## **KENDRICK FAMILY CARE MOVING TO NEW LOCATION**

Gritman Medical Center has provided access to health care for residents of Kendrick and Juliaetta and the surround area since 1999 with Kendrick Family Care. In June, the Gritman Board of Directors approved the purchase of a building at 606 East Main Street, Kendrick, just a few doors down from the current location which we had leased.

Some of you may know the history of the building - it was originally the Kendrick Theatre, and in operation until 1973 before being converted into retail business space.

At about 2,900 square feet, the new location for Kendrick Family Care will provide more space than the current clinic, with four patient exam rooms, improved patient privacy and improved provider space for a more efficient and easier work flow.

Remodeling began in September. The work includes new utilities, water sewer and electrical service.

The new Kendrick Family Care will open by the end of the year. We will have the same telephone number, 208-289-3841 and the same convenient hours: Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Our staff is able to care for your regular health needs as well as wellness checks, pre-employment physicals, chronic disease management, childhood and adult immunizations and more.

Kendrick Family Care is served by Dr. Matthew Rice, medical director; Bob Mahal, ARNP, Heather Christensen, PA-C; Beth Bogar, medical assistant; Tona Morgan, admitting representative, Nina Benichou, RN, and Trisha Quiring, office manager.

## LET'S LIGHT THE PARK

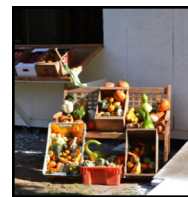

They will be brought out on our community decoration day. The lights are used 24 hours a day for over a month they rarely last more than a year or two so please plan on bringing some extra. Sam Hall, owner of Cuz Produce and Jill Sherman, full time employee, are first cousins with deep roots in the Juliaetta area. Jill and Sam were born and raised in Juliaetta and their grandfather operated a truck farm not far from where they lived as children.

As an adult, Jill lived in Eastern Oregon for 35 years but moved back to Juliaetta to care for her father. Jill called her cousin Sam and mentioned she was moving back home and Sam, who was now retired said, "Good. We are going to open a produce stand." And the name of Cuz Produce was born.

The decision to build at 182 Main Street in Juliaetta, was made because of the visible location, parking availability and space to expand as the business grew. Cuz Produce will be open year around with seasonal fruit and vegetables for sale. During the summer months, purchasing trips are made to Yakima Valley, Hermiston, Walla Walla and Wapato farms to keep freshness and quality at its maximum level. During the winter months, produce is purchased through the same Spokane packing house that larger grocery chains use. Sam and Jill's goal is to offer their produce at or under the prices found at area grocers. Cuz Produce accepts cash, credit or debit cards.

Local produce, including farm fresh eggs and blackberry jams (when available) can be found at Cuz Produce as well as Pepsi products and specialty items like jarred garlic. Jill and Sam encourage buying from local gardeners and other growers who may be interested in wholesale pricing and having their items featured at the produce stand. Cuz Produce can be found on Facebook with information about the latest food arrivals and other information.

Currently, Cuz Produce offers pears, pumpkins, onions, gourds, green vegetables, cauliflower, carrots, squash, an assortment of potatoes, a variety of apples, mushrooms, and other fresh items. Citrus fruits will soon make their appearance.

While Cuz Produce is open 7 days a week during spring and summer, new winter hours of Tuesday through Saturday from 10:00am – 5:30 pm will soon be in effect.

Plans are already being made for future products. In addition to fruits and vegetables, Cuz Produce expects to offer annual and perennial garden plants, flowering plants, and garden seed in the spring of 2014. "We plan to be here a long time," said Jill.

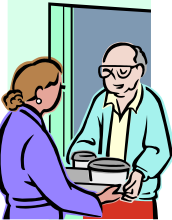


## JK Senior Meals

The JK Senior Meal Site is entering into a new contract for 2014 with the Area Agency on Aging (AAA), which is a Federally funded program addressing the special needs of senior nutrition and education. Our programs include nutritional meals, entertainment and presentations on health issues that benefit all who attend each Wednesday and Friday. We are open from 11am to 1pm, and at times our new congregates, visitors and regulars visit until 1:30pm. This gives all a good feeling of the communities coming together to enjoy what the JK Meal Site is all about.

Don't forget to VOTE on November 5<sup>th</sup>. Our volunteer cook, Karen Lewis, is running for Kendrick City Council.

On November 14<sup>th</sup> the Washington-Idaho Volunteer Center is hosting a Volunteer Recognition Luncheon. The theme is "Volunteers are Worth Their Weight in Gold". The Center has 9 volunteers who help with food preparation, serving, preparing and delivering meals on wheels for the homebound, washing dishes, cleaning tables and kitchen area, doing laundry, picking up foods from the Food Bank and grocery shopping for the Center.



The Center is now delivering meals to Medicaid recipients. If you know of a Medicaid recipient who is over 60 years old and would need meals delivered contact the Health and Welfare Office, 208-799-3100 for an assessment. There is no cost for their meals.

