th grade students have begun taking the SBAC field tests. These tests have been developed by the <u>Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium</u>, a bipartisan, state-led group developing assessments aligned to the Common Core State Standards in English language arts and math.

The consortium's executive director, Joe Wilhoft, wrote an article for the Thomas B. Fordham Institute in February 2014 entitled, "<u>Smarter Balanced assessments: A big moment for our schools</u>." In the article, he summarizes the history of, and transition to, these new tests.

- The SBAC is more than just a once-a-year test, Smarter Balanced is a system.
- There are three components in the Smarter Balanced system: Digital Library, Interim Assessments and Summative Assessments.
- The Idaho State Legislature has provided funds to pay for all schools to have access to all three components.
- The Digital Library will consist of professional development materials to improve the quality of information collected through daily classroom activities.
- These on-demand materials will be aligned to the Common Core standards and Smarter Balanced claims and assessment targets.
- When complete in mid-2014, the Smarter Balanced Digital Library will provide educators with professional development materials and instructional resources aligned to the Common Core State Standards and the Smarter Balanced assessment system.
- These computer-based tests will help Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick Junior/Senior High School evaluate how well our students performed by comparing them with students from other schools across the nation.
- The SBAC will empower families by providing them with a clear indication of how well their children are progressing toward mastering the academic knowledge and skills necessary for college and career readiness.

Why are the mirrors and windows steamed up after a shower? Why is there water beaded up on the outside surface of a glass of icy cold water? These are a couple of the many questions Mrs. Cannon's third grade students are finding the answers to by conducting science investigations. They have been learning about water's three natural states: liquid, solid, gas for the past several weeks. Mrs. Cannon and her students will soon move on to learning about animal and plant life cycles. Each day they will have plants and live crayfish to care for as they learn how each grows and develops and what each needs to survive. At the end of the school year each third grade student will be taking home his or her own container vegetable garden to enjoy.

Mrs. Cannon's class, along with the fourth, fifth, and sixth grade students at JES, are now taking the SBAC field test in math and language arts by answering on line practice questions. The third graders are also writing and illustrating a very descriptive ABC jungle-animals picture book.

On Friday, April 18th Mrs. Cannon and her students toured Dworshak Dam and Dworshak National Fish Hatchery in Orofino where they participated in an open house event. This included some hands on experience for the students spawning steelhead or salmon and observing how the hatchery works to increase the number of fish returning to our local rivers and streams.





Changes at the Juliaetta Cemetery

The Juliaetta Cemetery has recently undergone a muchneeded expansion. The original cemetery dates back to the founding days of Juliaetta, and many early pioneers have been laid to rest there. The earliest marked grave belongs to Mary Mark, who passed away January 18, 1901 before she reached her first birthday.

The new section of the cemetery was sold to the city for \$1 back in 1985 by Maribel Samuelson. Mrs. Samuelson was a direct descendant of the Schupfer family, who were early settlers of the American Ridge area and who helped to found the Village of Juliaetta. In fact, the land on which the cemetery stands was once part of the original Schupfer homestead.

Last spring it became evident that more space was needed at the cemetery, and so Council decided to incorporate the new section. Much of the work was done by Councilmember Dick Groseclose and Gabe Cirka, who works as a summer hire for the city. They felled several dying locust trees and moved the fence to enclose the new section. City maintenance supervisor Frank Groseclose graded the land and Dick sowed the grass seed. The new 50 feet wide section stretches east and west from American Ridge Road along the entire southernmost border of the cemetery. Thirty one rows of eight plots each were added, for a total of 248 additional plots. Plots are still available for \$50 each. Stop by Juliaetta City Hall to see the map.

Why is the world falling apart?

he Grand Room in the upstairs Fraternal Temple is now insulated, sheetrock, textured and painted. Thank you Ron Coleman and Back Country Painting both Kendrick contractors for your outstanding workmanship. On Saturday, April 5th an energetic crew consisting of Larry and Sharon Harvey, Travis Welty, Bill Ouderkerken, Sharon Harris and Chris Kowrach performed an extensive clean up throughout the entire building. The Grand Room is a big step closer to becoming our museum.

A historically significant artifact is being returned to us from Asotin County Museum ... our Potlatch Telephone Company switchboard. PTC service came to Kendrick in 1905 remaining until 1988 when they sold to TDS. Until PTC's arrival, one telephone line connected to a booth message center located in



the H.P. Hull store (Phil's Family Foods present site) joined Kendrick to other single booths located in Juliaetta, Lapwai, Moscow and Lewiston. It was not unusual, with this pre-1905 telephone system to see someone run out on Main Street and shout through a megaphone to bring the correct person to the store for their newly arrived message.

JKHF has recently obtained new signage for Cameron, Leland, and Wild Rose Cemetery. We are grateful to Potlatch Cemetery District and Elaine Galloway for helping fund this project.

JKHF is also partnering with Mark Mustoe, the Southwick Community Center Director toward his historic commemorative efforts. Mark has applied for a 501 (c)3 Non Profit Status in order to be more effective for fundraising purposes and grant applications. There is much work to be accomplished at Southwick. In early summer he will install a Historic Marker on the front porch of the building that will include pictures and a timeline of the history of the area and important events over the course of time that shaped the town. The goal is to have a picnic table and garbage can there for people who stop by as well as a board to post notices. Watch for a summer fundraiser for this project.

The Juliaetta Planting Project – Growing Strong!

The planters will provide year-round beautification in the heart of Juliaetta, thanks to the generosity of the donors.
