What's Happening At Your Food Bank



As you have been supportive of the food bank during food drives and by individual donations we want to let you know what the food bank is doing. We have noticed that the food bank is busier than ever but when going over some records it was surprising to see how much busier we are than even a couple years ago. We have found that two years ago we distributed approximately 14,000-15,000 pounds of food in one year. This past year we nearly doubled that by distributing approximately 25,000-26,000 pounds. We have been able to keep up with the demand because of your support and because of grants we have been able to receive. Recently we received

a \$1000 grant from the Idaho Community Foundation. Also we received another \$1000 from the Kissler Family Foundation Philanthropic Gift fund in the Idaho Community Foundation. Another grant we received was from CHS (Primeland) for \$3000. Another source of food that helps your local food bank is The Idaho Food Bank. We get a load of food from them almost on a weekly basis. Thank you for your continued support that helps us keep up with the need.

Travis lives in West Kendrick with his mother, Jean, whom he tended when she had her shoulder operation recently. Travis came to the Welty family as a four-month-old foster child. By the time he was two, the family had adopted him. He went through a series of surgeries for his legs and doctors told him he would never ride a bike or swim. He accomplished both. His father, Casey died of cancer at a young age. When his mother had to undergo colon cancer surgery, his sister Julie Cooper went to California to care for her. Jean and Travis decided to relocate to Kendrick about eight years ago. Travis has had many surgeries on his right arm, but it simply is not functional. He told me recently, "Oh, well, I can do more with one arm than some people can with two."

Billy lives with his brother and sister-in-law, Bob and Aunie Ouderkerken near Kendrick. Billy moved to California when his family immigrated from Holland to join his uncle who had a dairy in California. He grew up in California, but his family moved to Idaho several years ago and he loves this area. Billy is a Kendrick Tiger fan through and through. All things athletic are expounded by Billy. You will hear him cheering the Seattle SeaHawks as well. As each season progresses, Billy picks his favorite team and cheers them on enthusiastically.

Both have contributed to progress at the Fraternal Temple building with both the Grange and JK Heritage Foundation. Both have given selflessly to helping at the Senior Center. Superintendent's Report

With this article, I want to share the most recent report from ACT on the achievement of our graduates who took the ACT test during the first half of 2014. The ACT consists of curriculum-based tests of educational development in English, mathematics, reading, and science designed to measure the skills needed for success in the first year of college coursework. First, a little background on what the ACT is...

What does "ACT" stand for?

Originally, "ACT" stood for "American College Testing." In 1996, however, the official name of the organization was shortened simply to "ACT." This change in the official name was made to better reflect the array of programs offered by ACT beyond college entrance testing, which includes workforce development testing.

The ACT 2014 Report answers the question, "Are our students ready for college?"

While students will pursue a variety of paths after high school, our primary mission, is to prepare every Kendrick graduate for the challenges of college and work. Through collaborative research with postsecondary institutions nationwide, ACT has established a set of college readiness benchmarks for designated college courses: English Composition: **18 on the ACT English Test**; Algebra: **22 on the ACT Mathematics Test**; Social Science: **22 on the ACT Reading Test**; Biology: **23 on the ACT Science Test**.

All Kendrick students whose scores were college reportable, both standard and extended time tests, were included in the report dated August 20, 2014.

When compared against the benchmark scores listed above, ACT reported that Kendrick Jt. School District averaged 26.0 on the ACT English Test; 27.0 on the ACT Mathematics Test; 23.0 on the Reading Test; and 25.0 on the Science Test. These results are above the college readiness benchmark standards **in all categories**. ACT further reported that our District composite score is 25.0, which is above the Idaho State average ACT composite score of 22.4.

I frankly take my hat off to Mr. Steve Kirkland, our high school principal, and his professional staff of excellent teachers for the work they do in preparing our students for college and the world of work. I also acknowledge the successful foundation laid by our wonderful staff at Juliaetta Elementary School for each child progressing from one grade level to the next and then on to Kendrick Jr/Sr. High School. *We are the Tigers, the mighty, mighty Tigers...*

Juliaetta Elementary Principal's Report

We are looking forward to another great year at Juliaetta Elementary School (JES). We started last year with the exciting announcement that the State Department of Education had designated JES as a four-star rated school. Last year we worked hard to maintain this elite status and improve our learning programs. This year in addition to the hard work we will be doing day-to-day in the classroom and month-to-month in our professional development efforts, we are calling upon our parents to support us in helping to improve our *rate of attendance*. Being in school every day means your child won't miss out on learning. Try to schedule appointments and family trips outside of school hours. If your child asks to stay home, remind him of all the exciting activities he will miss, such as participating in reading group or painting in art class. Explain to your child that she/he can be absent only if they are sick or if there's a family emergency. Now, let's talk about homework.

Homework solutions that work... Like an actress rehearsing her lines or a batter working on his swing, your child does homework to practice what he/she learns in school. And like most learners, your child will likely encounter occasional challenges. Here are a few solutions to common problems your child might face.

Getting started... When your child gets home from school, she/he might want to relax for a little while, or may want to jump right in and work. Have your child try each way for one week and keep track of how it goes. Your child might write notes in the calendar squares; such as, "went great today" or "had hard time getting started." After 2 weeks, review the notes to see which routine works best.

Staying motivated... When your child starts feeling restless doing homework, suggest taking an exercise break or moving to a new spot. For example, your child might finish working on a vocabulary assignment at the kitchen table and then start science on the porch. A planned break to eat a snack or take a walk will give your child renewed energy for working.

Solving problems... Help your child make a list of things she/he can use when problems come up. For a math assignment, for example, have your child try tools like a number line or find sample problems in the text book. When reading, have your child look up words in a dictionary or reread a paragraph. If problems persist, encourage your child to call a friend from class or write the question down and ask the teacher the next day. *We want your child to be successful.* Dr. Lindsay Park

Reminder of Burning Ordinances Kendrick

No Open Burning is allowed in Kendrick during the State wide dates of May 15th through October 20th. Ordinance# 4-1-11: A. Restricted: The burning of substances of any kind within the city is hereby prohibited during those periods when burning is prohibited or restricted by the Department of Lands and or Department of Forestry of the state of Idaho, or it is determined that burning could be detrimental to the health or well being of city inhabitants.

Juliaetta

Open Burning within Juliaetta City Limits is prohibited without a burn permit until October 20th. Permits are available from Juliaetta City Hall during normal business hours.

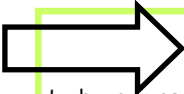