Our deliveries for Meals on Wheels have been increasing. On an average week we deliver 31 to 36 meals to the home bound. Our regular meals served at the Center are averaging 275 to 300.

JK Senior Meals is having a **Craft Fair Fund Raiser** from 9am to 4pm on November 16<sup>th</sup> at the Meal Site. This will help fund expenses that are incurred above and beyond donations. Bring your own craft to sell; tables are \$10 each. We will be selling whole pies and slices of pie with coffee. Donated pies are welcome. We will also have 3 turkeys and 2 hams to raffle. Tickets will be sold for \$2.00 each or 5 tickets for \$8.00 at the Center and other local locations. If you have any questions or requests please call the center at 289-5031 or 289-8346.

The Senior Center will be closed during the weeks of Thanksgiving and Christmas. Meals on Wheels will still be delivered.

Our maintenance is winding down with the cool and rainy fall weather, but we continue to brainstorm new ideas.

Among the ideas being tossed around currently are: removing stumps and replanting in several locations around town; installing bird houses along our trail; asking students to make us tree identification signs; and teaming up with the Hill and Valley Garden Club to beautify select areas along our trail. Unfortunately, we will have to remove several large trees along our levy as mandated by the Army Corps of Engineers, but we fully intend to plant more trees in other areas to compensate for the loss. 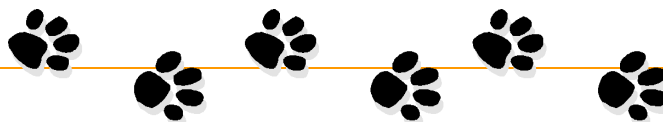
## Christmas Program at Juliaetta Elementary

## Juliaetta Elementary School

Juliaetta Elementary School (JES) enjoyed a smooth opening this year and is moving forward on a positive note. The State Department of Education recognized our school as exemplary and awarded us a four star rating. The rating is well deserved. We have a highly qualified staff and to a person our staff has a committed, caring concern for every child.

When you hear the phrase “Common Core,” think of three (3) key ideas: 1) The Common Core emphasizes critical thinking. It requires students to analyze more, discuss more, evaluate more, justify more and explain their thinking and understanding more deeply, especially in writing. 2) The Common Core emphasizes learning across disciplines. Students spend more time working together with different settings, structures and tools. 3) The Common Core emphasizes proof and evidence. Long gone are the days of worksheets, fact memorizations and skill and drill. Students are not taught this way and they are not tested this way. We are in the process this year of more fully implementing the *Common Core*. So, the new test that is replacing the ISAT will require our students to explain how they know what they have learned.

### JES Grades 4-6

This summer the intermediate grade teachers, Mrs. Cirka, Mrs. Fredenburg, and Mr. Hoffman took a science class for teachers called, Teaching for Excellence in Science and Literacy Achievement (TESLA), and they are excited about incorporating writing into their science lessons.

We have started a unit in science called, measurement. The students have started learning about linear measurement and we will also study the concepts of mass, and volume. The Big Idea of this unit is: A standard unit of measure is necessary for consistency in communication between people. The standard system of measurement used in science is the metric system. We should be finished with this unit by end of the first quarter, and we will share with you at conference time how your child is doing in science and all other subject areas.

First quarter conferences will be held in November on the 6<sup>th</sup> and the 7<sup>th</sup>. We will send a letter about a week beforehand to schedule your conference time.

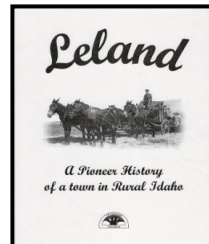
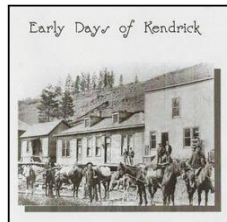
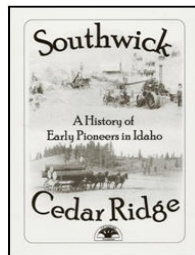

With heart and, hands, and voices,  
Who wondrous things has done,  
In whom this world rejoices.

Paul wrote his letter to the church at Philippi while he was in jail. Paul had been beaten, abandoned by his friends, lost contact with his churches and here in the midst of these circumstances he wrote the Epistle of Joy to the Philippians. He writes to "rejoice in the Lord", and to "be thankful." Thankful people refuse to allow today's troubles to blind them to yesterday's blessings. Further, thankful people realize that today's troubles will be tomorrow's miracles.

It's been said, gratitude is a vaccine, an antitoxin, and an antiseptic. Gratitude can be a vaccine that can prevent the invasion of a disgruntled attitude. As antitoxins prevent the disastrous effects of certain poisons and diseases, thankful living destroys the poison of faultfinding and grumbling. When trouble has smitten us, a spirit of thanksgiving is a soothing antiseptic.

