



# **Blue Star Memorial Ceremony**



The Blue Star Memorial Marker Program of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. was introduced in 1945 to honor men and women serving in the Armed Forces during World War II. The name of the program represents the star symbol featured on the service flags that were displayed in homes and businesses to indicate that a family member was in military service. Garden clubs of the era envisioned a ribbon of living memorials traversing every state, composed of roadside plantings by club members. The right to designate Blue Star Highways was won by petitioning state legislatures and coordinating with Departments of Transportation, and the Blue Star Marker was designed to identify these roads.

The Blue Star Memorial Program has remained active to this day, and the ribbon of highway now extends for thousands of miles across the continental US, Alaska and Hawaii, with 2,304 markers nationwide. All men and women who have served, are serving, or will serve in the Armed Forces of the United States are honored by this memorial, so no marker bears an individual's name.

Markers are still dedicated each year to designate Blue Star highways, veterans' facilities, national cemeteries, parks, and civic and historic sites, demonstrating our continuing appreciation for those who defend our country. The blue star on the World War II service flag stood for hope and pride, and today, the same flag is still presented to members of our military serving abroad in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The Hill and Valley Garden Club, a member of the Garden Club Federation of Idaho and the National Garden Clubs Inc., has been granted approval to erect this memorial, which was purchased with funds donated by Zion Lutheran Church. This Blue Star Marker is proudly offered to our community in honor of all those who serve to keep us safe and free.

The KJ7 would like to invite all community members, businesses, organizations, and churches to participate in the 11th Annual "Light the Park" Celebration.

Each business/organization/individual interested in participating will be assigned a tree to decorate in the Kendrick City Park. Each business/organization/individual is responsible for decorating as well as providing lights needed for that tree. We are asking that only lighted items be placed on the trees again this year. We would like to encourage everyone to get creative and individualize their tree. Make it your own! If you decorated a tree last year and did not take down your own lights our committee most likely has them in storage. Any lights removed from trees last year will be brought out on our community decoration day. Unfortunately, because the lights are used 24 hours a day for over a month they rarely last more than a year or two so please plan on bringing some extra.

We will have a community light the park day on <u>Saturday November 3<sup>rd</sup> beginning</u> at 8:00 am. This is a great day to get your tree decorated! There will be ladders available and extra sets of hands to help you decorate your tree. Once again this year we will have a snorkel lift, donated by Western States Rental and L&S Construction, and a lift truck, donated by Avista Corporation, to get the lights higher in the trees. If however you chose to decorate your tree on another day we would like to ask that it is decorated no later than Sunday November 11<sup>th</sup>.

# Palouse Discovery Science Center To Bring "Project SOS" to Kendrick/Juliaetta

The Palouse Discovery Science Center (PDSC) in Pullman, has received a National Science Foundation (NSF) grant award to fund a two-year outreach project called "Project SOS: Making Connections Using the Science of Sustainability." The project topic is the science behind sustainable housing, with a special focus on conserving heat energy. For the first year, the PDSC will develop hands-on activities and prototype exhibits. During the second year, we will bring the exhibits and activities to three rural communities: Kendrick/Juliaetta, ID, Rosalia, WA, and the Coeur d'Alene Reservation in Plummer, ID.

Youth participants (ages 11-15) will explore how building materials and their properties can be used to control heat transfer and experiment with retrofitting a model house to improve its energy efficiency. They will also receive takehome materials to investigate heat transfer in their own homes. Older teens will serve as mentors for the younger participants, and parents will also be invited to participate in some of the activities.

The Project SOS team consists of PDSC staff, faculty from WSU and U of I, staff at the Palouse-Clearwater Environmental Institute in Moscow, and an advisor from OMSI (the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry). Additional partners include representatives from all five power companies that serve the three rural communities, along with representatives from each community. An initial workshop for the Project Team and all partners will be held on Thursday, November 8. Anna Bruce has been involved with planning the project and will serve as the Kendrick/Juliaetta representative.

#### **Kendrick School District #283**

Autumn is here and the first quarter is ending. Parent/teacher conferences will be held November 7th and 8th. With winter right around the corner, it is important to make sure your children are dressed in clothing that will keep them warm for bus travel and the playground.