Remember the blessing of the Lord our God, who gave us his son, Jesus Christ for our salvation, whose birth we will celebrate in December.

## South Latah Highway District News

We have been very active in the JK area this summer. The bridge deck on the Middle Potlatch Creek has been replaced and over five miles of Cedar Ridge Road was seal coated. We are planning to apply for grants to help replace the Little Bear Creek Bridge in the near future.

The snow will be here sooner than we would like so please make plans now to remove personal property from the Right-Of-Way for the snowplows to push snow off the roads. Use caution when driving in winter conditions, and cooperate with the highway workers that clear the roadways. Studded snow tires are legal beginning October 1st.

Here are some additional safety tips:

- Remain two car lengths behind snowplow trucks for every 10 mph you drive. Sand being spread by trucks can damage your vehicle.
- Do not pass a snowplow unless it is absolutely necessary. If you must pass, do so only when you can clearly see the road ahead. Do not pass on the side where the plow is spraying snow. If you do, the snow’s force can knock your car out of control.
- Do not cut back immediately in front of a snowplow truck. The plow blades are often covered with snow and can be difficult to see.
- Do not brake suddenly if you are traveling in front of a snowplow. The heavy vehicle cannot stop as quickly as an automobile.
- Do not abandon your car unless it is absolutely necessary. However, if you must, leave it as far off the road as possible. Abandoned cars can interfere with the road clearing process and can be extremely hazardous to snow removal equipment and the operators if they are hidden or buried by snow.
- Be aware of potential icy areas such as shady spots, ridges and overpasses. Since they are exposed on their undersides, bridges and overpasses are deprived of ground warmth and freeze more rapidly than the roadways leading to them.
- \* Before you begin your trip, make sure your car’s windows, mirrors and lights are clear of snow. Keep your windshield washers filled with a non-freezing solution all winter.

No one filed for the two year council position, so this position will be appointed by the new mayor in the February/March time-frame.

There is one confusing aspect on the ballot and that is the write-in candidate. In order for the votes to count, the candidate has to file paperwork by October 8, to be considered as a write-in candidate. We did not have anyone apply to be a write-in candidate, so even though there is a line on the ballot that says write-in candidate, any names written in will not be counted.

#### Garbage Roll-carts

Your new roll-cart should have been delivered in October. The first roll-cart pick-up day is Wednesday, November 6. Only roll-carts will be serviced as of November 6. Trash left in regular garbage cans will not be picked up as of this date. If you can find a use for your old garbage cans, that is great! If you cannot take your old trash can to the bulky waste site, you can leave your EMPTY trash can next to your roll-cart WITH A NOTE asking them to dispose of the can.

Although rates have increased, you have also received new roll-carts. These sturdy, wheeled cans have attached lids to keep rain-water out and will be maintained by Latah Sanitation. When you set out your roll-carts, make sure they aren't blocked by parked cars or in any other area that isn't easily accessible. Remember, you will have sixty days from the time of delivery to swap out your can for a larger or smaller size. If you have any questions, please call us at City Hall, 276-7791.

#### A New Way to Pay

Coming soon, you will have a new way to pay your city utility bill. We will soon be accepting debit and credit card payments both on our website, [www.cityofjuliaetta.com](http://www.cityofjuliaetta.com) and in the office at City Hall. You will also be able to pay via e-check online, and will be able to set up automatic monthly payments. For debit/credit card users, there will be a 3% + \$1.00 fee for this convenience; e-check customers will incur a \$2.50 fee. Of course we will still accept checks, money orders and cash in the office or by mail.

## **New Roll Cart Service for Solid Waste Starts in November**

Roll carts will be delivered to each rural residence in the month of October. The new service will begin November 4, 2013. Roll carts are the property of Latah Sanitation and are registered to each specific address via serial number and RFID tag. Important information is included in each roll cart explaining the new service and restrictions. Pick up times have been changed. Service now starts at 7 am which may delay your service from your normal time.

Many residents are unsure of the change in the roll cart trash collection service and are being asked to put their best effort forward to make it work.

Latah County and the Rural Cities did not have a choice on implementing roll carts. Majority of all contractors require roll cart service for trash removal for the safety of employees. The roll carts will prevent paying disposal cost on water weight, which is collected in cans without lids. The roll carts will allow for an accurate billing per account, similar to other utility bills where you pay for your use.

Please use the provided roll cart for a minimum of 3 weeks to see if it fits your needs. Roll cart sizes can be exchanged free of charge through December. There is a \$5.00 fee for all additional trash (bags/items) outside of the roll cart. Lids must be closed to prevent disposal cost of water weight and littering problems. A correctly sized cart will allow for occasional extra trash.

Commercial and residential properties in rural Latah County contact Latah County Solid Waste Department at 208 883-5706 and those within city limits need contact City Hall of Kendrick 208 289-5158 or Juliaetta 208 276-7791 for billing questions or account changes.