My first topic will be that of school attendance. Each year I remind parents and students of the fiscal impact to a school if students do not attend school regularly. The state only pays funds for days students attend school, so we lose money when students are not in school. Funding is important and it is impossible to budget for students not attending each day. Also a reminder, the more you are in school the more you can learn! If you have doctor appointments, please keep your child in school until after 1:00pm to count the day for funding. Our school enrollment in grades K-6 is 120 students and in grades 6-12 we have 117 students. This count is down about six students from last year.

My second topic is to inform the community that the School Board has changed their regular meeting dates from Thursdays to the second Monday of each month. Meetings will still be held at the JES principal's office at 7:00pm. Along with the change in Board meetings, is the upcoming 2013 Supplemental levy election which may be held in March. The trustees will be making that decision by the December meeting.

There will be another election in May where the community will elect two new School Trustees. Buddy Henson from zone 3 in Juliaetta and Deb Klatt from zone 2 in Kendrick have both indicated they will not be seeking reelection. So if you are interested, please watch for your petition dates in the Lewiston Tribune.

Before these veteran trustees leave, they must hire a new Superintendent/Elementary Principal as I will be retiring at the end of the school year. Timelines are being drafted and work has begun on the selection process. The board will be advertising this position in Dec.-Jan. If you have any opinions concerning this issue, the trustees would appreciate your input.

The school district is working on a **new website** and it should be fully operational by the end of next month. The entire staff has **new e-mail addresses** that are currently operational. All addresses will use the new URL <u>dist283.org</u> using their first name dot last name. You can reach the district office at <u>district.office@dist283.org</u> and the superintendent at <u>cal.spangler@dist283.org</u> each employee can be reached using this format.

Our staff and administration are working hard to make sure each and every student demonstrates academic growth each year. Please feel free to visit our schools, as I know you will be pleased with what you observe. Thank you for your continued support of our schools.

# Hints for Homework from KHS

Fall is here and things are picking up! As we navigate another school year, here are some helpful strategies for kids and parents for keeping up...

#### Think it Through

Before your student begins, have them make up a to-do list. Example: write a poem, read a history chapter, solve 10 math problems.

Then, suggest they number the tasks, from toughest to easiest, and start with the hard stuff. This "save the easiest for last" strategy will help them finish on a high note, and perhaps inspire them to do some extra studying.

#### **Think About Time**

Ask your child to consider different time slots she can use to get work done. For instance, maybe she could set aside a weekend morning, Sunday night, or time before practice. Encourage your child to complete at least one assignment at school each day if they have any "extra" time. The more they do then, the more time they'll have for fun later.

#### **Think Positive**

Help your child see completing homework as an opportunity to relieve stress. Homework isn't stressful, not having homework completed and being unprepared for school is stressful!

# TURKEYS NEEDED

The J/K Good Samaritan Food Bank is in need of turkeys for Thanksgiving and Christmas Baskets. These baskets contain everything needed to prepare a holiday meal including desserts. Each year the food bank prepares approximately 40-50 baskets for each holiday. Families of 4 or more members get a turkey while smaller families get a chicken. This is going to be a big expense as we will need approximately 25-30 turkeys for each holiday. 

Your holiday shopping can be made easier with purchase of one of the "Letters from the Front" volumes or the "History of Leland."



### **Nez Perce County Voter Information**

Voters who are not registered to vote prior to October 12<sup>th</sup> may do so at the polls on Election Day. He or she may register to vote at the polling place in the precinct where they reside on Election Day.

By signing the voter registration card, a registrant is affirming that he or she:

Is at least 18 years old on election day:

Is a citizen of the United States:

Resides at the address shown;

Has resided in Idaho and in Nez Perce County for 30 days preceding the election;

Is not under any legal disqualification to vote.

An individual may prove residence for the purpose of registering to vote by:

- Showing a driver's license or Idaho identification card issued through the department of transportation, Tribal Identification Card: or
- Showing any document which contains valid address in the precinct together with a picture identification card; or
- Showing a current valid student identification card from a post-secondary educational institution in Idaho accompanied with a current student fee statement that contains the student's valid address in the precinct together with a picture identification card.

#### **ABSENTEE BALLOTS**

Voters who requested an absentee ballot have until Election Day to return them to the Clerk's office. Voters can mail their ballot or deliver it in person to 1230 Main Street, Lewiston. Ballots received after November 6<sup>th</sup> will not be counted regardless of postmark date.
